

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Connecting in our Communities

In 1851 Queen Victoria granted a one hundred acre lot of land to a James William Veinot in what was at the time called Ohio. Veinot's ancestors had arrived in Lunenburg almost one hundred years earlier with the group of 'Foreign Protestant' families invited to settle in Nova Scotia with the promise of free land in exchange for loyalty to the British Crown. As the group grew they expanded inland and the communities of Lunenburg County had their beginnings.

A history project by a grade ten student at the Hemford School in 1953-54, Elinor Freeman, explains that James Veinot, her great grandfather, came with his family from Midville Branch and first built a tent home by a large rock. This was soon replaced by a log cabin under a willow tree, and then the first frame house in Hemford. The first homesteads were built on hills so they could see each other's lights and smoke.

Soon other families arrived names like Snyder, Dorey, Russell, Silver, Wile, Mailman, Crouse, Wagner, Zwicker, Smith, Payne, Freeman and the work of building a community began. The next fifty years, saw the beginnings of stores, a school, post office, mills, a church, a cemetery, an undertaker. Sadly, the first two people buried at what became Hemford Cemetery were two children who died of scarlet fever.

At some point, in the early 1900's, the name was changed to Hemford, "said to be named thus because it was bounded by two "fords" which are now West River Bridge and Smith Bridge which are our boundaries. The "Hem" was taken from the hemlock trees". (B Embree Veinot)

The first train, the 'Halifax and South Western' went through in 1903 and rail service from New Germany to Caledonia continued until the 1970's. The community benefitted greatly from the railroad and the railroad was well supported by the community. Often when there had been a heavy snowfall, the men of the community were summoned by the ringing of the church bell to gather to clear the heavy drifts so the train could get through.

I suspect there were many times when the men were called out as well to help build, maintain, clear the dirt roads that connected the communities; I'm sure there was rejoicing in the fifties when Highway 208 was paved. Probably as there was rejoicing when telephone service and electricity "came through".

By the early 1900's Hemford had become a bustling and well serviced community and continued to be so for many years. Rosemary Wile explains that when she first moved to Hemford as a young bride, even in the 70's, you could buy meat from Harold Barkhouse, Ron Crouse delivered milk, Wagner's Store and Mailman's Store provided most household and hardware needs, pretty much everything else could be gotten mail order from Sears delivered to your door through the local post office. Medical services were available in nearby New Germany through Dr's Crowe and Cunningham (who also made house calls) and dental services through Dr Lent.

Social life flourished as an IOOF was established, a Women's Institute, a Community Hall hosted suppers, card parties, pie socials, wedding receptions, and Christmas concerts. For some years, the younger school grades met at the Hall.

The church and community were closely tied as they gathered to worship and also to socialize, to help each other with farm and building projects, to support each other as their families enlarged, to celebrate life's milestones together and to uphold each other through the hardships and griefs of life.

At various times there was a Sunday School, a Vacation Bible School, a Church Ladies' Group, a church sponsored teen group -Young Peoples' Group, ball games, skating parties and many conversations as folks gathered in the local stores. A yearly event looked forward to was the Annual Sunday School Picnic – for many years this involved a crowd of children and adults driven on the back of a pickup truck(s) to Lake William or Springfield Lake where there would be relays and games, swimming and picnic foods!

Many of these buildings and gatherings are no longer, but there is still a pride in the community and a desire to continue to build community with both longtime residents and those new to the area.

Marjorie (Snyder) and Donnie Russell who have lived most of their lives in the area, spoke to me about the energy and community spirit of the **Fire Department**. It was established in 1952 which makes this a 70th Anniversary Year! It has benefitted from the dedication of many volunteers over the years and serves Simpson's Corner, Hemford, Nineveh and Colpton. Along with the much needed work of fighting fires and serving as medical first responders,



there are social gatherings and fundraisers - suppers, card parties, bingo, penny auctions.

Jolene Mailman has worked tirelessly with a team from the community to establish the Garber Family **Community Playground.** It's in the centre of the community and is a great place for parents to bring their children to play. There are plans to add a few things that will appeal to older youth. On **July 23rd Noon to 4pm**, there will be a **Summer Break Party.** All are welcome to join them for some organized games for all ages, face painting, bouncy castle, hot dogs, cotton candy, sounds like fun. Right next to the playground is **Emmanuel United Church** which has been in the community since 1886. Ron Freeman, a former organist there, tells us they meet for two services monthly (1st & 3rd Sundays 9:30am). They also support community projects including the area Food Bank, the School Breakfast Program, Meals on Wheels. Hemford has a rich and interesting history. If you're new to the area (or even if you're not) reach out to meet your neighbours, drop in at community events, listen to the stories and

tell yours. We all benefit as we get to know each other and as we find ways to work together.

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
Community Café


What's at the Museum?

rim of a wagon wheel. Freeland Minard, who used this wheel, operated a Blacksmith Shop across from Mader's Store in Barss Corner in 1909. In one year Mr. Minard serviced 103 pairs of oxen. He then bought spokes and other wood and fit the metal rims, fashioned at his

forge and anvil to be used in wagon work.

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Introducing Newcomers Tikvah and Tyler

Looking at our community through the eyes of newcomers can remind us to appreciate the things we already have. Listening to their observations and ideas, can make us excited about the things yet to come.

Some people look at boulders and see heavy, immovable obstacles. Tikvah Mindorff looks at boulders and sees beauty. "There are boulders here that are taller than me," she exclaims. "This is like a provincial park!"

She's referring to the 20-acre former tree farm she and partner Tyler Simpson purchased in Simpson's Corner last July. (The name is a happy coincidence.) The couple moved from south-eastern Ontario to create an off-grid sustainable farm and butcher shop, and escape the trappings of consumerism. "You go to work to make money and you go home to spend money. That's it. That's all you do," Tikvah says. "But here we realized so many people in Nova Scotia don't have to live within those confines."

And that's just one of many differences she's noticed. The couple expected to find "a smaller version of Ontario," but discovered a much different place and pace of life. People are "more reasonable," she adds. "Even at work, people

are allowed to be sick, they're allowed to have family stuff come up, they're allowed to not come in if the roads are too dangerous to drive on in the winter. That's not a thing in Ontario."

"We came with our Ontario assumptions that we're going to have to hussle really hard to make anything happen, but it's easier to live here."

As we walk nearly two kilometres of logging road to reach their property, Tikvah hopes I won't be disappointed by what they've accomplished to date. On the contrary. In only 10 months, the couple built a barn, removed many boulders from the road, dug ditches to improve drainage, constructed a goat pen from scrap materials, planted a perennial food garden and started work on a duck pen and pond - all by hand. Tikvah is also in the process of digging a five-foot-deep hole using only a crowbar and a mixing bowl. She's making a Nordic spa - a concrete hot tub that will be heated by wood fire.

The couple did all this and more without electricity, living in a camper and hauling supplies by sled or ATV. They also work other jobs. Tikvah does bookkeeping and office work at DeLong Farms, and operates a small business helping farmers adapt their accounting to incorporate online sales. She also manages social media accounts to share their experiences developing "Duskwood Farm," including a blog and podcast called "2 Kids Off Grid."

Tyler works as a cooper at Ross Farm Museum, where he's learned to make barrels, snowshoes, buckets and maple syrup using traditional techniques. He previously worked as a carpenter and learned butchering skills working seven years at his parents' butcher shop and smokehouse in Kentville, Ontario. They gave him all their equipment when they retired. It's ideal for off-grid use.

It's the variety that excites Tikvah about their new life. "Farmers get to do so many different things. There are not many jobs that enable you to do that," she says, noting she admires farmers for their passion, work ethic, and creative problem solving. "We just want to hang out with farmers. That's all we want to do."

Tikvah admits meeting locals has been challenging, but she's grateful to neighbours Nancy and Garnet Veinot for their kindness and hospitality. "They sort of adopted us," she says. Tikvah and Tyler also befriended other like-minded New Germany-area newcomers. "What a coincidence that we're all so similar, and we found ourselves here, but we're from all over the country."

The group has begun talking about how to use their diverse skills to enhance community resilience. "With climate change, if things get worse and supply chains are further disrupted, then working together is in each of our self-interest. And if we do it now when everything is still kind of functional, then we'll already have a framework that is ready."

Tikvah predicts the current in-migration of young people to Nova Scotia will someday "be seen as a social phenomenon in Canadian history." Although Nova Scotia's pace of life and environmental priorities, such as curbside composting, came as a surprise, they quickly made them feel at home. "We didn't know any of this before. We come here and we're like, 'we belong in this province.'"

New Germany & Area Medical Centre Association

The Board of Directors for the Medical Centre are responsible for the upkeep of the building and grounds. Plowing and salting in the winter; mowing in the summer. In addition, the Board pays for power, phone services, taxes, cleaning and insurance, while maintaining heating and cooling systems.

The Board regularly inspects the building and grounds noting areas that need improvement or repair. Last year two new windows were installed in the Centre, in rooms without natural light, and the exterior of the building was painted. During the coming months some areas of the interior will be painted.

Although the building itself is the priority for the Board, its members are also looking for ways to promote the Medical Centre and the New Germany area. We are hopeful to have a foot care specialist at the Centre on a regular basis and to increase the number of medical practitioners by working with recruiters with Nova Scotia Health.

The Board meetings are on the first Tuesday of the month and we welcome new members at any time. We were sorry to have **Wilfred Hull** retire from the Board after many years of service to the Centre and we want to say a huge "thank you" to him for his many years of volunteering.

Memorial donations provide some of the funding for the Board and we were also saddened to have **Vivian Meisner** retire this year. Vivian has been

taking donations for the Centre since 1993 and she deserves a huge "thank you". If residents wish to make a regular or memorial donation to the Centre, they can mail it to Box 128, New Germany, or drop it off at 4923 Hwy 10, where the treasurer, Deb Featherby will be pleased to accept your donation on behalf of the Board.

The Board would like to thank all those in the community who supported our "Two Grand in the Hand" fundraiser and who continue to support the Centre through their donations.

River Ridge Common News

The second phase of singletrack trail development should open entirely sometime in the first week of June, completing a ten-kilometre network of dirt trails for all season use by walkers, runners, hikers, mountain bikers and snowshoers, in addition to the existing easy gravel trails throughout the park. Watch for new and updated signs and maps throughout the park to show the way as the new trails open up to the public.

Mountain Bike Atlantic added River Ridge Common as a featured Nova Scotia riding area on their website at mtbatlanti.com. Check out the site for a short professional video of the park's highlights, including some great drone footage.

The Off-Highway Vehicle parking and picnic area, next to the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail, is next on the list for development. Work on this site will start this summer and will feature a new picnic spot and edible forest planted fringe. MODL is also currently working on a design to add more parking facilities to RRC.

Some students and teachers from New Germany Rural High recently had spirit day activities in the park, hitting the trails on the school's new mountain bikes. There are plans to keep local students involved at RRC, including group mountain bike rides and volunteer trail building activities.

The playground area washrooms are now open for the warmer seasons.
