

### Parkdale-Maplewood Community Museum Celebrates 70 Years

The Museum was founded by Thomas I Spidell II (1873 – 1963)



Thomas loved to read and often wrote for the Bridgewater Bulletin. He was known locally as "Uncle Tom" and travelled to different parts of the world collecting unique curios. Every summer when he & his family visited Maplewood, he would bring part of his collection. His daughter used to say their car was so full of "stuff" they hardly had room for luggage.

Once a year a Field Day was held, Uncle Tom was allotted a room in the barn to exhibit his collection. In 1953 he said if the community would raise money to put up a building for a museum, he would donate part of his collection. They raised \$300

and put up the building which now belongs to the 4-H Club.

The museum has evolved to include the Maccabee Hall, the Lloyd & Muriel Room, Aunt Dinah's Gift Shop & Tea Room, washrooms, storage & office space.

It was his dream to see the fulfillment of a Community Museum. We think he would be proud.

The museum hours are: Tuesday to Friday 9:00 5:00 pm, Saturday & Sunday by appointment. Closed Mondays.

# Connecting in our Communities - An Afternoon in Walden

Up until 2009, I visited Walden at least monthly to worship with the small group of Anglicans there. This congregation and a congregation of Lutherans had at first met in the Walden school and when the school was closed in the mid 1960's, they bought the church and shared it. It was, like the school it was before, one of the community gathering places, until with declining numbers the decision was made to close it.

On a Wednesday afternoon a few weeks ago, I headed to Walden again to talk with a few residents about some of their impressions 'then and now'. It's a quiet road through the community these days, but for much of the  $20^{th}$  century it was a different picture.



A school photo from 1910 class at Walden School indicated a very large class with a single teacher in a single room. In the 50's and 60's there'd have been 20-30 students, but in 2023, there are two school age students, whose parents drive them to Mahone Bay school, since no school bus travels through Walden. Teachers in those one room schools were a brave and energetic lot. Along with the daily challenge of teaching 30 students ages 5-16, there is the legend of one teacher successfully taking the whole school on a year-end outing to Indian Falls. Imagine what the parents, not to mention the insurance company, would say about that now. The school was also a place where the community gathered for such

things as pie sales, Christmas concerts, church services and even funerals.

There was a store which was another community hub. In Stuart Nauss' General Store, he and his wife, Laura, sold all the basic food staples for humans and animals, farm essentials, as well as operated a gas station, the post office, probably one of the first telephones. The first TVs in Walden were mostly purchased at that store where many people kept a running tab, paid it off when they had the money, and started again. The store was a popular gathering spot where news was exchanged, plans made, help offered, cards played. Stuart was known as a very generous man. Children seemed to prefer to buy ice-cream when Stuart was dipping rather than Laura. Stuart was generous as well with his land. His pastures and fields near the school were used as 'playground' areas and as long as they were respectful, young and old were welcome to travel over his land to skate, swim, fish and boat in nearby Sherbrooke Lake. Today the lakeshore in Walden is being enjoyed by many cottage owners and a number of full time residents.

Amazon wasn't a thing in those early days of Walden, but there were catalogues from Eaton's and Simpson's where you could order almost anything you could imagine to be delivered for you to pick up at Nauss' Store. Walden was on the circuit for a grocery truck, a meat man and a fish peddler at various times. One peddler, I'm told, was willing to swap freshly snared rabbits for fresh fish. Residents also travelled to New Germany which bustled with grocery, meat, clothing, feed stores and even a theatre!

It was forestry that brought settlers to Walden. In the late 19<sup>th</sup> century and well into the 20<sup>th</sup> century lumber companies expanded into the abundant forests of Lunenburg County, names like the Davison Lumber Company, Hollis & Whitney, Scott Paper and Bowaters. Many men worked for these companies and as harvesting expanded inland, they bought land and established small farms and brought their families to the growing community. Today some small scale forestry continues as well as Christmas tree farms. Walden was well known for many years as a place to pick blueberries. When the wood was cut off an area, it often became a great place for blueberries to grow. Most local farmers would burn sections of their farm land each year and the following year the blueberries would be abundant. Berries were sold locally, delivered to local markets, sold to grocery stores in the city and enjoyed at every family table. Many students found summer employment raking and/or cleaning the berries for sale. It was always a treat for me when I went to Walden for summer church services and found a box or two of blueberries had been quietly put into my car.

Today, Walden has a combination of life-long residents and people who had moved away for work and have returned to Walden to enjoy the privacy, quiet and the natural surroundings. Others have returned to enjoy a community where people still gather in their homes and backyards, to enjoy a visit, some games and perhaps an impromptu barbecue or potluck. Local residents here say they are still welcome to

drop in unannounced to visit friends. New residents will often receive a 'welcome to the community' visit as a first step to establishing new friendships. Most folks here seem to be friendly and welcoming.

The best (and perhaps only) community gathering place is the Fire Department. In the early 1990's local homeowners in the Walden received letters from their insurance companies letting them know they would no longer be eligible for insurance because they were so far from a fire station. The concerned community came together! Their solution was to start the Walden Volunteer Fire Department (1991). In




short order, land was donated, funds were raised for a hall and equipment, the Fire Hall was built, co-operation was established with neighbouring departments and the community is now well protected with a team of local volunteers. Currently there are about 20 active firefighters and almost everyone in the community supports their activities and fundraisers. New members are always welcome – just talk to any member or check in at their monthly meeting.

The Fire Hall also provides a venue for community gatherings: card parties, darts, bingo and special family celebrations such as anniversaries, birthdays, receptions. A film crew from CTV visited the Fire Hall some years ago to name their 'Maritimer of the Week'! Curious about that - ask a Walden resident.

And last, but certainly not least, there is an outstanding event unique to Walden. You may want to mark your calendar. On the Sat-

urday of the Labour Day Weekend, the building and yard around the Walden Fire Dept is hopping from mid-afternoon to midnight with the Walden Bash! Long time residents, people new to the area, summer residents and folks from far and wide flock to Walden on that day. There's a gigantic yard sale, a mountain of baked goods, merchandise bingo, garden party games of skill and chance for all ages, raffles, lots of musical entertainment, a wide variety of food with fish and chips being their specialty item. The Walden Bash is a terrific example of what a small community can accomplish when everyone works together.


Bruce Veinotte was recognized for his 50 years of service with Northfield District Fire Department in December 2022.

"Over the years Bruce has been on the front line in a number of tragic and traumatic calls with the department. He has been a person who is a stabilizing and compassionate presence at the scene with victims while waiting for rescue or medical care; with families who have experienced a tragedy; with fellow firefighters who have had traumatic experiences. He has been an encouragement and role model to new firefighters. His experience and wisdom has been a great asset in decision making and planning for the future in the department.

Firefighting is a family affair for Bruce. His father, Lester Veinotte, was instrumental in beginning the Northfield District Fire Department and was the first Fire Chief; and Bruce's grandson, Alex, is an active member of the Fire Department. Bruce was newly married when he joined the fire department, and his wife, Heather, has been a strong support in all his commitments as a fire fiahter"

In February New Germany Chief Blair Lantz was presented with a department award by Deputy Chief Jeff Flemming.

#### Project Update from MODL: New Germany Wastewater Inflow and Infiltration Mitigation

As you probably already know, much of the New Germany area is serviced with a sanitary sewer system, including sewer pipes, pumping stations, and the wastewater treatment facility. This sewer system is owned and operated by the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (MODL).

MODL is required to maintain the system in good working order and to make repairs, when necessary, to meet provincial regulations. Over the past decade the New Germany sewer system has been experiencing excessively high flows during rainfall events. These high flows are the result of rainwater leaking into the sewer system.

The sewer system is for wastewater only, not rainwater. Rainwater that leaks into the sewer system can cause many problems, such as overflows of raw sewage to the environment, flooded basements, and costly sewer system upgrades to increase capacity.

MODL has been undertaking a review of the sewer system in New Germany to find and repair leaks. We hired Design Point Engineering & Surveying Ltd to complete this work. To date, minor repairs have been made to the wastewater system.

In the near future, we will be making larger-scale repairs to municipally owned pipes, manholes, and pump stations to prevent unnecessary storm water from entering the sanitary sewer system. At times, this will impact traffic flow on Highway 10, as most of the sewer manholes and pumping stations are within the road right of ways. Safety signage and traffic control measures will be used as necessary to protect the safety of staff and the public.

If these repairs do not result in significant improvements to the high flows experienced during rainfall events, we will need to move to Phase 2. This would involve identifying private property connections that may be contributing storm water to the sanitary sewer system and eliminating these unapproved sources of inflow and infiltration. This can include roof drains, sump pumps, or yard drains.

# Lunenburg County Wheels - How Can We Help?

Our pre-booked, door-to-door service to several New Germany area communities has some good news re: fares. We also want to know "How can we serve you more effectively?"

The good news on fares has two parts. All rides are free in June in your included communities. This has been made possible by financial support from the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (MoDL), which has also made possible to cap all fares (after the free June) to \$7.50 one-way and \$15.00 return for rides over 10 km, with rides *under* 10 km capped at \$5 one way and \$7.50 return. Many thanks to MoDL.

Rides are available within your service area (see the map in the ad in this issue) — or to Bridgewater — Tuesdays and Thursdays daytimes. LC Wheels serves residents over 16 (restrictions apply to riders under 16 and to child car seats). We currently have an 8-passenger bus with a chair lift and a 7-passenger minivan. You can book a ride by calling 902 543-2255 at least 24 hours ahead of the help you need. Your pick-up location and destination both need to be in the overall area served by LC Wheels.

## New Germany Multi-Sport Program

# Introducing the "Noah's Ark" Newcomers

Miniature horses aren't something you see every day, unless you drive by the home of Karen, Richard and David.

The pint-sized equines make me smile every time I see them. I've watched with interest as other horses and sheep came along to share their pasture, and as geese and ducks took up residency around the pond. In case you're also curious about the Barss Corner Road property across from DeLong Farms, I sat down to chat with new owners Karen and Richard Lane and Karen's brother David Shearing.

It was 10 years ago when the three of them moved in together in David's house in a rural community outside of London, Ontario. "I had two heart attacks and we had fallen on hard times," Karen recalls. "We were like stray dogs and my brother took us in."

Five years later, David decided to come to Nova Scotia for vacation. "I just drove around and fell in love with the place," he says. "I was coming up for retirement, but came to the realization that I could not retire and maintain the house in the country where we were living. So I decided I'd like to move here."

All three vacationed in Nova Scotia the following year and Karen and Richard decided they'd also make the move. "So that was the plan," David says. "I told Karen and Richard that everything would be fine unless something crazy happened and the entire world collapsed. The only thing I got wrong was how crazy it really got."

Covid put their plans to sell the Ontario property on hold, but a neighbour mentioned it to a friend, who took a quick look at the house and made an offer that same evening. The move was suddenly back on. "Six weeks later, at five o'clock in the morning, we arrived here. And we've enjoyed every single second since," David says.

The property was purchased sight unseen and they knew nothing about the community. "Our entire experience with this area was that we drove down Highway 10 once going from the Valley to Lunenburg."

The move from Ontario to Nova Scotia involved three vehicles, including a motor home, which housed (get ready for it) seven dogs, eight cats, rabbits and guinea pigs. Karen, Richard and David have since expanded their pet family to include five horses, three sheep, geese, ducks, and chickens. "We already had Noah's Ark, so what's a few more?" Karen jokes.

Although the move started as a path to retirement, all three say they have no plans to retire. Jokes about the cost of feeding and caring for the animals aside, they're happy to keep working so they can keep doing it. Richard does most of the cooking and animal care. "I get home from work and then my work day starts," he says. First is medicine and food for the two epileptic dogs. While supper is cooking, he feeds the other animals. "It's a hectic life, but I love it."

Asked why they keep so many pets, Karen replies simply, "We just like them. We enjoy their company."

Each Friday night, Karen, Richard, and David take a break to enjoy the company of other humans as they meet with friends at the New Germany Legion. David says getting to know people has been easy. "As soon as we moved here, everybody was coming to see us, everyone is totally friendly here."

"People here are from a different planet than Ontario," he adds. "In Ontario, you can walk down the

sidewalk in town and nobody will make eye contact with you. It's a totally different lifestyle here, which is why I fell in love with the place and wanted to move here."

They've talked about possible names for their new property. Richard likes *Lane-Shearing Diner*. David

proposes Covid Acres. But then David notes it already has a name and probably always will. He chuckles. "Where we live is not our house, it's Bill and Becky Flemming's house. Everyone in the county knows where that is."


