# Excitement for the Trail Bridge in New Germany is growing!



The South Shore Annapolis Valley Recreational Trail follows the CN Rail line from New Germany to Bridgetown and New Germany to Colpton, extending 122km, minus the bridge linking the west and the east sides of the LaHave River, which was removed in the early 1990s.

South Shore Annapolis Valley Recreational Trail Association (SSAVRTA) is a non-profit volunteer association, which develops and maintains a safe, accessible trail for ALL users. Currently, trail users are forced to exit the trail to cross the LaHave River travelling on public highway, utilizing the one-lane bridge on the Lower Branch Road. The new trail bridge will eliminate many of these dangers and will present excellent opportunities for active transportation, for students, residents and visiting trail users. When this missing link is in place and the trail crosses the river, it will maximize the well-being of the local students, pedestrians, OHV operators, bicyclists and every trail user as they will have a safer (and legal) way to travel. We will become a safer community for everyone!

Baxter Bridges is building the bridge off site. Construction has begun on the 80,000-pound, 220-foot-long bridge. The goal is to have this bridge in place and open for use in Autumn 2021.

Stores at New Germany and Barss Corners New Germany Invites More Industries. Call Board of Trade In 1946, while advertising for his stores in New Germany and Barss Corner, Fred C. deLong included a list of some the local businesses, services and organizations in the community at that time. It is an interesting list including the Royal Bank of Canada. While we still have some of these services, the people have changed and many of the organizations have closed or moved.

Of the businesses listed the Post Office would be the oldest (if you consider the Post Office a business and not a public service). "The Post Office operated as Chesley's Corner or Chesley's Corners as early as 1855, becoming New Germany "B" on November 1, 1901." (New Germany Connections November 2017 from C. Lloyd Tancock).

The Royal Bank of Canada is then the second oldest business to ply their trade in the New Germany area. Open for more than 100 years, RBC has a long history in this area, all of it ending this summer.

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## From the Tipert Building to the Cement Plant...

#### ~Reflections collected by Glen Veinot

The first Royal Bank was the anchor tenant for the new Tipert Building in April 1917. New Germany grew with the robust Zwicker Mill and the Pulp Mill so the bank easily outgrew its first location. It moved to the Verge Building in 1941 after a bit of a delay which was caused by the vault construction being complicated. The Verge Building also contained the York Theatre and store. The Verge building became the Fielding and Wynn building when the advent of television forced the Theatre to close. The Royal Bank continued to serve New Germany on the right side of the



Fielding and Wynn building. At this location there was the shocking death of the manager upstairs in his apartment and one robbery.

New Germany grew even more in the '70s as Michelin brought good jobs to the area and again the bank needed to expand. A deed was pulled in 1978 and the Royal Bank bought the property the former Fielding and Wynn Cement Plant sat on. The move meant better off street parking and a larger interior. Fred Van Iderstine was the manager during the move and welcomed the community to this beautiful new facility. Sadly this is all coming to an end this summer.

As a teen I used to look forward to going into the bank with my paper route and Christmas tree money. Donna, Gloria, Shirley and Fred always made me feel important and welcome regardless of how small the deposit or withdrawal was. One funny story, in Sept 1984 I sold my motorcycle for \$1600. After work at Matt Wright's tree yard, my coworker Vincent went to the bank and withdrew \$1600 in cash, paid me, and took the bike. I then went over to the bank to deposit it. I remember either Donna or Gloria looking at me and laughing saying did that stack of cash just come from Vincent? When I said yes, they laughed and said if we came in together we could have done it all in one transaction and no need for any cash.

As for the site looking back, Freeman's operated a store there, then a cement plant, and then Fielding and Wynn took over the cement plant and expanded it. The cement plant produced small cement made materials like cement crocks. The Royal Bank building will go up for sale, its next use is yet to be written. *With thanks to John Feindel, Rosemary Rafuse , Janet Tipert, Lloyd Varner, Donna and Trina Rhodenhizer*

# Reconnecting with the Tattrie Family

#### PEACE BY CHOCOLATE – The Book by Jon Tattrie

The true story of a Syrian family who lost their home and chocolate factory in the war, then rebuilt it all in rural Canada. And **a Connection to New Germany**! Read on!



Isam Hadhad grew up in the midst of a large supportive family and community in Damascus in the 60's and 70's, studied engineering, and completed his required military service. In the 80's he began to follow his dream to make chocolate. His family and his business grew over the next twenty years as did the political unrest in Syria. In the devastation, they lost their home, factory, savings, some family members and were forced to flee to Lebanon and live as refugees.

After almost three difficult years there was a glimmer of hope that the family may be accepted as immigrants to Canada. Just before Christmas in 2015, Tareq Hadhad was among 214 Syrians greeted at Toronto's airport by Canada's Governor General, David Johnston. Two days later, Tareq flew to Halifax where he was met by a group of 20

people from Antigonish who had been preparing to welcome their first Syrian family. The rest of the Hadhad family followed two weeks later.

*Peace by Chocolate* is the story of a remarkable family rebuilding their life and the remarkable community who welcomed them. The people of Antigonish show what the best of Nova Scotia can look like today. They call it ABC – Antigonish By Choice. They love people who love their community and make it better, whether they trace their roots back 10,000 years or ten months. Similarly, here in New Germany we like to welcome HBC's – Here By Choice.

Jon Tattrie had followed the Hadhad story from the day Tareq arrived. As he got to know the family, trust developed and they shared their vulnerable, deeply personal story. It is a powerful story of joy, hope and new beginnings after so much sorrow and loss. Tima Kurdi, author of *The Boy on the Beach*, says *Peace by Chocolate* will open your heart and mind and move you to reach out to people in need.

**The New Germany Connection?** The author, **Jon Tattrie**, wrote this touching note when I asked him how he perceives the area and his connections to it.

"Well, Cathy, I'm going to have to break the fourth wall here and say how important you and your family have been to me! My father, Jack, was the Anglican priest in New Germany(1972-77) when I was born and I spent just six months there before moving to Halifax as a baby. We (mother Gail, brother Scott, sister Heidi) moved every few years, so no one place in Nova Scotia feels like home. Except for New Germany!

My parents wisely asked you and Foard to be my godparents, and you kindly agreed. To me, that made you family. You and Foard were an aunt and uncle, and your children our cousins.

And New Germany will always be my hometown." Jon works as a journalist for CBC News in Halifax; his writing has been published in the Chronicle Herald, Globe and Mail, Canadian Geographic, Saltscapes, and Progress Magazine; and he has appeared on numerous radio and television programs. His books have drawn attention to some of the fascinating and important Nova Scotia history that's not been well known. His non-fiction books include *The Hermit of Africville; Cornwallis: the Violent Birth of Halifax*; and *Daniel Paul: Mi'kmaw Elder*, and he

has also written two novels; Black Snow and Limerence.

You may wonder about the rest of the family - Scott, who also joined the family in

New Germany, lives and works at L'Arche in Wolfville; Heidi, for several years wrote a blog for families with young children and works in marketing at Nevermore Press. She and her husband Ed, have two children, Madeleine, 9 and Max, 7. Jack has now retired after many years as a much loved parish priest and hospital chaplain. Gail, who helped organize New Germany's Co-Op Nursery School (you may remember it at the Legion Hall first with Ferne Selig and then 'Teacher Gloria') has also retired after a number of years working with youth and then libraries in HRM. Grandparenting is their favorite role these days and they still do make the occasional visit to St John-in-the-Wilderness, New Germany.

#### **District of Lunenburg Hikers Challenge**

The Hikers Challenge is all about inspiring, motivating and rewarding you - especially new and novice hikers - for getting outdoors on the District of Lunenburg's beautiful trails to start hiking or to hike more often.

We have partnered with Hike Nova Scotia and Lunenburg County Hikers, to commission a special designed badge as a reward for completing this fun challenge.

To qualify for this badge, choose three hikes from the below list of five to complete in one year. Customize your challenge with a total distance from 11 km to 20 km. Throughout this challenge, discover and explore the District of Lunenburg's spectacular scenery including: ocean vistas, river falls, ocean and river lookouts, calm ocean basins and lush forests. You will find hiking trails that suit all levels of skill and ability to enjoy.

#### 1.Gaff Point Hike ~ 8km

Start from Hirtle's Beach (from parking lot turn right) which is off Hirtle's Beach Road in Upper Kingsburg. Gaff Point and Hirtle's Beach Hike is a loop trail that features a great forest setting with spectacular ocean views and is good for all skill levels. Dogs are also able to use this trail but must be kept on leash. In 2002, the 124-acre property was designated as a **protected** coastline and wilderness **area** with the Nature Conservancy of Canada.

#### 2. Indian Path Commons Hike ~ 6km

Start from Indian Path Commons parking lot off the Fish Peddler Road, East LaHave. Indian Path Commons Hike is an out and back trail which features a lake and elevated look offs and is good for all skill levels. The trail offers several loop routes for you to choose from. Dogs are also able to use this trail but must be kept on leash.

#### 3. Dynamite Trail Hike from Martins River to Narrows Bridge ~ 4km or more

Start from the Dynamite trail parking lot off Station Road (across from Martins River Fire Department). Martins River to Narrows Bridge is an out and back hike through a forest of pine trees which leads to the Narrows Basin with a bridge over a sheltered ocean inlet; a nice place to stop to take a deep breath of the fresh coastal breeze.

4. River Ridge Common Hike ~ 3km or more Start from the River Ridge Common parking lot off Highway 10 in Pinehurst. River Ridge Common Hike is a loop hike through wooded forest and a waterfall trail. River Ridge Common also has a natural playground, single track mountain biking trails and connects with the South Shore Annapolis Valley.

#### 5.Lahave River Trail Hike ~ 5km or more

Start from the Arthur Young Trail parking lot, off Highway 10 beside Best Western Plus, Cookville. The LaHave River Trail Hike is an out and back hike which follows along the LaHave River Trail with its riverbank water views. Enjoy a rest at the lookoff along the Arthur Young Trail.

# Introducing Newcomers

The joy of rivers and old chickens

"Do not forget to entertain strangers, For by so doing some people have Entertained angels without knowing it." - Hebrews 13.2

This passage greeted visitors at the Community Café in February. Placed on green doilies, alongside

angel figurines, the slips of paper captured the welcoming spirit of these Thursday morning gatherings, and provided an ideal opening for a new feature dedicated to introducing newcomers.

I went to the Community Café in search of strangers, while being a stranger myself. To be honest, I expected to find a small gathering of mature ladies, huddled close, sharing local gossip, while a few awkward newbies orbited the group. Instead, I found the Anglican



Church hall abuzz with the exuberant conversations of about 30 people seated in groups of four or five around well-spaced tables. It only takes one person to reach out and open the door to new friendships. Madelyn Bowers was my person. She promptly introduced me to my first newcomer.

#### For the love of nature

What makes Denise Stoll most happy about her new home? "The river," she replies without hesitation. Denise and husband Blaine spent their entire lives in Saskatchewan. Now retired, they're spending their first Nova Scotia winter on Gully River in Barss Corner.

Rivers are often used as a metaphor for life – rejuvenation and renewal, constant and sometimes dramatic change, connection to the past and the rhythms of nature. Denise touched on all of these more literally during our chat.

She fell in love with Nova Scotia and the New Germany area while visiting her daughter and three summers spent house sitting in Simpsons Corner. The friends she made there inspired an appreciation for community roots that run deep. Denise delights in listening to her new friends recount distant past events and people with vivid detail. "In Saskatchewan, you'll never find such a thing as a 200-year-old home, let alone a family history that has been there just as long," she says, noting the younger province has a "newer culture" where neighbours interact less and don't look out for one another in the same way.

Denise says she's grateful for their new, "wonderful neighbours," as well as Nova Scotia's fewer Covid-19 cases and milder winters. She also enjoys quick access to both the Fundy and Atlantic coasts. But the conversation never strayed long from her love of nature. "The river, lakes, and trees, I get them all in my back yard. And they're all so pristine." Blaine would be content just about anywhere, she adds, but the New Germany area "fits me."

#### A retirement home for chickens

Marielle Troke rescues chickens that have passed prime egg production. These are very fortunate birds. As a Clinical Social Worker, Marielle's career took her into a range of mental health disciplines, including addictions, sexual abuse, and domestic violence, all from a feminist approach. Trust me when I say she brings this same compassion to caring for aging chickens.

Marielle bought her house in Barss Corner this past October. It was both a new start and the return to a familiar community.

"A gypsy at heart," Marielle was raised in Ontario and spent 30 years in Alberta. In her 50s, she moved to Salt Spring Island, BC. Eight years later, she pared her belongings down to what fit inside her Honda Civic and moved to Cherryfield to create an "intentional community" with friends. Unfortunately, the group's great ideas didn't translate into a workable plan, so she moved to Canning, and then briefly returned to Salt Spring Island before settling back in the New Germany area.

"There's an old saying on Salt Spring Island: 'When you're done doing your healing, it kicks you off.'"

Part of Marielle's healing journey involved a serious health issue 15 years ago that made her "sit back and reflect on what is most important." But that's just one of many interesting snapshots. We talked about her return to school in her 40s to get a Masters degree, while juggling the demands of single motherhood. We touched briefly on her experience participating in indigenous ceremonies, and her dream of shaping a supportive, sustainable co-housing situation. I marvelled at her humble wisdom and found the entire conversation fascinating. But it's the darn chickens she insisted I write about.



Marielle is eager to provide a retirement home to more of them, some of which she has convinced me to adopt.

I intended to write about three newcomers, myself included. But my story will have to wait. Something much better happened during my first visit to the Community Café – by entertaining two strangers, I was thoroughly entertained. I also have to tell my husband we're expecting additions to the family and he needs to build a coop.
