New Germany Trail Bridge

On November 16, 2021 the New Germany Trail Bridge was lifted, by two cranes, in place across the LaHave River where the train bridge crossed the river. It was very exciting to watch and equally exciting to have this infrastructure in our community. David Whynott, Project Leader, answers some questions about the bridge.

Whose project is this? South Shore Annapolis Valley Recreational Trail Association (SSAVRTA).

Who owns the bridge? The Province owns the trail bridge but the SSAVRTA manages the bridge through a letter of authority.

Estimated Cost? \$500,000 plus. Some of the major expenditure were associated with materials. Examples: 90,000 lbs. of steel at almost a dollar per pound, two layers of treated decking, engineers, surveyors, contractors and the bridge builders.

How long was the project planned? This

basically started in 2018 with a preliminary bridge assessment by an Engineer who supplied info regarding what was there originally and some of the best options for replacement. A team was created in 2019 to focus on what the replacement should be and what the justification would be required to get funding for a fairly large undertaking. The team consisted of MODL, TIR, DNR, ATVANS, an engineer and several SSAVRTA members. In the end it was decided the bridge replacement would allow a safer mean for all trail users, instead of using the Lower Branch Road and one lane bridge to make the connectivity. It would also allow a legal connection for the OHV (Off Highway Vehicle) community.



Who were the partners in the project? There were many partners, the financial part was basically covered by the federal, provincial and municipal governments, however, the community and local trail clubs also contributed what they could in terms of financial support and a huge moral support throughout the entire process.

Info about bridge such as size, length and what vehicles can use it. Who built it? The bridge is a truss style bridge, 220 feet long x 8 feet wide x 10 feet high. The only vehicles allowed on bridge would be Off Highway Vehicles sharing the bridge with all other trail users, walkers, bicycles and baby carriages. Not allowed would be trucks, cars, vans and motorcycles. The bridge builder was Baxter Bridges and Trails, Amherst Nova Scotia. The bridge build started early January 2020 and was completed November 30, 2021. Landowner permission to open the bridge happened on December 30, 2021.

Quotes and comment to myself as the Project Leader have all been positive regarding safety for all trail users, legal connectivity for OHV

and a wonderful asset for the community. This

project was well overdue and to date there have been no negative repercussions.

There were 328 volunteer recorded hours on this project, landowner discussions, trail clearing, crane pads constructed and sign placement. There was also discussion on a spring 2022 clean up and fix up of both ends of the bridge, maybe a few benches and tables making it into a park like setting.

River Ridge Common News

River Ridge Common park is getting ready to leap into the change of seasons, with some exciting new facilities slated for opening in Spring 2022.


The second phase of singletrack trail development is expected to open in the next few months, completing a ten-kilometre network of dirt trails for all-season use by walkers, runners, hikers, mountain bikers and snowshoers, in addition to the existing easy gravel travels throughout the park. As the snow and ice melt away, keep an eye out for a few of the new trails that are already open, with the rest being opened in stages as they are completed. There will also be some helpful new maps and updated signage to show the way before the entire new trail system is opened up to the public.

The Off-Highway Vehicle parking and picnic area, next to the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail, is on the list for development in the near future. This site will feature new picnic spots and an edible forest planted fringe. The Municipality is also currently working on a design to add more parking spaces.



Working with New Germany Rural High School, plans are also underway to keep local students involved at River Ridge Common, including

group mountain bike rides and volunteer trail building activities.



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
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
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Livewires 4H

bring!




We're back.

New Germany Rural High School News

As we reach the mid-point of our year here at NGRHS and with COVID restrictions soon being lifted, there is an aurora around the school as to what our new "normal" will be and what kind of fun we can have as a collective group of SAINTS.

Over the last couple of months we have some very noteworthy programs and initiatives going on here at NGRHS. In November, we had two male staff members attend a Mo Green, retired Youth Health Coordinator, seminar and then later present a two-day workshop on the theme of toxic masculinity to our Grade 9 boys. He has worked with teenagers for 35 years across a wide range of youth health issues, including injury prevention, alcohol misuse, physical activity and healthy eating. This workshop was very well received by the group of young gentlemen. As a staff we are challenging unacceptable behaviour in a reflective and restorative manner, which allows for learning in the fullness of time.

Grade 7s took part in the HEADSTRONG Program, which is a youth leadership initiative to champion mental wellness. Focusing on resilience, recovery and positive social action, HEADSTRONG's mission is to equip and inspire young people to Be Brave, Reach Out, and Speak Up about mental health. Staff members Chris Wentzell, Erin Seamone and our Interagency team Alex Acton-Bond, Cicley Smith, and Rebecca Guest completed a three-day workshop with our Grade 7s.

Erin Seamone also facilitated HRY (Healthy Relationships for Youth). Liz McCurdy at Second Story Women's Centre in Lunenburg provided training to Erin and three NGRHS students to become peer mentors.

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Award for Innovation

~Interview by Carol Knell

A creative Jill-of-all-trades with a background in education, non-profits and communication, is how Julie Veinot describes herself.

I had the pleasure of meeting up with Julie for coffee and lunch, on a cold snowy afternoon recently to discuss an award she received for innovative work in her role as Executive Director for South Shore Sexual Health. I had read the article about an award that she received and I thought that it would be very interesting to meet with Julie and hear about her work and award.

I have known Julie for close to 20 years, but other than her love of cats, books and photography, I really did not know her very well. It was great to talk to her and learn about her and her work and why she loves it so much.

Julie was born and raised in New Germany, attending New Germany

Elementary and High School. She went off to UPEI, Holland College and then Acadia to further her education, with the hopes of being able to stay and work in the community she loves and calls home. Julie studied journalism in PEI and then obtained her Bachelor's degree in English and History before she went on and completed her Masters in Literature and Letters. She then completed her Bachelor of Education in teaching.

Julie now resides in Barss Corner with family, her cats, books and love of coffee, chocolate and the outdoors. She says that being able to see the deer outside your home, the fresh air, green spaces and places to swim is what it is all about. She describes herself as a homebody and was always mindful of finding and developing her skills to enable her to remain near to home on the South Shore.

Julie loves to work at a non-profit because the focus is not on "making money" but helping people and contributing to the community. Her love of what she does is very evident as she talked to me and shared about what she does and how much it helps people.

Working as a wreath maker, substitute teacher, blueberry picker, journalist, radio ad writer and photographer are all jobs that helped to make her the person she is today and doing the work she loves. Being a part of the community is very important to Julie and it is very evident when you get a chance to sit and talk with her.

Working as a supply teacher in local schools, she taught English, Social Sciences and worked in the Resource/Learning Centre. All of this has proven helpful in her present position with the South Shore Sexual Health Centre. Julie very strongly believes in "Inclusive Education" for all. That philosophy is of the utmost importance in her current position, where she supports youth and adults daily to ensure pro-choice and support healthy sexuality. Tie that belief in with her experience, and it is no surprise that she won an award this past December for a special project she spearheaded and brought to fruition.

I can remember a few years ago, participating in the Health Fair at New Germany Regional High School and hearing the students talking about "the condom lady" yes, Julie had free condoms for the students. Although she said most were used as balloons, the kids had fun while learning.

That is only a very small part of what she does in her role as Executive Director South Shore Sexual Health, a job she has had for almost 8 years.

South Shore Sexual Health is open to all ages, but the focus does lean towards pre-teens, teens and young adults. At Acadia Julie studied feminist "stuff" and "queer theory" all of this is very advantageous in her role at the center. Also, while at university, she worked with the Second Story Woman's Centre and Planned Parenthood. It appears that she was always headed in the direction to where she now finds herself.

It is never too late to learn but Julie feels it is very important to target the young and start the education before it is needed. Prior to the pandemic, she did get out to a lot of schools to do presentations. She was like a one-woman traveling road show. This is something that she hopes to get back to when it is safe to do so. Both Grade 7 and 8 kids have lots of questions and need good basic information. There is a plethora of information on the Centre's website that is both useful and educational, but not over the top.



Julie has done extensive research into current best practices on gender diversity. As a result she identified a need for a supportive, accepting environment in which transgender youth, teens and adults can get supplies and support as they navigate the changes that they are going through. Julie identified the need for something for the transgender people of Lunenburg and Queens County and beyond. Previously they would need to order any items required for their transformation online and could not see them or try them. Out of all of this came the idea for the TransFORMATION Closet that started over 2 years ago. The closet offers gender-affirming items to youth and adults for free or a nominal charge. It is all private and confidential. Located in the Centre on Logan Road, the closet has binders, underwear and other items required by youth who need to transition or express their gender identity. They can come in and pick it up or order.

In the first year 32 clients were helped by this project.

This project was recently recognized when Julie and her work won the top award from the **Helen and Fred Bentley Award of Excellence**, which recognizes Sexual Health Innovation and Leadership. With this award came a \$9,000.00 prize. This will be of tremendous help to stock supplies for the closet. Julie says this will allow her to help provide clients with supplies that are needed.

The Helen and Fred Bentley Award is an annual award given out to 3 Sexual Health Programs in Canada. How impressive that one of our own local community members saw the need and acted on it. Then won the top place award. This program is truly inspiring and definitely boundary-pushing as well as needed.

Humbling is how Julie describes receiving this recognition and says that obtaining items that allow people to authentically express their gender can make a big difference in mental health.

Julie enjoys her job and says that the best part is "helping people" whether it is providing information, support, help and/or products. Most of the people who contact her are in a vulnerable situation. She is so grateful to be able to help and hopefully make a small difference in the lives of the people who reach out to her for help or to those who she does presentations to. She also finds it very difficult and at times

frustrating when she is not able to help the clients. She has worked hard to compile a list of resources and knows where to direct people for the help that they are requiring.

A majority of what she knows in this role is self-taught though research and education. She is always learning and growing.

Julie loves that she gets to teach youth and others in Lunenburg and Queens counties about health and well-being. It is very rewarding to give something to someone that meets a need in their life or helps them in a crisis situation.

Julie has certainly found her niche and the people of both counties are very lucky to have her in this role. I certainly learned a lot about not only Sexual Health Education, but Julie as well.





Connecting in our Communities

George Bernard Shaw said, "I am of the opinion that my life belongs to the whole community and as long as I live it is my privilege to do for it whatever I can."



We have people in many of our local communities who seem to be of that same opinion. **Warren and Iris Veinotte** of Newburne certainly fit the description. They were both born in Newburne and could see no reason to live anywhere else. Their ancestors were among Newburne's earliest settlers of European descent who arrived here around 1840. There is a book, Newburne Then and Now, 1837-1987, written by Pauline Veinotte (Iris' mother) which tells much of the rich story of Newburne.

Growing up in this rural community Iris and Warren enjoyed the fields to play ball on, the ponds to skate on, and the trout hole to swim in; they

gathered with their families and neighbours for community, church and Sunday School events; they knew that neighbours helped neighbours, and that the forests, fields, lakes and rivers were essential to life and needed to be responsibly used and protected.

There was a one room school in Newburne which both attended, though when Warren was in what we call the junior high years, his courses were only available 'by correspondence'. Does that sound a bit similar to what our young people have been facing these past two years with 'online learning'? As a young man, Warren tried his hand at various jobs on farms, in the woods, on the highway. When he was just 21, John Mader asked him to consider coming to work at Mader's Store in Barss Corner. He described that as a great job. He was a clerk, delivered groceries to homes, hauled feed and flour (which was sold in 100lb bags) from the train in New Germany, worked as a handyman, builder, mechanic, pretty much a 'jack of all trades' and he felt he had a great boss. It was truly a family business and he became part of the family including having the noon meal with the Mader family almost every day he worked there. He also got to know pretty much everyone who lived within a 20 mile radius of Barss Corner. He retired at 65 in 2001, but makes a visit to the store almost every day 'just for fun'.

Iris attended not only the Newburne school, but also the school at Walden when her mother taught there. After graduating from New Germany Rural High, Iris went to 'Normal College' which then became Teacher's College, and she came back to NGRH and taught for 20+ years. Interestingly some of her years there overlapped with her mother's – and I was a student of both. Did you know that back in the 60's girls (teachers and students) were required to wear skirts. Jeans and dress pants? Forget it! And no high heels!

While they were getting settled into their careers, Iris and Warren got married, built their house (by themselves with help from a few friends) in Newburne, and had a daughter, Karsa, and a son, Chad. These were very busy years in the Veinotte household. Since then the family has grown to include a daughter-in-law, Tracey, son-in-law, David, and two grandchildren, Junqueira and Jensen. Their house, where the community is often welcome, has a few distinctive features including a full wall painted mural

of Indian Falls (Warren's handiwork) and a fine mosaic of Intarsia woodworking (Iris' work) displaying many local animals, birds and trees. Intarsia you ask? "Intarsia uses varied shapes, sizes, and species of wood fitted together to create a mosaic-like picture with an illusion of depth."

In the late 1980's, Warren and Iris had an idea that would enable so many more people to enjoy the beauty and peacefulness of Newburne. They bought a piece of land by the river near their home and set to work developing an area which opened in 1990 as the LaHave River



Campground. At its peak, they had about 35 seasonal campsites, 65 other sites and several slumber huts. There was a store, laundry area, playground with a 40ft slide, mini golf, shuffleboard, basketball net and a blockhouse to play in. There was The Shelter which offered space for many community activities including cards, bingo, dances, potluck meals, contests and competitions and some very creative seasonal celebrations. It was definitely a 'community within a community'! It was sold in 2009, and then again in 2021 (Read about the new owners on pg 15 of the November 2021 issue of NG Connections).

Without the responsibility of the campground Warren had time to delve into some of his other hobbies. After shoulder surgery, he decided that instead of going for physiotherapy sessions he would build a mill. With careful attention to how he moved and lifted the various parts and pieces he thought he could rehabilitate his shoulder. It worked –both the shoulder and the mill. Now he is able to saw logs for many more projects – a workshop and a garage. A current project is building a replica of a Model T. He started with an axle and two wheels. From there it's a matter of ingenuity. Much of the original car was actually wood – his project is generating lots of interest among antique car buffs!

Snow doesn't stop him. Or his neighbours. After a storm you'll find him plowing a large number of driveways for his Newburne neighbours, not charging for his work, but giving them an opportunity to 'pay it forward'.

He's been active in the local Lutheran church congregation since he was a

child and helping out wherever he was needed, singing in the choir, serving on Councils, helping with building projects and serving in the community. If you look on Facebook, you'll hear him often joining his

daughter in her weekly Hymn posts. Iris, also active at St Matthew's, has been known for her children's talk at Sunday services; helped organize the annual Newburne Christmas concert and worked with the all-ages Sunday School. When most area churches were struggling with Sunday Schools closing, Iris felt a call to encourage all our local denominations to work together. What resulted was a Friday after school program at New Germany Elementary called Messy Saints that began in the fall of 2010 and continued at the school until March 2020, and now has resumed with a team producing a video which families can access online. And...if you're wondering who might be building a

few props and teaching aids behind the scenes – you guessed it, Warren!

Iris and Warren are always among the first to welcome new residents to Newburne inviting them to join in community activities. And if there are no community activities to meet a particular need they just might start one. For instance the 'Ladies Afternoon'. More than 15 years ago a few ladies got together in Newburne to watch a movie together. They had a great time and all agreed they should get together more often. Within weeks, Iris had invited them to her home. That began a regular weekly gathering each Monday in January, February and March that lasted until Covid restrictions closed things down in 2020. The group grew up to 20 with women of all ages, both longtime residents and those new to the community. They enjoyed games, skits, contests, discussions, crafts, silliness, cooking demos, snacks, an annual outing (bowling, museum visit, sleigh ride....) and always an elegant Afternoon Tea to end the season.

Iris and Warren have enjoyed their many opportunities for encouraging Newburne to become a connected and caring community; and they've enjoyed and co-operated with the efforts of many others who've worked in so many ways to keep the fires of community spirit ever New- 'burning'.




