Walks @ 6:30

Join several NGAPS members for an early evening walk. 4 walks 4 different routes. Unless noted, the walks are about one hour each.

Thursday **April 21st - Route 1:** Meet at the New Germany Freshmart parking lot (please park in the rear or to the side of the store) and join the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail behind the store. At Caledonia Junction turn left. We will walk for about a half an hour and then return to the Freshmart.

Monday **April 25th - Route 2:** Meet at the New Germany Rural High School parking lot. We will walk down School street meeting the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail where it intersects the Lower Branch Road. We will walk for about a half an hour and then return to the school.

Monday **May 2nd - Route 3:** Meet at the New Germany Freshmart parking lot (please park in the rear or to the side of the store) and join the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail behind the store. We will follow the trail for about a half hour walk then return. On this walk we will travel through River Ridge Common.

Thursday **May 12th - Route 4:** Meet at parking lot at the intersection of Wentzell Road and Highway 10. We will follow the LaHave River trail along the shores of Wentzell Lake to the Rod & Gun Club and then turning to return to the parking lot. I do it because it gives me great pleasure to make other people happy. Besides my family, volunteering is my life.





NGRHS Europe Trip March 2016

Over the past two years students from NGRHS have been planning and preparing for the trip of a lifetime. On March 10th thirty-one students along with thirteen adults boarded a plane for Europe, and an experience that they would never forget.

The first stop was the city of Berlin where students learned of the history of the great city, and saw how it was recreating itself after the horrors of World War 2. They took time to see the Berlin Wall before visiting the concentration camp at Sachsenhausen to better understand the horrors that occurred during the Holocaust. From Berlin we visited the beautiful city of Heidelberg, where we experienced castles and a quaint rural German town.

After Germany they travelled to Paris, the city of lights, which they experienced from high above the city atop the Eiffel Tower, a thrill that students would never forget. After stops at the Arc de Triomphe, Notre Dame and the Louvre, students left the city to go to Vimy Ridge where students paid touching tribute to our soldiers. As a teacher I couldn't have been prouder of the way the students behaved as they walked those hallowed grounds and paid quiet tribute to men and women who sacrificed everything so that they could have experiences such as this.

After an emotional stay in France, the students travelled via the Chunnel to London, where we visited such sites as Buckingham Palace, Tower Bridge, and Westminster Abbey. A trip aboard the London Eye and viewing of The Mousetrap at a West End theatre were highlights of our two days there but like every good thing the trip had to come to an end, and after a heavy eleven days students returned safely to New Germany.

This was a trip of a lifetime and students were able to capture the travel bug as we visited three of the world's great capitals. Hopefully this will be a continuing tradition at New Germany Rural High so that many generations of student can enjoy the rich history and beauty the world has to offer.

<u>Arsenic and Old Lace</u>** by Joseph Kesselring

The NGRHS Drama Club will present **Arsenic and Old Lace** from May 5th to 7th at 7pm, including a Saturday matinee at 2pm in the NGRHS Auditorium, admission \$5 for students, \$7 for adults. Twenty-five students directed by Mike Howlett and Hester Gibson will perform this theatre classic which will delight audiences with the witty dialogue, as well as the twists and turns in the plot. The set is being designed and constructed by Howard Gibson with assistance from various student groups. Rehearsals are intensifying as student actors polish their lines and interactions on stage. Costumes will be chosen and designed by Drama Club members Julia Henderson, Haley Myra, Victoria Penney, Emma Robar, and Jasmine Spidle who are also working as stage managers, lighting technicians, and sound technicians. If you have never watched live theatre, this is the year to make the extra effort to see this production, maybe even more than once. Live theatre is never the same despite always working from the same script.

"In 1941, New Yorkers were looking for some entertainment to take their minds off the war in Europe and the growing fear that America would be pulled into it. On January 10, Broadway gave them exactly what they were looking for in the form of a hilarious new play by Joseph Kesselring, **Arsenic and Old Lace**. The play became an immediate critical and popular success, running for 1,444 performances. It also became a hit in England in 1942 as theatergoers who were suffering through London post-blitz lined up for tickets.

The play, a clever combination of the farcical and the macabre, centers on two elderly sisters who are famous in their Brooklyn neighborhood for their numerous acts of charity. Unfortunately, however, their charity includes poisoning lonely old men who come to their home looking for lodging. The two women are assisted in their crimes by their mentally challenged nephew who believes he is Teddy Roosevelt and who frequently blasts a bugle and yells "charge" as he bounds up the stairs. Matters get complicated when a second nephew, a theater critic, discovers the murders and a third nephew appears after having just escaped from a mental institution. A winter remembered.....

It was a lovely Sunday morning and I chose to strap on my snowshoes rather than attend morning service. I pulled my white fur hat down over my ears, put on a pair of warm mittens and tucked my small Konica camera inside my jacket. I trudged up the hill toward an old homestead. No one lived there then except the memories of hard work and a family with five young children who have now grown old and since passed on. The shades are pulled down and with the heavy blanket of undisturbed snow, the old farm house looks like it is having a long winters' sleep. I stop and marvel at the peacefulness around me. An old wood house set back amid snow laden trees is the first object to be captured on my film. Almost one hundred years ago a young boy would have been filling the wood box from that shed. I walk around the other buildings; a work shop and an outhouse, being careful not to make tracks that would disturb the tranquillity of my photography.

Making my way down the other side of the field the sun breaks through and its warmth makes me realize I've worn too many clothes for such strenuous exercise. I remove my hat and mittens and stuff them inside the hood of my jacket. I think of hot summer days and the family long gone to their eternal rest who

worked those fields with hand tools and manual labour. The simple lives they lived, and I glanced again toward the farm-house and thought of home cooked meals prepared on the wood stove.

At the edge of a connecting field a pile of firewood is almost buried under the snow, but several pieces are peeking out from under a drift which gives the illusion of a mystical creature with only the eyes and nose sticking out. I retrieve my camera from inside my jacket, and in an attempt to capture the best angle on the snow creature, I step on one snow shoe with the other and lose my balance. The snow is deep and my outstretched arms, like missiles, dive into the depths of the soft white stuff. I quickly scramble to retrieve my camera and wipe away the wet before it seeps inside. Having fallen down,



I now see has provided the best angle from which to snap my picture of the snow creature. Mission accomplished, I try to get back in a standing position, which I soon realize is not going to be possible without removing the snow shoes. Having released the bindings, I place my hands on the snow shoes and push myself upright only to sink into the depth of white despair clean towell above my knees. Struggling to pull one leg out of the snow far enough to step unto a snow shoe, I nearly return to sitting in the snow again. However, I am able to get back on the snow shoes and brushing the snow from my mitts I look back from whence I came. The sun causes the snow to glisten like millions of diamonds, and the clean white blanket covering the field is disturbed only by one single pair of snow shoe tracks. I inhale deeply and offer up a short prayer of thanksgiving for this moment in time.

I proceed onward and cross the main road. On the other side, another homestead is visible. This one also vacant for many years, it's inhabitants long gone and for the most part forgotten. The old barn with its shingles and boards blown away on one end is exposing some sheaf's of loose hay. The cattle stalls are still intact, almost as if it's occupants had just been turned out to pasture. Some birds flutter in the loft overhead, scolding me for my intrusion. I turn my attention to the grey old house. I walk around it considering each angle. I take a few pictures thinking they might provide a subject if I ever resume oil painting again. The old outhouse has had it's door blown off and is leaning at a very distinct angle. The snow has swirled around the tiny structure creating a pedestal of snow nearly all the way around. Ummm....another photo opportunity. Advancing closer, I see there are remnants of electrical wiring hanging from the peak and an empty light socket. I recall my husband telling me the folks who lived there had a heater hooked up to the outhouse. They just flipped a switch inside the main house and prewarmed the privy before they ventured out. Probably by the time they put on their boots, coat and grabbed an old Eatons catalogue the small room was quite toasty.

Advancing to the open doorway, I am amazed at the inside finishing. Narrow strips of tongue & groove hardwood cover the inside walls. There is a small hole and a larger one for those more amply endowed. A worn and tattered lace curtain still hangs over the unbroken window, and a decorative paper holder is fastened to the wall conveniently located at your fingertips. I am in awe at the luxury these folks had when answering natures call compared to the unfinished walls and bare floors of the main house.

Glancing at my watch I realize I have been trudging around on snow shoes for over an hour. I move away from the old place and stop once to glance back at the leaning outhouse. "Unbelievable" I say to myself, as I remove my snowshoes and carry them under my arm and make my way back home on the main road.

Union Square School

In 1883 some of the early residents of Union Square met at William Coldwell's Sr. home to make plans to build a school. After several meetings in homes, they were able to meet in the newly constructed school in 1885.

Gideon Langille donated land for the school. The building was built in the same style of most schools of that time period. It consisted of a school room with a cloakroom at the entrance. The wood house on the back of the school room was built many years later. Water was obtained from a well off the property a short distance away. A double outhouse provided a toilet facility.

The first trustees were William Fancy, William Henry Fancy and Ahiah Feindel. W. H. DeLong was the secretary to the Trustees.

A list of ratepayers of 1885 yielded the names of men in the community and hence we find the surnames DeLong, Dunn, Veinot, Ernst, Caldwell, Langille, Feindel, Fancy, Young and Keddy.

In the first years of the school system, the school year was divided into two terms – June to November and December to May. There was no summer break.

The first teachers for the year 1885 were Amanda Drew and Ophelia Trusdell. Thirty-six students were registered for that year from primary to about Grade X (10).

Mrs. Marguerite Seamone was the last school teacher with eighteen students from grades primary to six.

Two former teachers are still living. Mrs. Myrtle (Carver) Taylor taught here for the 1935-36 and 1936-37 school year. Mrs. Lola (Rhodenizer) Conrad taught in the 1947-48 term.


Salaries were very low and were paid from the collection of taxes in the community.

The school housed students from Primary to Grade 12 (although few pupils went beyond Grade 10) until the Rural High School opened in 1954, at which time the Grade 7 and up students were bused to New Germany leaving only Primary to Grade 6 at the Union Square School until its closing in 1965.

On October 10, 2015 the Union Square Community Hall Association hosted a reunion/celebration of the former students of the school and the 50th anniversary of the purchase of the school by the Union Square Youth Group for use as a community hall. Much work has been done and we were pleased to see community members come together. A lot of school and hall records have been compiled. We would be glad to share them with anyone who may be interested.

A Snapshot of Barss Corner History

A glimpse into Barss Corner past came to light this winter in the form of a photo album entitled "A Collection of Photographs Showing Houses In and Around Barss Corner 1992."

Created by John H. Mader, son of Judith Mader of Barss Corner, the collection was prepared in celebration of the 150th anniversary of the Barss Corner Baptist Church. As such it includes maps, photographs and occupant / owner names for the majority of homes and businesses in Barss Corner and the surrounding communities of Stanburne, Union Square, Scarsdale, and Farmington as well as some in New Germany. The colour photographs were taken between 1991 and 1992 and the project was completed by October of 1992.

Although 1992 may not feel like a long ago point in history to many of us, the photographs in the album reveal otherwise. Some points of particular interest are the Barss Corner Recreation Hall and the Union Square Hall; the first is now gone and the latter has recently undergone major upgrades. The prerenovated version of many local homes has also been preserved through these pictures and, in some cases where changes were being made during the 1991-1992 time period, before and after pictures have even been included.

The collection is well worth browsing for anyone interested in our local history. With this in mind, it will be kept at the Barss Corner Baptist Church and available for anyone to look through there.
