New Germany and Area Medical Centre 25th Anniversary

Its hard to believe, but it has been 25 years since the New Germany and Area Medical Centre opened! While it has not always been easy, the Medical Centre is still open, with a doctor and a nurse practitioner working there. Come and help us celebrate this achievement on September 9th between the hours of 1 and 4pm - at the Medical Centre. There will be entertainment, snacks and we hope to have some booths featuring health themes as well.

You may remember that a significant portion of the funding for the building of the Centre came from the sale of bricks. With a donation of \$100, each customer got a brick, with their name engraved on it, cemented in a wall in the waiting room. Over 500 bricks were sold. We still have about 50 bricks left, which we hope to sell before September. The price this year is \$125, which is actually less than the price in 1993, when one considers inflation. (It is eighty "1993" dollars.) These bricks will be mounted prominently in the entry way of the Centre. This is a good gift for a child or grandchild, or to remember a family member.



Reconnecting with the Weiland Family

"Lady, you can have your job!" were the words from the workman who had painted in the hallway outside the Primary classroom on the very first day of school at the almost newly renovated New Germany Elementary School in 1965. He had quietly worked and watched while the teacher coped with the excitement, fears and tears of 34 bewildered Primary students who had arrived on buses from places like Nineveh, Walden, North River and Maplewood. He had watched the terrifying task of trying to get 34 five year olds, many of whom didn't even know what a number was, on the right bus to take them home. All this while screaming saws cut the metal strips needed to install the blackboards in the classroom that very day!

At the end of that traumatic day, Mrs. Weiland walked home, crawled in bed and pulled the covers over her head! The next day she was back, the bus numbers were pinned on the students' jackets before they got off the bus! And Mrs. Dorothea Weiland did keep the job for the next 21 years! She had already taught for two years in Germany, one in Nineveh, and ten at South Rosedale School.


The Weilands moved to New Germany, when Harald Weiland, began a teaching position in that same building when it was first opened in September 1954, as New Germany Rural High School. The consolidation of the small community schools was a huge change and culture shock for our students, families and communities. The Weilands helped immensely with these successful transitions, and with the life of our communities in so many other ways.

Harald and Dorle were born in Germany between the two World Wars. It was certainly not an easy time or place to be. Harald was required to serve in the Germany Navy as a radio operator, was taken prisoner by Canadians, and served them as a very capable and much appreciated interpreter. After the war, Harald and Dorle met at the Pedagogical Institute of Leipzig. They were married in 1946, and began their teaching careers. They faced the difficult realization that they would not be able to live under the

restrictions of communist East Germany and needed to begin a new life somewhere else. Harald had made Canadian friends during the war, and they chose to come to Canada.

Harald arrived at Pier 21 in 1952. He went first to Kentville, and then to Riverport where he worked as teaching principal, and began his first Scout Troop. When he was settled, he sent for Dorle and their two children, Reinhard, and Angelika, who were about to turn 5 and 3. Due to a storm they were unable to dock in Halifax, so Harald met them in Saint John on January 1st, 1953. The family lived in Riverport until the sum-

mer of 1954 when they moved to New Germany.





Harald taught German and French to hundreds of students at NGRH in the twenty years before his career took him to Centre School and then to School Board Administration. He also was very involved in language teaching organizations locally and nationally, and taught University summer courses, He offered a wide variety of extra-curricular activities including the High School Choir, Students' Council, Air Cadet Squadron, Ballroom Dancing, European Travel Tours, and was the driving force behind the High School Alumni Association which continues to plan reunions every five years. Outside of school he was active for forty-one years in the Scouting movement, served the Cancer Society at the local and provincial level, and was a dedicated member of the Masonic Lodge.

Dorle, in addition to teaching hundreds of young students, developed strong working relationships and friendships with colleagues. Many of us younger teachers can remember asking and receiving good advice, not just about our teaching but also about our marriages and families. In the community, Dorle was a founding member of the New Germany Area Branch of the Cancer Society in 1970, and was honoured at their closing ceremony in 2016. For 18 years she was a member of the Hospital Foundation in Bridgewater, several of those years as Chair, and worked with the many Hospital Chorus Musicals in all sorts of capacities including designing and making many of their amazing costumes. With a \$0 budget - it was truly a work of 'making something out of nothing'! In 1959, Dorle began her passionate relationship with the Guiding movement. She began as a Brownie leader, and over the years served as a Provincial Trainer, Music Advisor, Training Commissioner, served on the National Council, and helped organize the World Guiding Camps in Cape Breton and in New Brunswick. She continues to stay connected with Guiding friends in the Valley as a Life Member of the Trefoil Guild.

You might wonder how Harald and Dorle had time to raise a family, but Reinhard and Angelika both speak fondly of their years growing up in New Germany. They both moved from here after High School to attend Acadia University. Reinhard became an engineer and worked for many years with Dexter's Construction, in Bedford. He lives in Wolfville, is married to Carolyn (Price) and they have two children, Kurt and Erika. Angelika became a teacher and taught at Central Kings for all of her 30 year career. She lives in Lakeville, is married to Jim Roy. They have two children, Elizabeth and Alex, and three grandsons.

The Plate Had A Story to Tell

Over a month ago, I paid \$.50 for a small wall plate at a flea market in Caledonia, my home community. I knew that there was more to that dish than just the pretty pattern on the front. What had caught my eye was the sticker on the back with the words, "Smiley's Restaurant, New Germany, NS." Being a local history buff, I knew that I needed to know more. The first two people from the New Germany area who I contacted were able to help me. They gave me enough information so that I knew that the owners of the New Germany restaurant had been Warren "Smiley" Ernst and Jackie Griffiths and that Cheryl MacKay, Smiley's daughter, would be a great first contact. From there, I arranged an interview with Smiley and Jackie who were very pleased to talk about their time in the restaurant business.

Smiley told me that everyone knew him as Smiley and not Warren. He said that he earned the nickname when he was serving in the military and had approached all his duties and tasks, no matter how difficult they were, with a big smile.

He retired from the military in 1978 but started his first restaurant in New Germany in October 1976 and in 1978 Smiley opened another restaurant in Mahone Bay. Their first cook in New Germany was Mary Illingworth and later, Willie MacKay and others.

Smiley laughed when he told me that they were most proud of their coconut cream pies with meringues as high as 6 inches. As well, Smiley said they had not only great staff over those years which included their children, but also great customers. Cheryl, their daughter, who did some waitressing as a teenager, could attest to the great customers; one of them eventually became her husband. They are still married after 38 years. Other customers included staff from the Suttles and Seawinds business that originally had been located in New Germany and staff from the former Department of Health office site.

The busiest times of the year for their New Germany restaurant were Thanksgiving and Mother's Day. Jackie remembered crowds lined up out on the street. One of the biggest attractions was the free fresh rose that every mother received on Mother's Day.

A feature in their New Germany restaurant was their small gift shop. It had mostly local crafts but Smiley had business stickers made and put on some glassware items. Those souvenirs were very popular. My used wall plate was one of those souvenirs!

They also operated a mobile canteen serving the local area especially the exhibitions. They even had a food service bus which travelled greater distances such as Yarmouth and New Brunswick. One of their favourite "food gigs" was at the local Stanburn Music Jamboree.

Eventually, Smiley and Jackie, decided to close their two restaurants. There were a few reasons for this but one main reason was the slow economy. The New Germany restaurant closed in 1982. Their restaurant in Mahone Bay operated for one more year. Their son ran it for them.

Even though they now no longer had their restaurants, neither Smiley or Jackie retired from working or getting involved in other projects. Even to this day, now in their 80's, they are both still very active people who give no hint of slowing down. One of the last comments that Smiley made to me on the day I interviewed him was, "If I could do it all over again, I would love to own a restaurant but I would stay small." He was referring to how busy they had been when they operated two restaurants, a food service mobile and bus.

I left the interview really happy that I bought that \$.50 souvenir wall plate. It had brought me to Smiley and Jackie's story. Now, the plate will be going to their grandchildren who will carry that story forward with them. As you can see from the photograph, Smiley is still smiling!


Spring has arrived! The tree and bushes have burst forth with their leaves and flowers - mak-



Before Camp Kadimah

Camp Kadimah is 75 years old this year. But before Camp Kadimah there was Arrowhead Park.

Sometime before 1918 George W. deLong purchased the west side of the Lake William property and began clearing land for a family cottage. Burpee deLong found an arrowhead on the sand beach, thus the name of the property. Enough land was cleared not only for the cottage, but to hold Sunday School picnics for the United Church. In the 1930's rural schools in the area held their June field day at Arrowhead Park. Fred deLong inherited the land from George in 1926. By the early 1940's the cottage was abandoned.

The east side of the cove, known as the Penny property, was purchased by Harold Verge. Together the properties became the site of the Nova Scotia Guides Association Sports Meet from 1929 to 1943. A bridge across the Lake William cove joined the properties.

Sponsored by the Lake William and Sherbrooke Sporting Club Limited of Barss Corner, jointly owned by Fred C. deLong and Harold Verge, the Meet was held annually on a full moon week in August. It was a gathering of guides not only from Nova Scotia but as far away as California and Vancouver. There could be four hundred tents pitched about the lake, with 1500 campers on the grounds and five thousand visitors paying admission as well as hundreds of cars parked on the hillside and outside the grounds.

During the day there were contests such as canoe races, canoe races without paddles, canoe tilting, portage, rescue, moose calling, log rolling, log chopping, shooting, fly casting and many more. Spectators watched from a large grandstand.

Bands played in the afternoon with various evening entertainment. They included singers, an eleven year old contortionist and a Hammond Organ player. After the evening entertainment the campfires were lit and the singing continued.

It was a grand holiday for all who attended and many people were employed.

Another feature of the Camp was the wildlife. Ezra Eisener succeeded Stan Charlton as the caretaker of deer, moose, caribou, beavers and others. They were on view in cages just across the highway and Gully Brook. There once was even an over-the-highway walkway to view the animals. Mr. Eisener cared for the animals for seven years, often taking them to shows, including the Boston Winter Fair one year.

The camp meetings closed in 1943 and the property was sold and reopened as Camp Kadimah, a summer camp for Jewish youth. They used some of the original cottages and buildings, adding many

others as well as recreation facilities. Mr. Eisener stayed on as caretaker until 1979 when he retired.
