Union Square



lust west of Indian Lake and 9 kilometers east of New Germany October 28, 1830 a land

grant of 1000 acres was granted to a group including Peter Daphinee, Peter Jodry, Eberhardt Rafuse, Ferdinand Hubley and Nicholas Eisenhauer.

The Post Office opened on January 1, 1898 and closed on December 7, 1935 with the only postmaster being E. Hart Nichols.

Walden

On the side east Rocky of Lake 26 kilometers northwest of Mahone Bay and 2 miles southeast of Sher-



Lake, it is believed to have been named for the retreat made famous by Henry Thoreau. A George Ernst received a land grant here in 1839.

The Post Office was established here on March 1, 1894 with Charles Nass as first postmaster. He was followed by Stuart Nass who was in the position at the time of closing April 30, 1955.

Upper New Cornwall

At the southwest tip of Caribou Lake on the Blockhouse to Barss Corner road, it was likely named for Cornwall, England and as being descriptive of its location in relation to Cornwall. Settlement here is known circa 1805.

This Post Office opened on September 1, 1891 and closed on February 28, 1953. There were five postmaster during operation - John E. Hallimore, Lawrence Naas, Henry Nass, John Hallimore and Henry Creighton Nauss.



Newburn

Thirteen Kilometers northeast of New Germany, it is purportedly named as the area newly burned over by a forest fire. Charles Jodrey received a land grant here on September 23, 1846.

The Post Office operated here from April 1, 1882 until July 3, 1920 when it closed temporarily, reopening again from July 1, 1921 until final closure on July 31, 1953. Charles Joudry was the first of seven postmasters, with Clarence Maynard Beck being the last.

River Ridge Common News

Fall 2016 Work Program

Several community groups collaborated for a day of volunteer work at the River Ridge Common community park on a pleasant day last November.

Students from New Germany Rural High School and Nova Scotia Community College, along with members of the River Ridge Common Steering Committee and representatives from the Municipality of

the District of Lunenburg, completed a tour of the site and reviewed the overall plans for its development, took stock of some of the site's ecological features, then dug into constructing a new walking trail along Indian Brook.

Accessed from the South Shore Annapolis Valley Rail Trail, the new walking trail follows the pools and waterfalls of Indian Brook for about one hundred metres to a secluded picnic spot. The group cleared the path, laid down a new gravel surface, and used a tree from the site to build natural wood benches at several scenic look-off locations.

The new Indian Brook trail, built with pride by local youth and other volunteers, is a great addition to River Ridge Common, and is the first of many park improvements planned for the enjoyment of the whole community.





Boston Marathon Fast Approaching for Janis Power as she has completed the hardest part of her training and is now in the maintenance/tapering phase. She will run in this prestigious marathon on April 17th along with 30,000 other runners from around the world. Janis says that she will feel the support and positive energy from folks here at home just as she did when she ran in 2015. She will be crossing the start line at approximately 10:50am Boston time. "I would like take this opportunity to say thank-you to the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg for their Elite Athlete Travel Grant and to the New Germany Area Promotion Society for their financial support!"

Just 6 weeks following the Boston Marathon Janis will be running in another big event! She was chosen to be the NS Flagbearer at the Calgary Marathon as they celebrate Canada's 150th Birthday. She will be flying to Calgary in late May with her #1 supporter, Greg Selig, and will run in the marathon on May 28th. As one of the 13 flagbearers she will take part in the opening ceremonies and both her and Greg will be given VIP treatment while they are there. Along with all of the fun events organized for this 150th Birthday Bash, Janis will take part in a photo-op and some media coverage including an interview on the live broadcast that airs on ShawTV and online.

"I was in disbelief when I got the news! I was quick to call all 6 of our daughters and a few other family members. By the time I was finished I had gone from having incredible energy to being completely exhausted! Greg had to talk to the last person on my list! This is a big honour for me and still a little unbelievable!"

Two marathons (42.2kms) in just 6 weeks doesn't lead to too much of a break for Janis. She will be travelling to Winnipeg in June, along with Greg, to visit family. While there she will run her 3rd marathon in as many months at the Manitoba Marathon on June 18th.

"Running has taken me places and given me opportunities I never thought possible!"

Cycling Along the Lahave River Trail

Thinking about a bicycle ride from New Germany to Bridgewater?

Checkout the Lahave River Trail Association's NOTE about their experience with the 90 minute ride. It includes a summary of the key points along the ride and a map.

During the fall of 2016, just after we completed the new section of trail, I had two bicycle trips from Bridgewater to New Germany along the Lahave River Trail (LRT).

Once by myself and the second time was with my son, his wife who had an eleven month old baby in a bike seat.

The highlights:

- •the colours and look-offs *amazing*.
- •the trail, where completed, was a joy to ride on. A smooth, groomed surface and unlike other rails-to-trails had a few dips and turns to make it more interesting.

The downside:

•two sections of the trail are not yet complete (see map) and this is a real drag because you have to pop off the safety of the trail and onto Highway #10. OK for someone comfortable riding on a major highway but a challenge if you aren't.

The ride at a moderate pace with a couple of short breaks:

- •0:00 leave the Superstore parking lot in Bridgewater heading north on the Centennial Trail
- •0:10 arrive at the start of the Lahave River Trail (you can also get to this point from the trailhead by the Best Western)
- •0:15 trail crosses the major highway at the Cookville Bridge ('T' intersection, be careful!)
- •0:20 arrive at the Cookville Park -- good spot to get off and walk to the river
- •0:25 Rhodenizer Road and the end of the trail, pop onto Highway #10 -- BE CAREFUL!
- \bullet 0:40 Turn left off #10 onto Salmon Run (BE CAREFUL, THIS IS A VERY DANGEROUS TURN ON A CORNER). Ride down the dirt road about 300 meters and the LRT is on your right
- •0:45 Wentzell Road (and a Parking Lot). You start riding alongside Wentzell Lake
- •0:55 Micmac Rod and Gun Club -- pop out onto #10 again. BE CAREFUL!

Haskap 101

By now many of you have heard of or tried haskap berries. For those unfamiliar with this new "super fruit", here is some information.

Haskap is a member of the honeysuckle family - it is not a blueberry. The fruit is very flavourful, tasting like a zingy combination of blueberry, raspberry, and elderberry. Haskap are full of health benefits: high in vitamin c, anthocyanins, antioxidants, potassium, phenolic compounds, and also containing selenium. They can be eaten fresh or used in cooking and baking - pies, crisps, sauces, muffins, meat glaze, jam, juice, smoothies and much more. The berry freezes extremely well. You should try our haskap jam (on a toasted bagel with cream cheese - yum!).

At our certified organic farm in Union Square, Lunenburg County, we grow haskap, garlic, and grapes commercially. We have 450 haskap plants in four varieties, each with its own berry shape, growing pattern, and flavour. After 5 years of growth one variety is 4 feet tall and 3 feet wide. A new variety planted last year "Happy Giant" is expected to exceed 6 feet tall and 4 feet wide, and produce 4 inch long fruit!

Our haskap are harvested when the sugar levels are at an optimum level, which produces a tasty crop. This is a favourite food of many bird species (including robins, waxwings, crows, and flickers) so nets are necessary. Raccoons also like the tasty fruit so we have them inside an electric fence.

Harvesting begins when the sugars are at levels of 12 to 16 Brix. They are harvested by hand and frozen

fresh the same day, it is a lot of work. We have one employee, Liam Wile, who works with us for the entire farm season. During the 3 week haskap harvest we hire several other local young people.

After harvesting in June and July, the nets are removed and put away to be used again when our grapes ripen in September. The haskap plants are fed with aged chicken manure and lime, then mulched with straw. This will ensure good plant health over the summer to hopefully produce a good crop the following spring. Pollination is crucial, we are fortunate to have a good wild bee population and since our last harvest we now have a new project - honey bees.


Are you a senior who lives alone and are unable to get out to socialize?

Riding Safely

Riding horses is always a challenge. They are very emotional, self-aware animals and are always concerned about their surroundings. As prey animals they have to be on alert every minute of their lives.

We ride them and ask them to tolerate a lot of what their instinct tells them is dangerous. Many hours of training goes into having these big animals trust us and connect with us. Once that connection is made it is amazing and they will do almost anything to please us.

I'm sure you have seen my horsey girls and me walking the horses down the Barss Corner Road to the ball field tree yard. It's a safe place to ride with no traffic, however, getting there can be a bit tricky. This road is very busy, with cars, motorcycles, trucks and trailers going by us. You can train your horses to tolerate these sounds and sometimes they become almost 'bombproof'. My gelding never flipped an ear, not even if a tractor-trailer drove by us.

However, a bicycle caused a different reaction as that low tone wasn't heard until it was beside him. He would bolt as it startled him. Then he would be annoyed because it was only a bicycle. Any other horse wouldn't stop until it was home safe. That is

how my two mares will react. So please talk to us if you are behind us on a bicycle, for my safety and yours.

Motorcycles and four wheelers are different as horses are usually scared of the noise and speed.

We choose to love and to ride these dangerous and beautiful animals so we take every precaution to be safe. Wearing helmets, boots, and long pants, while riding in a group with more experienced horses and riders are some of the steps we take to ensure everyone's safety. We also walk them on the main road to get to the dirt roads and tree yards.

As they can be unpredictable and have bad days like us we do whatever we can to prevent dangerous situations for the drivers on the Barss Corner Road and us. We have asked for a horse crossing sign be posted in our area.

We ask, when you see us, that you please slow down and take precautions. The girls and I appreciate your consideration and pray that we all stay safe so we can enjoy our passions.

If you haven't tried horseback riding I highly recommend it, as it is truly amazing to have such a connection with these magnificent creatures.



Visitors to Our Area

Every year, the New Germany community is visited by people from other countries. Some are visiting family and friends, while others are tourists passing through. This article is about people who come for awhile to study or work through special programs that encourage international relationships.

This article will describe three types of programs that allow visitors to study, volunteer and work in our community. Other issues of New Germany Connections this year will include interviews with people who visit us from other countries. These will help us understand why these visitors chose our community as a temporary home, how they see us, and what we can do to make them feel more welcome and included while they are here.

Work Exchange Programs

Canada is represented in several international volunteer networks that provide a way for travellers to exchange five hours of unpaid work per day, five days a week in return for seven days of room and board. Tourists who volunteer through these programs must be in Canada mainly to travel, not to work. Volunteer workers must not displace paid workers. These arrangements help tourists learn new skills,

gain work experience and keep travel costs down.

Networks operate from a web site where both host farmers and travelling workers describe themselves in a profile. Workers may search these by location and farm type to find hosts and see what they offer. Once work terms are completed, the host and worker may comment on their experience.

One of the best known of these networks is World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms (WWOOF). Hosts and workers pay an annual membership fee. The experience is meant to be a learning experience related to farming with a focus on organic farming. Of the 38 Nova Scotia wwoof hosts now active, several are on New Germany area farms.

HelpX and Workaway are two larger networks that also match

temporary travelling workers with hosts. Jobs can be almost anything, ranging from short term in-home caregiver to tourist accommodation workers, to land clearing, gardening, building or harvesting. Hosts do not pay to participate but workers pay to register. There are about now 84 Nova Scotia HelpX hosts and 46 Nova Scotia Workaway hosts. About ten hosts on each site are from Lunenburg County.

Foreign Worker Programs

The second type of program allows paid workers from other countries to fill jobs not filled by Canadians. One of these is Canada's Seasonal Agricultural Worker Program. Through this program, workers from Mexico and Caribbean countries work temporarily on Canadian farms. Employers provide free housing and pay part of workers' travel costs to and from Canada. The rules for labour, safety and salary that apply to these workers are the same as for Canadian workers. Some of the 1,300 seasonal agricultural workers who came to Nova Scotia in 2013-2014 came to Lunenburg County to help with Christmas Tree operations through this program.

International Student Program

The Nova Scotia International Student Program offers high school education to students from around the world.

Single semester and/or full year programs are available, along with short term programs from 1 -3 months in over 85 junior and senior high schools in our Province.

New Germany Rural High School was home to 27 International students in September and currently is home to 22 International Students from 11 different countries. Students are currently from Korea, China, Japan, Vietnam, Brazil, Turkey, Netherlands, Germany, Italy, Colombia and Belgium.

International families recognize the importance of their children learning English as a second language and our government understands the importance of internationalizing our schools.

The Nova Scotia International Student Program is committed to providing an excellent education and homestay environment to all international students.

Students can also choose from a variety of extracurricular activities such as soccer, volleyball, basketball, curling, skiing, community organizations and creative art to name a few.

Students are closely matched with a host family who lives in the area they will attend school. The host family provides a caring home environment for the student. Students are made to feel a part of their host family and are included in all celebrations and outings.

Families that apply to be host families are required to complete Criminal records Checks, Child Abuse Checks and are interviewed by a Homestay Coordinator. Homestay Coordinators serve as the liaison between the student and the host family. Coordinators provide tips on communication and culture, advice if homesickness or other problems arise and arrange social activities for students and their host families. 
