Hebbville Academy for almost ten years. She taught all grade levels from P-6. During that time she was also a Literacy Mentor, working with other teachers to develop effective practices in reading, writing and assessment. She was asked to be a member of provincial lead teams for the SSRSB in Reading, Writing, Science and Social Studies; as well as an Assessment for Learning cohort for them. She was the SSRSB teacher representative for Young Writers in Action at the Department of Education for several years as this initiative was rolled out. She was featured in a provincial DVD series on Writing Workshop and was then appointed to create professional development, documented from her classroom, and presented to teachers across the province on Reading Workshop. She has presented at provincial conferences and inservices for the SSRSB on all areas of literacy which is her personal passion.

Last year, Angela was the board's representative on the provincial team that streamlined, revised and inserviced the P-3 curriculum, which was implemented this year. Following that, Angela moved into the role of administrator at Pentz Elementary School. She is currently completing the Instructional Leadership Program through the Nova Scotia Educational Leadership Consortium. Angela is excited to return to the New Germany community and to work collaboratively with students, staff and parents to continue to move the school in a positive direction and to achieve established goals. Angela believes in the importance of building positive relationships and that students must feel connected and supported at school in order to learn. She maintains high expectations for all students to allow them to be successful.

#### Beth Collins is the new principal at NGRHS.

Beth Collins has been in the field of education for sixteen years, teaching a variety of subjects at the high school and university level. She has taught in a number of Canadian provinces and in the United States, ranging from high school English and French to database theory at a small university in Washington, DC. Without question, rural schools have been her favourite, allowing for a 'whole student' approach to addressing, in a thoughtful and effective manner, the educational needs of students.

Hester Gibson has been a teacher in the Province of Nova Scotia since her first teaching assignment at Shelburne Regional High School. After taking a few years off to be at home with her own young children, she began substituting for the Lunenburg County District School Board and taking a full time position at New Germany Rural High School (NGRHS). Throughout her years of substitution and teaching, she has taught every grade and every subject but the majority of her career was spent at the junior high level first teaching physical education and then English 8. Six years ago,

she took over from Greg Selig as the Lead Options & Opportunities (O2) Teacher, continuing to develop the O2 Program which was initiated by the Department of Education with NGRHS as a pilot school.

At Shelburne Regional High School, she and husband Howard coached almost every sport in the school and Ms. Gibson began the volleyball program there that still runs today as an evening sport. At NGRHS, she coached volleyball initially and then brought back to life the NGRHS Drama Club which just finished its twenty-first consecutive May production. This year's challenging play, Arsenic and Old Lace by Joseph Kesselring, helped highlight the skills of the young actors in the cast and crew.

Outside of school Ms. Gibson now resides on her family farm, Penney Hill Farm, with her husband Howard, a cat, and a dog. She and her family are beginning to grow grapes, high bush blueberries, elderberries, and a small market garden. Her flower garden is her passion but edible foods inevitably take priority. A mother of three and lucky grandmother of seven, Ms. Gibson is looking forward to the next challenge in her education career as an administrator in the same school she attended as a high school student, a member of the class of '76.

## River Ridge Common

The River Ridge Common community park plan was recently unveiled by a steering committee of local volunteers and MODL Staff. The plan was completed by Dartmouth-based Ekistics Planning and Design, in conjunction with New Germany based Snow Owl Consulting Inc.




River Ridge Common is a 115 acre property, divided by the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail into 2 distinct parcels. The 15 acre Lower Park is a former gravel pit, situated between Highway 10 and the trail. The 100 acre Upper Park area is a former woodlot, to the north of the rail trail. The hillside site faces south toward the LaHave River, and is bounded by Indian Brook to the west and Ross Brook to the east.

The property's history as working land, amongst the rich natural resources of Lunenburg County, became a focal idea for its redevelopment into a site for year-round outdoor enjoyment.

The Lower Park plan allows a variety of mounds, cut banks, and rock outcrops, remnants of former gravel pit activities, to become interesting landforms that define a new picnic area, accessible trails, natural playground, and interactive art park features. These will be constructed from wood, stone, and plant elements, inviting play and relaxation for all ages, revealing views of the river and a shady mossed gully that crosses the site.

The Upper Park features a renovation and expansion of the former logging skid trails into a multi-use trail network, offering a variety of opportunities for non-motorized outdoor recreation, from gentle accessible paths to winding single track adventures. Rest stops, look offs, and interpretive features allow users to enjoy special features, such as the lovely waterfalls of Indian Brook, and highlight the succession of a former working woodland growing back into a diverse Acadian Forest.

The River Ridge Common plan also integrates the site into Lunenburg County's extensive network of existing rail trails, making it a destination for South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail users. It features accessible non-motorized trail segments that branch off the rail trail, and rejuvenates an old rail spur into a pull-out and picnic area dedicated to Off-Highway Vehicle riders.



## What's at the Museum?



#### Phonograph Cylinder

The first wax cylinders Edison used were white and made of ceresin, beeswax, and stearic wax. Standard-sized cylinders, which tended

to be 4.25" long and 2.1875" in diameter, were 50 cents each and typically played at 120 r.p.m. A variety of selections were featured on the cylinders, including marches, sentimental ballads, hymns, comic monologues and descriptive specialties, which offered sound reenactments of events.

## Hoop Dreams:

A community league designed to encourage the game of basketball on the South Shore  $\sim$  Sam Jess

If a guy has been around some high-level basketball, and he happens to hear about a men's spring league in New Germany, you can forgive him if he doesn't expect much. After all, New Germany is a place where soccer seems to gobble up the elite athletes and where there just aren't enough coaches or gym time for year-round basketball player development. Right? Think again!

Step into the gym at New Germany Rural High School any Friday night in the spring, from 5:30-8:30, and join the crowd of families and friends watching an impressive show. The quality and intensity of the basketball you will witness will startle you. Some of the players are in top athletic condition, and very skilled. (Others, perhaps farther along in years, do their best to keep up, which is worth seeing, too.) There are 6 teams of 10 players each. Many players drive from all directions to play: from Caledonia,

Bridgewater, Chester, etc.

Best of all, each team has one or two junior-highaged players on it, courageously there to gain some precious basketball experience.

The League's commissionaire is Mr. Mike O'Hearon. By day, Mike teaches French at the High School, hence his care about the younger players' development. (Students call him "Mr. O".) Also, Mike leads school trips to Europe, as on this past March Break. Mike uses the basketball league as a fundraiser for the trips to Europe (through the registration fee), which makes the league an even bigger benefit to the school and community. The level of organization that

Mike brings to the league can be seen on the website, <a href="http://ngspringleague.weebly.com">http://ngspringleague.weebly.com</a>. Mike referees most of the games himself, except when he plays, this year on the Orange team. The league has been operating since 2011.

As competitive as the league is, there are some challenges, as reflected in the rules. One is that players must keep foul language to a minimum, since there are families watching. Once, after a player got a



technical foul for swearing, another player asked a friend, "What did he say?" The friend replied, "I'm not allowed to tell you, or I'll be in trouble too."

Another challenge is for the more dominant players to keep the junior-high-aged players involved and encouraged. That's not always easy, when games are tight and the competitive juices get flowing. But the reward is that when a 12 or 13-year-old player makes a big play the crowd goes wild and goes even wilder when the other young player guarding him responds in kind at the other end of the floor.

This year's games wrapped up with a champion-

ship game on Friday, June 10.

Caution: with all the athleticism, spectators need to stay on their toes, or else a ball or a high-flying player might land on them. A 3-year old boy said after watching last week's game, "I think next time I will wear my helmet."

We hope to have the sign erected by the end of June, in the area across from the NSLC Store in New Germany.

I always made little books out of my stories and they were always laying around so I took them and put them all into one book.


Yes, I had help from my nannie, Alice Wile.



#### What is a "Farm Shop"?

A farm shop is a retail store that sells farm produce, typically food items from both the farm itself and the local area. Our farm shop will open this summer selling wool products, including our own yarn and award-winning fleece from our long wool sheep.

Then over the next few years, our plan is to open a café and offer workshops in dying wool, making wool duvets, and needle felting. We also intend to begin selling food and products from local farms, taking a cooperative/ cottage industry approach.

#### Tell us about your Sheep

We moved to the New Germany area in 2008 with three breeds of heritage sheep. Texels are a meat sheep from the Netherlands, Lincoln and Romney sheep are both English long wool breeds. Romney sheep are bred for both meat and fleece and Lincolns for fleece.

After winning provincial and national awards for fleece, we changed our focus from breeding sheep to sell to other farmers for their flocks to selling yarn and other wool products.

Over the past few years we have purposefully lambed late – our lambs arrive now in late May and early June; we have meat lamb for sale in January.

#### What will you sell this summer?

Exceptionally beautiful handspun yarn from our flock has been available for sale locally for several years and will be for sale here, along with products for hand spinners and needle workers – batts, rovings and locks. Last summer we took fleeces to two mills in Prince Edward Island. Texel fleece makes a "farm wool" good for socks and mittens. The Romney fleece is wonderfully soft and makes beautiful sweaters. Both have been for sale in Lunenburg County since January and will also be available in our farm shop. Our mill-processed yarn is three-ply, so it's different from the two-ply yarn the Rosedale New Horizon Senior's Club in New Germany sells.

This summer we will have British wool sweaters for sale but are very keen to hear from local expert knitters who make wool sweaters and other clothing. If you knit 100% wool sweaters and are interested in selling them please contact us aspengrovesheep@gmail.com

## Nannie's Adventure to a Monastery

I'm standing on the cement curb, looking up at four floors of a rather imposing brick structure with two round turrets reaching to the grey skies above. After a rather bumpy plane ride from Halifax followed by a two hour shuttle ride along Ontario's Queen Elizabeth Highway, I have arrived at my destination. I am in awe. This is where I am to stay for the next two nights? Built in 1895 I was sure there would be some ghostly spirits



rattling around at night. I gazed across the expansive facade of this structure to determine what might be used as the usual point of entry. Though all doors were locked, the third had a glass through which I could see a short, familiar looking woman hurriedly approaching. Sister Anne! This dear, sweet lady was known among Lutherans in Lunenburg County in the early 1980's when she lived and worked here.

Stepping inside there was a faint smell of fresh paint and old books. Receiving a key to a room on the second floor I inspected nooks and crannies along the way for shadows of things from years past. The hallway was finished in dark wood and dimly lit. At my door I notice there is enough space under the door for a very fat mouse to move with ease. My key in the lock takes some jiggling before it makes a connection with the mechanism to slide the bolt and unlock the door. I gingerly step inside....the floor creeks, a strip of metal across a threshold loosely rattles when I cross to inspect the tiny bathroom. Neat, clean, dated, but well kept, I decide. Depositing my bags I pick up a listing of rules and instructions.....where to place dirty linens, when meals are served, in case of emergency call 911 and for public use there is a phone in the basement. I smile at this last statement. Most everyone has a cell phone these days, but just suppose you didn't and there was an emergency? Depending on the type of emergency it might be quite difficult to get to the basement from the second floor, not to mention the fourth.

The first night, as is the case any time I am away from home, was one of toss, turn and walk. A ghost to help pass the time would have been a welcome visitor. I sat at the foot of my bed and watched the lights over Niagara Falls change from blue to green to red and then yellow. A light dusting of snow had fallen and there is a single set of footprints leaving the building – perhaps another guest having trouble sleeping or was it a ghost out for a midnight stroll along Lake Ontario?

I awaken next morning, after my calculations of approximately 3 hours sleep. Breakfast in the dining room has everyone exchanging comments about whether or not they slept well, the day's agenda and where the afternoon's free time will be spent. No mention of ghostly encounters. I'm slightly disappointed. The afternoon finds us piling into cars driven by warm hearted fellow participants to take in an art display by William Kurelek depicting the Crucifixion of Christ. A very moving display.

Along the way we had passed two ladies from our group walking in the blowing snow and freezing temperatures, both wearing spring jackets and one in sandals. We juggled bodies and made room for one in each car. Who explores Niagara Falls in April dressed in hats, mittens and boots? If only we had them!

The second night, from shear exhaustion, I slept like a baby except for the abrupt awakening at 3 AM by someone calling my name. I sat up, no one stirred, no further sound. I look out the window – more snow and notice that the whole top floor has light spilling from the windows. I make a mental note to enquire if any of our group is staying on the fourth floor.

The third day, our last at Mount Carmel Monastery. Passing through hallways and passages I notice a distinct change in temperature in small sections – a cool air current, but no door or window left open. The morning flies by and we are soon packing up to go our separate ways. While waiting in the front entrance for our transportation to our next location I realize that our keys are being collected rather than leaving them in the room, so I hurry back up the stairs. The long dimly lit hallway is even more quiet than before. At the far end a large white object is moving slowly from the room I had previously occupied. I stop with a gasp.....but then approach as my eyes become more accustomed to the dim lighting.

"Um, excuse me," I say. A small thin arm comes out from under the white mound and clamps down on the poofy white sheet revealing the face of a young woman who is obviously cleaning the rooms and carrying an armload of sheets to the laundry. I ask about the key and she retrieves it from the cleaning cart. As I approach the stairs a cool current passes just over my head. I look up....no fans, no air conditioning, no open window. I smile and say 'good bye'. The door to the stairwell clicks behind me.


