River Ridge Common News

New Germany's River Ridge Common park is reaching major milestones in its development during spring and summer 2019.

On land owned by the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg, the 115 acre property is divided by the South Shore Annapolis Valley (rail) Trail (SSAVT) into two distinct parcels. The 15 acre Lower Park is a former gravel pit, situated between Highway 10 and the rail trail. The 100 acre Upper Park area is a former wood lot, to the north of the rail trail.

The natural playground and art park area in the Lower Park was recently completed, featuring all-age opportunities for fun and fresh air. This will soon be connected to the Highway 10 parking area by a new trail. This trail will link up all of the existing park facilities and create a network of over 2.5km of gravel - surfaced trails that meet trail accessibility best practice guidelines.

New Germany Rural High School has been working to include more River Ridge Common activities in its curriculum so the students can continue to work on important community projects and learn in their local outdoor environment.

A comprehensive signage program for River Ridge Common is currently in production, which will be in place for the park's grand opening on Friday July 12th @6:00pm (rain date July 13th, 2:00pm). Plans for the current construction season also include more gravel trails and the first segments of shared-use single track trail, providing even more options for choosing your own outdoor adventure in your new community park.

Catching up...

Who graduated from New Germany Rural High School in 2000 and now lives in remote Queensland, Australia? That would be **Anne Veinot-Singh** who lives with her Police Sergeant husband, Amit and four-year-old son, Bikram (Bikky), on the border of the Northern Territory and Queensland in a little town of 300 people. She currently works as a teacher's aide at the little school in town, but traveled and had a wide variety of work and living experiences as she journeyed there.

After graduating from Acadia University she wanted to travel but got a job right away and eventually ended up working in an office in Toronto. She writes: "I moved to Australia after working in Toronto for 3-4 years. I was sick of sitting in a cubicle and daydreaming about horses. I quit my job and got a working holiday visa and starting working on cattle stations ... I eventually made my way over to Queensland and I traveled the East Coast



entirely before finding my way to Mount Isa, Queensland. A remote mining town of about 20,000 - 30,000 people. Here I was working at a bar and I met my husband. My husband is a police officer who is originally from Fiji (he is Indo-Fijian)... we moved several times and now are only about 2 hours from Mount Isa... the town that started it all for us!"

"I often think about my son (4) and how growing up here is so different for him than how I grew up... when I go grocery shopping it's a four hour round trip and he thinks it's such a fun day out... another fun thing we do together is walk to the roadhouse, get hot chocolate, sit outside and watch'road trains' which are 18 wheelers with 3-4 big sections to a little boy, they are way cool." St John-in-the-Wilderness Anglican Church celebrates 175th Anniversary.

The first Anglican service recorded in the village of New Germany was led by the rector of St John's Church, Lunenburg, and held in the barn of John Feindel in 1828 or 29. Shortly thereafter work began on a church which was consecrated on July 23, 1844, by Bishop John Inglis who travelled to New Germany by horseback. The church was built as a Chapel of St John's Church in Lunenburg and called St John-in-the-Wilderness to distinguish it from the Church in the town.

This little church has been the spiritual home for hundreds of people since then. The Parish of New Germany includes three other churches, St Andrew's, West Northfield; St Paul's, Union Square and Transfiguration, Newburne. Special events planned to celebrate include an Anniversary Hymn Sing, on Sunday, June 9th at 7pm at St John's; a 'Service in the Barn' & Family Picnic at 3pm Saturday, July 27th at the Robars in Meisners' Section; and an Anniversary Service at 3pm on Sunday, July 28th at St John-in-the-Wilderness. All are welcome at any of these events!

On Monday, July 29th at 7:30pm Musique Royale will present a concert, Best of Boxwood at St John-in-the-Wilderness. Tickets and more information will be available in early July.

The Anglican Parish hosts the Thursday morning Community Café at St John's Church Hall and we are delighted to have this become such a popular meeting place for so many members of the community. Reconnecting with the Barry Family

In 1957 a young man from the Mahone Bay area was asked by George Zwicker to come to New Germany and manage his newly opened IGA grocery store. Everett Barry, who was born in Maitland, grew up in Clearland, went to school in Mahone Bay, and was working at Lohnes' Grocery, thought it was a good offer. He found a boarding room at Sperry's Restaurant (where 2 Papas is today) and began his career in the grocery business in New Germany at Zwicker's IGA. In order to open a store, of course, shelves have to be stocked. Sherilyn Veinot, a Grade 11 student at New Germany Rural High School, had been asked to come and work at that task.



Everett and Sherilyn (Veinot) Barry celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on September 12, 2018! They were married at Epworth United Church and had their reception in the recently renovated church basement. At first they lived with Sherilyn's parents, Audrey and Robbie Veinot on the Osborne Road, next they rented an apartment on the Zwicker Mill Road, then a house just behind what was the Foundry Garage. From there they bought a home on School Street and then to the Osborne Road where they lived until 2004. Everett worked hard to build up the grocery business; Sherilyn worked for a time at Oickles' Store and then by Everett's side at the family business.

Everett reminisces that in 1958 there were 12 places in the village where you could buy groceries and two meat markets. You could buy household goods and clothing for all the family; there were at least three places you could buy gas, a

movie theatre, and the new High School, just opened in 1955, was already bursting at the seams! Dances were still held regularly at Billy Cole's Dance Hall by the lake. When they set up housekeeping, and for many years afterward, any new furniture a family needed was available at the Fielding and Wynn store. Their first new chesterfield bought there cost \$149. Sherilyn's Dad worked at the Pulp Mill and they lived in one of the 'Pulp Mill' homes. She remembers from her early school days, walking to the one-room South Rosedale School on the Osborne Road using a footbridge across the LaHave River that was built above the Pulp Mill dam.

By 1965 the Barrys were ready to take over the grocery store and it became Barry's Red and White. It stayed in the same location near the old bridge though it was renovated and enlarged to meet the changing needs. In 1991, that store was closed and a new IGA 'Hometown Proud' was opened on Highway 10. Thankfully that store is still going strong and though renamed New Germany Freshmart is still listed in the phonebook as Barry's Freshmart.



The Barrys became a family with the arrival first of Craig in 1960 and then Paul in 1964. Their family was rounded out a few years later with the arrival of their daughter, Lisa. These were busy years. The business grew. The children were growing, going to school, getting involved in the community as well,



participating in the Scout movement, school activities and sports. The family spent time at the cottage at Lake William and went camping. Craig and Paul spent time working at the store as they made their way through high school.

Sherilyn was involved in the United Church as she grew up in Sunday School, Youth Group and she led an Explorer Group. She remembers camping as a young teenager at the CGIT Camp in Pinehurst. She was an active member and leader in the many activities of the UCW (United Church Women). Everett, too, became involved in the church teaching Sunday School and singing in the Men's Choir. He volunteered with the Red Cross Swimming Program. When business owners in the village formed a Board of Trade to work together for the good of the community, Everett was there. Sherilyn became active with the New Germany Rural High School Alumni which organizes reunions for former students and staff every five years. They bowled with the New Germany Bowling League.

Everett soon became active in the New Germany Volunteer Fire Department and served as Fire Chief from 1981-1991 following the death of the former chief, Dr J B Crowe. When one is a member of the Fire Department, the whole family is affected. Craig and Paul joined when they were old enough.

Sherilyn for many years helped organize the Annual Firemen's Bean and Salad Supper on July 1st and the community canvassing that went along with it. The Fire Dept skits that were done for a number of years at July 1st celebrations were legend, and often involved the Barrys – Everett, Paul, along with Cyril Acker, John Parnell, and others. Sherilyn and JoAnne were chief costume designers.

Craig and Paul graduated from New Germany Rural High, and Lisa from Park View. Craig worked for a time in Canada's North, for a time in Halifax, and then chose to come back 'home' to the area and work at Michelin. He and Angie (Hall) bought a home in Pinehurst. Paul gave Michelin a try as well, but with his wife, JoAnne (Feener) came back 'home' to the grocery business, eventually taking it over from the Senior Barrys. They built a home on the Osborne Road and, in due course, there were three more Barrys. Everett and Sherilyn became the delighted grandparents of Katelyn, Alana, and Caleb. Lisa studied at Mt St Vincent, lives in Bridgewater and has added two more grandchildren to the family, Jonah and Gracen.

Family, extended family, and social gatherings at home and in the community were valued highly by the Barrys. There were many gatherings to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, graduations, family home for a visit, decorate the Christmas tree, barbecue, Canada Day, New Year's Eve, Bowling Banquet, Fire Department Banquet and Dance; it was easy to find a reason to celebrate with the family or community. Their home was a place of welcome and their presence in the community was welcomed!

The whole community shared with the entire Barry family in shock and sadness when Paul suddenly became ill and died in 2002. With family and community support, faith and hope for the future, the family found their way through the difficult days and decisions





ahead. Lots of changes followed. JoAnne managed the business and moved with her children and her parents to a new home. Everett and Sherilyn sought an easier to maintain home in Bridgewater as they both conquered some serious health issues. They continued to be frequent visitors in New Germany with many family and community connections.

Family tragedy struck again in 2017 when after less than a year-long battle with an aggressive cancer, their older son, Craig died. Again the whole community shared in the sorrow and supported the family as



60 years. It was only moments after that, when I approached the Barrys asking if we could share some of the story of their life in our community; a community from which they moved away physically but a community with which they remain closely connected.

they worked their way through yet another tragic grief.

On the last Saturday of April, Everett and Sherilyn sat with Hiram and Ruth Carver at a table for Retired Firefighters at the annual banquet. Sherilyn told me that she and Ruth reminisced about when the first NG Fire Department Ban-

quets were held at Epworth United Church basement. What a wonderful moment of reconnecting for two who couples had both been an intepart of aral our community for over

The Pinehurst Camp

Another story from his booklet "Pinehurst A LaHave River Valley Community (since 1872)

The campground was operated by the Maritime Religious Education Council (MREC), an interdenominational agency that promoted a fine and effective youth program. Camps, mostly girls, were held as early as 1926 and continued with the Canadian Girls in Training (CGIT) until the mid 1950s. CGIT was an organization for young girls and women aged 12-17 that combined instruction in practical life skills with fellowship and recreational activities.

Set among a large stand of tall pine trees, with an adjacent open field where campers' tents were pitched, the campground's back property line was the LaHave River. A large one-story building housed the kitchen, dining room and recreation area. The icehouse was nearby. Close to the river were three small buildings; two used as offices and one for a First Aid Station. Outhouses were located throughout the wooded area as there was no indoor plumbing. Electricity came in 1947.

The camp provided seasonal work for many village people. Ice was cut from the river, hauled to the icehouse and covered with sawdust to slow thawing until summer camp began. During the summer grass had to be mowed, campers' luggage transported from/to the train station, garbage hauled away, straw provided for filling bedrolls, tents erected and the cookhouse and dining room staffed.

Most campers and their leaders, numbering fifty plus, arrived at the station by train. They sang camp songs as they walked along the highway to the campground - a most delightful sight. The duration of each camp was about two weeks. Campers worshipped at the Pinehurst church. Each summer the camp held an open house day and invited people from the village to attend. Activities included games and swimming for the children and refreshments, including ice cream cones for everyone.

After the camp closed, the buildings stood empty for a long time. George Lohnes and Clifford Blackadar purchased the property in 1962 and for a while the open field was used for RV camping. The property was again sold in 1972 to a mill owner; however the pine trees were not cut down immediately as speculated.

In 1977 the Rt. Hon. John G. Diefenbaker, former Prime Minister of Canada, attended one of the events held at the former campgrounds with local singing artist Joyce Seamone providing part of the entertainment. The crowd was estimated at 15,000 and the number of cars at 4500 with traffic backed up "several miles toward Bridgewater" according to the Bridgewater Bulletin.

Finally the remains of the buildings were removed and the tall pine trees were cut down to make lumber. Today new growth trees and bushes hide any signs of the camp's existence.

North Rosedale School Reunion

The North Rosedale annual school reunion will be held Wednesday August 7th. There will be a social hour beginning at noon and lunch will be served at 1:00pm at St. John's Anglican Church Hall.

The first school in New Germany was built just prior to 1870 on the bank of the LaHave River just below Zwicker's box factory. In 1883 there were two districts, North and South Rosedale, each having their own school. In 1923 a two room school was built in North Rosedale at a cost of \$4,844 to replace the one room school. Later two more rooms were



added to accommodate the growing number of students. In 1954, after a new high school was built, the North Rosedale school served only elementary students. In 1964 the elementary students were relocated and the North Rosedale School was sold.

Happy Trails from LaHave River Trail!

As mentioned in our last newsletter the Lahave River Trail Association is on the cusp of beginning the construction of the piece of Trail between the Mossman Road and the wooden bridge at the Bruhm Road. We are so appreciative of the generosity of the landowners to share the old rail-bed (part or all of which they purchased) with the community to make this possible. We are aware that many in the community have travelled this section over time, but we remind you that this is private land and as a Trail group, although we have permission to construct trail, we do not have it officially open yet. You travel at your own risk until construction is complete and a clear Trail route is defined with signage. Since one of the owners is the Mill (J.A. Turner and Sons), which is a work centre in our community, we expect anyone

traveling, particularly on an OHV, to travel slowly and respectfully in this area and stay as far away from the Mill workings as possible.

Special thanks to David Whynott and Franklyn Dauphinee, in particular, who gave many hours of volunteer time to cut out the brush to allow our contractor to start work on construction of the trail. We look forward to the weather cooperating and everything being in place for Gerald Veinot and his crew to begin the first week of June so there will soon be a lovely surface for all to enjoy.

We are sometimes asked "Is the trail fully connected yet?" The answer is no.

There are still sections, one very short (meters) and two longer (a few kilometers) which are not yet connected. Rhodenizer Rd to Mossman Road is ready for construction and we will asses whether we are financially able to do that this year. Bruhm Road to Salmon Run Rd. still involves successful negotiations with a couple of landowners and we are hopeful that a plan we have in the works to get to the Veinot Road will work out. In that regard, we are optimistic that Pilot projects which are presently underway with the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal (DoTIR) will 'pave the way' for this plan, although we all may need to be patient.



We realize this is frustrating and we do try to get the message out but we remind any-

one who is considering traveling this way to do some homework before they come. Cyclists and hikers are able to use the shoulder of Highway 10 to pick up the connections.

We have stored the sticks at Pine City Furniture on McCulloch Road, thanks to Jamie Veinotte. You can borrow one or two for the summer and return them in the fall.

While Jonathan Veinotte took care of the logistics, Dave Whynott, Daniel Wile, Franklyn Dauphinee, Jessica Hubley and Helen Ferns went out on the trail, despite the damp, to fix up wear and tear and winter trail damage. Little Wesley Wile was our cheerleader and helper. Thanks to all. Thanks also goes to John Corkum who fishes from the trail (with a permit from DNR) for also doing maintenance work. We enjoy a cooperative relationship.

If you are a regular user of the Trail get involved in any way you can. Picking up litter now and again is a fairly simple plan (and let us know if you do). Helping when we have maintenance work to do involves a bit more planning, as does attending meetings (3rd Wednesday /month).

OHV users are expected to register their vehicles which provides us with significant funding which we apply for and regularly receive. Bikers, hikers, equestrians and others can take advantage of the Nova Scotia Trails Federation donation program (\$40 per Meter) at: <u>https://nstrails.com/</u> and receive a tax receipt. Our memberships are \$10 per year, April through March. Something to fit every budget.

It was lovely to meet four visitors from Poland on the Trail recently enjoying the experience. We look forward to meeting you on the trail. Happy trails to you.
