#### In Flanders Fields by John McCrae, May 1915



In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields. Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high.

If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow

In Flanders fields.

### Inspiration for the poem

During the Second Battle of Ypres a Canadian artillery officer, Lieutenant Alexis Helmer, was killed on 2 May, 1915 by an exploding shell. He was a friend of the Canadian military doctor Major John McCrae.

John was asked to conduct the burial service owing to the chaplain being called away on duty elsewhere. It is believed that later that evening John began the draft for his famous poem 'In Flanders Fields'

On November 11th the service at the Cenotaph begins at 10:57 with O Canada, at 10:58 continues with Last Post. The Last Post: Traditionally is played throughout military bases to signify the ending of the day. For many years the Last Post has been played at Remembrance Day services, to commemorate the fallen soldiers.

**Dipping of the Legion Flag:** When the first note of the "Last Post" is sounded, the Colour Party member carrying the Legion Banner shall step forward and dip the Legion Banner in a slow and dignified manner, held in a dipped position during the Silence in respect for the Fallen. The Legion Banner should not be allowed to touch the ground. For Remembrance Day ceremonies, the "Last Post" and "Reveille" (Rouse) is used to draw the symbolic association between the soldier's last duty of "sitting" sentry" (death) and his "rising" above his mortal duties (reveille).

11:00am Silence: The last note of the "Last Post" marks the beginning of the two (2) minutes of silence. During the silence we will remember our fallen comrades and those who have passed on since we last gathered together.

**Rouse:** (salute) Following the two-minute period of silence, the "Rouse" shall be sounded. #### **HISTORY of The LAST POST/ ROUSE**

regulated by drumbeats. Later that same century the bugle call was introduced and was used for both field maneuvers and during camp routine to initiate a conditioned response from the soldier. Certain "calls" were used to "order" changes in type, direction or speed of attack or withdrawal formations. However, the most utilized bugle calls were "Reveille", "Rouse" and "Last Post". The "Rouse" was used as a "quarter call" to wake the soldiers fifteen minutes before the more formal activity announced by "Reveille", which was a more complicated call by all the buglers.

In the early 20th century, the need for two "wake-up" calls was reduced. In 1909, the longer call (Reveille) nated "Reveille". However, in 1927, the longer call was reinstated. British ceremonial manuals declared that the "Rouse" would be used for funeral services throughout the Empire.

Today, the two titles are used interchangeably although the longer of the two calls is seldom heard.

"Last Post" is one of the regulation calls that would be heard in the evening to signal the completion of the setting of night sentinels or sentry posts. "First Post" signaled the mounting of the "guard" or sentry posts. "Last Post" would then be sounded to signal that the camp was secure and that all sentry posts were manned and ready.

Primary to Grade 6 have been invited from New Germany and West Northfield.





To help get you started here are a few tips to alleviate some of the pre-holiday craziness and post holiday debt.



## Christmas Trees and the New Germany Area

have a fairly long history together. The first documented sale of Christmas trees to buyers outside of Nova Scotia actually occurred from Chester Basin in either 1922 or 1923. Newspaper archives indicate that Arthur Manual shipped a few carloads of trees before 1924. As major American cities like Chicago, New York and Boston depleted the source of naturally growing trees from their neighbouring woodlots, they were forced to search further and further away to find a source of Christmas trees. Finally, when they arrived in Atlantic Canada they found an area where the moist maritime climate and cooler temperatures allowed for the plentiful natural regeneration of the beautiful Balsam fir Christmas tree. An industry developed. Our provincial industry peaked in export numbers in 1957 when an astounding 3.8 million trees were shipped to foreign markets. Farmers would go to their pasture edges and woodlots, cut the trees and often auction them from their front lawn as buyers for the major brokerage firms would travel the countryside, examining trees and leaving bids or offers with the owner.

As in any business, once successful, competition seems to have a way of finding you. In this case, the mid-western states of Michigan and Wisconsin developed a land reclamation project into a new, thriving business. In the 1950's they had begun planting Scots pine as a way to preserve overworked soils. It was soon realized that if the pine were sheared they could be put on the market as a "cultivated, improved Christmas tree". The industry was about to evolve. Cultivated pine started to replace natural Balsam fir in the market. By 1967 the export numbers for Nova Scotia had fallen to 1.8 million trees, just under half of the 1957 peak. Luckily, many of the American brokerage firms responded by purchasing land and starting to manage actual Christmas tree stands; spacing, shearing and fertilizing the Balsam fir so our trees could compete with these new pine trees. The three largest firms all developed centres of operation in the greater New Germany area. The Kirk family, from Washington State, operated from New Germany until just recently, and in their prime were the single largest Christmas tree production company in the world. But close behind were the M. Walters Company (Chicago) and the J. Hofert operation, the Hofert Company also from Washington State. Walters operated out of New Germany, where for years Chester Robar of New Germany managed their production from his home just up the hill from Riverside Apartments. The Kirk Company operated from the Zwicker Mill Road for many years until they moved to the Copeland Road off New Germany Lake. The Hofert operation was just over the road in the greater Caledonia area.

There were others. The Ted Drewes Christmas Tree company still operates from their magnificent yard on the lower end of the Goose Chase Road, opposite New Germany Building Supplies. And while the "big three" are no longer with us, their operations have largely been taken over by a number of different players, many native Nova Scotians, who continue to carry the business forward. The Caledonia / New Germany / New Ross axis was a prime production area, with farming and forestry operators who had the land, drive and opportunity to produce trees. A high percentage of the province's Christmas tree production comes from this area, and Lunenburg County was designated as the "Balsam Fir Christmas Tree Capital of the World" a number of years ago to recognize our prominence in the business. New Germany maintains a pivotal role in the Christmas tree trade. The Lunenburg County Christmas Tree Producers' Association owns an office on the Main Street, and also houses the Christmas Tree Council of NS office.

The business continues to change. In the early years everything went to \*Christmas Tree Farms the United States. Today markets are as diverse as western Canada, South America, Puerto Rico, other Caribbean islands, Panama, other central American countries, Mexico, Bermuda, Kuwait, Japan and on and on. Refrigerated shipment is common, and securing plant health certificates for international shipments are a big part of an exporter's life. Longer distances place more and more demand on the ability of a tree to "hold up", and keep it's needles. We lost ground to other species like Fraser and Noble fir, but a new investment in our improvement and future is underway with the recent development of the SMART Tree research initiative, where we are discovering the mechanism of needle loss and developing trees that will hold their needles aggressively and fresh for over 70 days. The industry has coordinated over 6 million dollars to invest in such improvement, and the Atlantic Christmas Tree Research Centre at the Agricultural College

in Bible Hill is under construction. It will be absolutely world class. In the near future we will be able to provide growers with the best quality, longest lasting, lowest cost of production Christmas tree in the world. Market conditions are very difficult right now, but New Germany and the Nova Scotia Christmas tree industry are at the beginning of another evolution in the business.

Today the greater New Germany area still boasts 400 plus growers, over 8000 acres of land in production, some of the best trees in the world, and an export sector that is finding it difficult, but still doing better than much of our competition in places like North Carolina and Oregon. We have a vibrant wreath and greenery business to complement the trees. The tree and greenery industry returns an estimated 35 to 40 million dollars to Lunenburg County alone. New Germany area trees and greenery have been a feature at the Canadian Embassy in Washington for almost 20 years. The industry will improve itself through SMART Tree. In this, the 500 year anniversary celebration of the first decorated Christmas tree in Rega, Latvia, the Christmas Tree Council of Nova Scotia will be introducing a new retail Code of Practice contract to assure that consumers are receiving fresh, well cared for Christmas trees. Christmas tree farms produce enough oxygen to provide for over 19 million people in North America every day. New Germany is a proud commercial center for the real tree trade, producing a product that acts as one of nature's air filters, absorbs carbon, and provides a fully recyclable product that enhances the environment - not detracts like our artificial competition. The world has been enjoying real Christmas trees for 500 years. We plan to still be here in another 500 years!





## Winter Running

### TIPS FOR STAYING SAFE and HAVING FUN



What could be better than cuddling up with a cup of java and a good book during those chilly winter days? A nice run in the fresh, crispy air of course! It will help to fight those winter blues, increase your energy and help make you healthier. However, running during the winter months can present different kinds of challenges than you might encounter during other months of the

year. You are faced with colder temperatures and different types of terrain, but if properly prepared, your running experience can be equally as enjoyable and safe during these months.

**DRESS IN LAYERS** - Start with a thin layer of material, such as polypropylene, which wicks sweat away from your body. No Cotton! It holds moisture and will keep you wet. This layer should fit snug against the skin. The outer layer should be a breathable layer made of nylon or Gore-Tex to protect you against the wind and precipitation. If it is really cold add a middle layer of polar fleece for warmth. Avoid overdressing. You should feel a little chilly when you start your run.

**PROTECT YOUR HANDS AND FEET AND COVER YOUR HEAD** - The majority of the body's heat is lost through the extremities. As much as 40% is lost through the head and up to 30% can escape through the hands and feet. Gloves are good for milder days, however, mittens are more effective during colder days because your fingers will share their body heat. Hand warmers feel great tucked inside your mitts! On really cold days, covering your mouth and nose with a scarf will help to warm the air before it hits your lungs and will make it easier to adjust to the colder weather. Also, on extremely cold days, it is a good idea to cover your face with a layer of petroleum jelly.

**PROTECT YOUR EYES** - The glare from the snow can cause snow blindness, so don't forget those sunglasses!

**TRACTION** - When running on the snow and ice a slip can happen very quickly and lead to an unwanted injury. To help avoid this, traction aids can be placed over your running shoes. They cannot completely prevent a slip or fall, but they will help.

**STAY HYDRATED!!!** - This is very important! You still heat up and loose fluids through sweat despite the cold weather. Cold air also has a drying effect, which can increase the risk of dehydration. Make sure you drink water or a sports drink before, during and after your run.


**WARM UP INSIDE BEFORE HEADING OUT** - Hit the treadmill or jog/march on the spot for a few minutes to get your muscles warmed up before going outside in the cold. This will help to prevent injuries. If it is extremely cold you are at a greater risk for a pulled muscle. On these days warm up slowly and run easy.

**BE PATIENT!** - It takes about two weeks to adjust to climate extremes!

**MY BEST KEPT SECRET!** - If you really want to go for that run but just can't push yourself out the door because it feels too cold, throw your running clothes in the dryer for a few minutes! It really works!
