Vimy Ridge

One of the greatest battles in Canadian history was the battle at Vimy Ridge, which began on 9 April 1917. Canadian bravery and valour led to the tremendous victory for the entire Allied Force and was considered the turning point of WWI.

Vimy Ridge was a formidable stronghold to breach. The German fortifications consisted of three layers of trenches, barbed wire and deep tunnels. French attempts to wrest control of the ridge throughout 1915 were rebuffed, resulting in some 150,000 French casualties. When the British army relieved French operations in March 1916, they were driven back before they could plan a major attack. The crucial goal of the battle at Vimy Ridge was to break through the impenetrable German lines.

For the first time in World War I, all four Canadian divisions fought on the same battlefield. All Canadian divisions fought together rather than mixed in with various British units. It was the first time the Canadians fought together, and they achieved a magnificent victory, sweeping the Germans off the ridge.

The victory of the battle of Vimy Ridge did not come without cost: Canadian casualties reached 10,602, of which 3,598 were killed. The opposing German force sustained a further 20,000 casualties. During this single campaign, four Canadians were awarded the Victoria Cross and the entire Canadian contingent was commended for their bravery.

Students from NGRHS were fortunate enough to visit Vimy Ridge. The following are some excerpts:

"The third day we went to Dachau Concentration Camp...It was a rainy day which, ironically, was the perfect setting for where we were...saw the crematorium buildings and graves that said "The Grave of Thousands of Unknown". Seeing all this made me think how lucky we are in Canada." -Kelsey Doucette

"After participating in NGRHS's trip to Europe and Vimy 2012, I have a new respect for WWII and just for Europe as a whole...I now understand what the concentration camps feel like, which you really don't know what the prisoners of these camps went through until you walk through them." – Nick Hatt

"Having the opportunity to visit the final resting place of my great-great uncle, Earle Rhodenizer, who lost his life fighting for our country, held special meaning for me. My family was proud that I was able to take this trip, and I was glad to be able to return back home and finish the trip in Uncle Earle's behalf." – Cody DeLong

"The main idea of the trip though, was to remember the soldiers lost in war. We visited multiple cemeteries, war museums, and did many ceremonies ourselves in honour and memory of the soldiers. Although those were the main points to our trip, the two parts that affected me most, even more than the cemeteries, were the Anne Frank House, and Dachau concentration camp... The Anne Frank House I had been looking forward to for so long, and had I not gone on this trip, I'm sure I would've gone on my own someday. It was really just the fact that I was standing where she stood; I was seeing the places she wrote about, day after day. I could relate to her, despite the differences in our time periods; I felt like I knew her, and understood her. So being in the secret attic, where she hid, it was amazing, and sad, and I'm so glad I got to. " – Dana Young

"When it rained all day whilst at Vimy Ridge, it didn't matter because we were on that day, and to this day, aware of the one fact that made the trip possible: we have an amazing community, a community that got us to that spot..." – Benjamin Hannah

"I really enjoyed this trip and will remember all the things we learned. We visited castles, Anne Frank House, the Vimy Memorial, and Dachau Concentration Camp. We saw many visuals and heard many stories of the liberation of these camps in Germany." – Dylan Conrad

"The second day in France we spent on Vimy...Cemetery Number Two...We stood in the rain for nine hours, but overall it was worth, every moment, because I owed it to the soldiers, both past and present." – Alana Mosher

"The people, in general, of The Netherlands were outstanding. Friendly doesn't describe it. These people treat Canadians with such friendliness and respect for reasons that occurred many years ago. A group of my friends

were actually thanked for what we as a country did for them during the war. It left us feeling overwhelmed and tearful, that even after all these years, when we weren't even close to existing ourselves, we were treated like heroes from that era." – Dylan Lowe

"The most emotional thing for me was the Holocaust section in the Imperial War Museum. I was looking at everything and it just gives you the chills, but when I came around a corner my breath was taken away. In the centre of the room was a long clear case, it was huge and it was filled with shoes. I couldn't take my eyes off it. There were so many shoes smaller than my hand. It was so eerie I had to leave. The image of the case will be permanently embedded in my memory for the rest of my life." – Rachel Penney

"... this trip isn't about me at all. This trip, to me, was about the people on it, it was about my Uncle Joe and about all the other soldiers that have fought wars all around the world. This trip was about keeping their memory alive, even if they aren't." – Jessica Joudrey

"The one thing I will never forget is a day in The Netherlands when a group of us with around eight or so students were walking down a street with our red Canada jackets on when a man drove past us on a bicycle. A few feet ahead he came to a complete stop, almost falling right off his bike. He jumped off and went to a chaperone who was with us and asked if we were all Canadians. We said yes, where we were from, and what we were doing there...thanked and blessed each and everyone of us who were there for liberating his country when he was just a boy and told us if we ever needed anything to just ask him." – Taleia Silver

"We also got to see the Begen Op Zoom War Cemetery which is a Canadian War cemetery and it made John McCrae's poem 'In Flanders Fields' make sense and seem real." – Emily Fancey

On this Remembrance Day, I encourage everyone to take the time to remember those who have fallen in the service of our country and those who continue to serve with courage and compassion.



"To finish, I am glad I went on this trip, I know I will always remember. It does strike me as strange though, on Remembrance Day (Armistice Day in Europe), everyone has a chance to go to a ceremony. In Nova Scotia we have so many people working that I think should be given the opportunity to go to a cenotaph...they are the people that our soldiers helped. I Will Always Remember, Will You?" – Michael Veinotte

New Germany Community Centre has an extension....

The Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal has entered into an agreement with New Germany Area Promotion Society which will allow us to remain in the Community Centre until March 2013. We will continue to hold our regular meetings there, run the Circuit program (as there is interest), use it as a home base for the Friday Night Youth Program, and have the Centre available for rent. We will attempt to run other programs and events as we are able. The Teen Youth Health component of the venture has moved to New Germany Rural High School.

In the last issue of this Newsletter we asked if there was any interest in having a New Germany Community Centre in the long term. Is this something the community needs or even wants? At this time there has been little response from the community, so presently NGAPS plans to vacate the building by the end of March and shelve the community centre idea. We are willing to work on this project if this is important to the community, but we have received no indication that such an interest exists.

As of mid November we are able to open 5284 highway 10 as the New Germany Community Centre for another 4 and a half months. It is a short reprieve and one we plan to use to our advantage.


We have added a new vendor for the Lions Radio Bingo. The Canadian Tire gas bar now sells Radio Bingo Books for our club.



New Germany Garden Club

The New Germany Garden Club met the fourth Wednesday of October to organize upcoming programs for the near future. We brought seeds collected by members for our table at the Health and Wellness Fair at New Germany Rural High School on Oct. 25th. We had a nice table display that gave people a chance to find out more about us.

In November we'll make decorations for over the doorway out of evergreen boughs and cones, bows, etc. called swags. They look pretty and smell so good with that evergreen fir fragrance that just puts you in the mood for Christmas.

We're all too busy in December to get together but the fourth Wednesday of January the program is on soil composition and acidity\alkalinity (also called ph). Other programs planned are a discussion on companion planting. Companion planting is the relationship between different plants; how their placement next to one another can improve or inhibit their growth.

Good gardeners are always looking for help with the work. If you have in mind to expand an existing garden or to make a new garden or you want to stop weeds from growing underneath trees and shrubs this tip is for you. LEAVES FEED WORMS. So get the leaves and the worms to do the work of creating a new garden. Here's how: 1)Decide on the site of the garden. 2)Pile leaves up on the site 3)Make children jump up and down on the leaves to break them up a bit. In the Spring: 4)part the leaves to find the soil beneath. 5)Amend that spot with compost and plant squash seeds. The old leaves will inhibit the growth of weeds and help the soil retain moisture. That moist organic material is just perfect for happy earthworms. The abundance of worm food (leaves) will help them produce lots of castings (worm poop) which is the ultimate plant food. It does not get any better than this if you are a plant.

How much work did you have to do? Short answer if we give credit where credit is due: the worms & the leaves did the majority of the work. You only had to move the leaves, plant the squash seeds and pick the squash. Perfect. Before you put your tools away...don't forget to plant the garlic. Happy Gardening!

Connections Reflections with:

Leigh & Delia Langille

"We had a good life"



The evening was cool with the first chill of early fall as I sat in the cozy country kitchen to chat with Leigh and Delia Langille about their life in New Germany. Two beautiful Himalayan cats named Mutt and Jeff stretch out leisurely on the living room rug.

Leigh tells me he was born in the heart of New Germany in 1921, and grew up on the property now known as Papa D's Pizza.. Leigh was the oldest of three children born to Norman and Claudia Langille., and is the only surviving sibling. He remembers his Mom as the parent wielding the most discipline, and well remembers his first day of school at North Rosedale. Having walked to the school house, he soon decided he didn't think

too much of school, and walked back home again. His mom was not pleased by this rebellion and switched his little bottom back up the road to the school. He says he remembers holding his bottom with both hands to protect his soft cheeks from the stings, but never skipped school again. Leigh speaks of his dad as a kind and quiet man who seldom raised his voice.

As a young boy Leigh learned to play the E Flat Alto horn under the instruction of Leon Nichols, and played in the New Germany band, of which Fred DeLong was the band master. During his years in the army he was in the military band and says he enjoyed playing every venue except at hockey games, which they were often required to do. Leigh is not a hockey fan. He has many musical instruments and has at one time or another played them all, though he tells me he was never able to play the piano with both hands. He has played the mouth organ and guitar for many dances around the area, though Delia says when he picked up the violin, that's when she would go for a walk.

Delia was born in 1925 in Barss Corner where she lived with her parents until they moved to Queens County when she was 11 years old. She was the second child of four. Delia remembers her dad as a good father but was seldom home as he worked for Bowater Mersey and stayed in woods camps for months at a time. This left her mom with the responsibility of house, home and children, and Delia says this often left her mom overwhelmed. Delia remembers the long woolen, red dyed socks her mom knit for the children, which kept them warm during the long cold winters. Times were tough she recalls, but everyone was in the same boat, and children appreciated what they had.

In 1940 -41 Leigh was working in East Dalhousie. He and some friends went to a silent movie one night, and when the movie was over, he and his friends were confronted by a group of girls who accused them of throwing peanuts at them. Leigh still maintains it wasn't him, but this was his first introduction to Miss Delia. There were more movies and a few dances and Leigh and Delia were an item.

In 1942 Leigh went into the army as a driving instructor where he served for four and a half years. In 1944 Leigh and Delia were married and lived with his parents in New Germany until after the war and Leigh came home to stay.

Leigh says Delia's mother must have liked him because he and Delia's brother would play tricks on the family, but she never got mad at him.

In 1947 they purchased what was then known as the Tannie Silver property on School Street. The tenants living there were building a new home in the village and needed to remain in the house for a few more weeks. However, what started out as a few weeks ended being a year. During this time Delia tells me they lived in two rooms of the house on the main floor and also had two rooms on the second floor, but no kitchen facilities.

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After the army, Leigh went to work at Zwicker's mill where he remained for eleven years. He remembers once hauling logs from the woods in Barss Corner one December and getting mired late in the day. He said the mud hole was like quick sand and they dumped a whole load of logs in the hole, but they just disappeared. Delia remembers being quite worried about him, and it was well after midnight till he returned home. No cell phones then to call home. Leigh says Mr. Zwicker was a fair and conscientious man, and he enjoyed his years in his employ. When Delia was having surgery in hospital, Mr. Zwicker loaned Leigh his car on several occasions to go to the hospital to visit her.

Delia remembers one trip with Leigh to Port Williams with a load of shooks. It was getting late when they were returning to New Germany and Leigh was tired. Unable to stay awake he told Delia she would have to drive the truck. Though she had never done so before, she knew this was what she had to do if they were going to sleep in their beds that night. Leigh says he worked nine hour days for \$4 a day when he started with the mill, and in 1955 was making \$6.10 a day.

During his working years, Leigh held jobs with several businesses either driving a truck or operating machinery. Many of his jobs took him away from home for long periods of time and Delia tells of her packing up the children, and following Leigh to stay all summer in a tent so the family could be together. She says they never got sick despite the sometimes inclement weather. She believes that sleeping that close to the earth beneath them kept them well.

Leigh told me he recently had a hair cut which cost him \$12. He remembers having the same service at Albert Veinot's barber shop for \$1.50 in the 1940's - 50's.

Leigh remains active around the property and has his own personal 'retreat' in the garage with a wood stove and two easy chairs for entertaining company should they drop by.

In her younger years Delia tells me she was quite athletic and today likes to watch golf on TV. She bowls each Tuesday with the New Germany and Area Seniors. She keeps her home neat and tidy, gives tender loving care to not only Leigh, but Mutt and Jeff, as well as knitting up a storm.




Did you know November is 4-H Month?



New Germany Parent & Tot Group




Wednesday mornings are filled with giggles and smiles at New Germany's Parent and Tot group. Babies and tod-dlers enjoy their weekly play group as much as they enjoy a freshly changed bum and a full sippy cup! Parent and Tot group is hosted by Tracy Dunn from the Family Resource Centre. Parents and their little one(s) arrive at the Anglican Church Hall around 10am or shortly after. The kiddos begin playing with each other right away while the moms chatter about their child's newest accomplishments or ask for other moms' advice and tips on different topics (toilet training, beginning solid foods, bedtime routines, teething, etc). On the first and third Wednesday each month Public Health Nurse, Karen Grandy joins us to answer parenting questions and to provide use of her baby scales. Following playtime we gather in a circle for a

story and sing songs. All of the toddlers then sit down together to have a healthy snack provided by the Family Resource Centre. Once the snack is finished and cleaned up, the toddlers participate in a structured activity (such as a craft, basketball, an obstacle course, etc). Parent and Tot group ends around 11:30.

We are fortunate to have such a wonderful program here in New Germany where our little ones have the opportunity to socialize with their peers at such a young age and where they are introduced to important virtues like generosity, patience and friendliness. Parent and Tot group is also a terrific support group of mothers who are dealing with or have dealt with the stresses and joys of becoming a first time parent. It's a place where parents can show up with that frazzled and sleep deprived look while splattered with baby spit up and it is completely normal!

FAQ By Dr. Barb O'Neil's Patients

With Dr O'Neil leaving the area, a number of clients of the New Germany & Area Medical Centre have been asking questions about the future of their health care. Below are some of the most frequently asked questions and their answers. We hope that you find this information to be of assistance.

Q: Is there a replacement for Dr. O'Neil?

There will be physicians and Nurse Practitioners rotating through the clinic until a new health care provider is recruited. As a result the status at the New Germany & Area Medical Centre is business as usual with new faces.

Q: What do we do if we get sick? I understand the Nurse Practitioner cannot take me as a patient, but will she see me if I get sick?

If you need to be seen by a physician or Nurse Practitioner call the centre and an appointment will be made for you with an appropriate health care provider.

Q: Is the nurse practitioner staying?

Yes, Jenn will continue to provide for your health care needs.

Q: What happens to our charts?

The charts remain at the Centre. You are still considered a patient at New Germany & Area Medical Centre.

Q: How do I get a prescription refill?

The process for refills has not changed. Your medications can be refilled by the appropriate provider during your appointment.

Q: When a replacement is found will the new Doctor automatically take over my care? *Yes, the intention is that they would.*

Q: Who will look at my outstanding test results?

Lab results are reviewed by the providers working at the clinic and you will be contacted if you need a follow-up visit.

Q: Who will look after my warfarin blood work results?

The physicians and/or the NP can adjust warfarin doses as well as order warfarin.

Q: Why can't we keep a doctor in New Germany?

Physicians are independent health care providers and can choose to work and live how and where they wish. At the present time the demand is more than the supply for physicians. So they have many options open to them.

Q: Why doesn't a doctor have to sign a contract to stay for a longer period of time?

The contracts are funded by the Department of Health & Wellness and are renewed on an annual basis. Physicians can leave as long as they provide 3 months written notice.

Q: Who do we contact to help get a doctor here?

South Shore Health is working with your local New Germany & Area Medical Center board.

Q: Can I go to another doctor?

You are still a patient of New Germany & Area Medical Centre and will have access to health care providers at the clinic. Physicians tend to only take patients who do not have a health care provider.

The Christmas Wreath

The first sign of Christmas is the hanging of the Christmas wreath on the front door. The common places to hang wreaths are on the door, walls and over fireplaces. Traditionally evergreen branches are used in making wreaths.

The origin of the Christmas wreath dates back to the ancient times of the Persian Empire. They were much smaller in size then the present ones and were know as "diadems". Much symbolism can be attributed to the Christmas wreath. The shape of a circle has no beginning and no ending. This represents the eternal nature of a god's love, or the circle of life. In the way we use house numbers today, wreaths featuring different floral arrangements were used to identify different families and houses.

Greeks stared placing wreaths made of laurel on the heads of athletes who came first in the Olympic Games. The transition of the wreaths from a headgear to a wall/door decoration is not know with much accuracy. However, it is believed that once an athlete decided to save the headgear as a souvenir, and since then began the tradition of using wreaths as a Christmas door/ wall decoration.

Lunenburg County is the Balsam Fir Christmas Tree Capital of the World. And the wreath industry is growing every year. Too bad there is only a small window of opportunity to produce and sell this product. On our farm we make all sizes from 10" to 60", yes 60". Most are made only with Balsam Fir, but we do make some mixed wreaths using cedar, pine and juniper.

Today wreaths are a wonderful decorative touch at Christmas time. Whether you hang a wreath on the door to welcome family, or on the wall to complete a room's décor, the splash of colour on a cold winter's day is sure to add a feeling of warmth and that famous Christmas aroma that brings back special memories of Christmases past.

Many times throughout the summer we saw beavers. One particular, clear morning, as we had turned back towards the shore, we watched for 5-10 minutes as a beaver swam in circles in front of us. Perhaps unaware that we were watching, he seemed to be playing in the water, swimming this way and that, we never knew where he would reappear when he went under. We excitedly watched, waiting to shout, "There he is!" Almost like a kid's game! Why not? Out here on the water, away from life's important "stuff", just "being", and for the time on the water, we just "are". So for this moment we choose to play a child's game,...because we can!

We paddle on, scanning the shoreline, hoping to spot another brilliant sight. Maybe some ducks (yes, we have seen a few of those!), a muskrat, or the beauty of the light of the sun as it shines through the bushes and trees and sparkles across the water. Oh yes, we've seen all of these and the intricate artwork on the shores of the LaHave created by the webs of the spiders! What beauty! We stop to study and watch as the spiders create their masterpieces! Nothing short of amazing! Such simplicity of life, a spider's web, yet so complicated and intriguing! Something to be appreciated, yet most often overlooked in the busyness of our lives.

Here on the water, we get a different perspective. We slow down, we see more, we hear sharper, we experience different. What a great way to start our days! Canoeing the LaHave River from the New Germany Lake, early in the morn as the night becomes day, darkness becomes light, our eyes open to a wonderful new day!
