Ever wonder how the money collected in our area for poppies, wreaths and crosses is spent? Here is the Poppy Campaign Financial Report for the New Germany Legion.

In Canada, the Poppy has stood as a visual symbol of our Remembrance since 1921. However, its presence over the graves of soldiers, and in the fields of honour, was noted as early as the 19th century after the Napoleonic Wars. The reason for its adoption over 100 years later in Canada was due to, in no small part, Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae and his now famous poem, "In Flanders Fields".

The lapel Poppies that are worn in Canada today were first made, beginning in 1922, by disabled Veterans under the sponsorship of the Department of Soldiers Civil Reestablishment. Until 1996, Poppy material was made at the "Vetcraft" sheltered workshops run by Veterans Affairs Canada in Montreal and Toronto. The work provided a small source of income for disabled Veterans and their families, allowing them to take an active part in maintaining the tradition of Remembrance.

When it no longer became practical for Veterans Affairs Canada to maintain the "Vetcraft" operations, The Legion volunteered to take on the continuing responsibility for the production of Poppies. In so doing, Dominion Command has awarded a production contract to a Canadian company to produce the Poppies. All operations are conducted under strict Legion control and oversight.



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Connections Reflections with:



Minnie Rachel (Mauger) Pineo

was born on August 20th, 1918 in Petites, a little place – an island off the south of Newfoundland. Her parents were Edward and Mary (Strickland) Major. Minnie was one of six girls and six boys. Like many others, her father fished for cod.

The family did not have much. There was no hot or cold water – not even a hand pump. The only way off the island was to row a boat. Although Minnie worked hard, she enjoyed her years. However, it was seldom she could get anywhere because of the wind and the loppy water.

At Christmas time they would receive a chocolate bar or an orange. She said that she was so proud of it she didn't like to eat it.

By the time she was 7 or 8 she was baking bread because her mother was so busy having children. Minnie couldn't go to school too much because she was needed at home to help with the work. By age 12 she was out of school. Minnie helped her mother and sisters wash clothes on a washboard and laid them on the grass to dry. There were too many rocks to have a clothes line.

They picked bake apples, partridge berries, blueberries and marsh berries. At that time, moose were referred to as deer. The family had good meats to eat but did not have fruit. Sometimes when she and her siblings wanted a peppermint or a candy, they would take a piece of dry fish to her Uncle Jack's store and exchange. Growing up the only time she and her brothers and sisters saw money was for the collection plate – fifteen cents.

When Minnie was 15 years old she left Newfoundland with sixty cents in her pocket. She took the ferry from Port aux Basques to North Sydney and then travelled by train to Halifax. She required surgery for her appendix. Dr. Killam performed the surgery. While recuperating, she found herself a job doing housework for a family in Cambridge working for \$1 a month. She lived with the family for eight years.

Minnie had a few family members living in Nova Scotia and one day when she went by train to Halifax to visit her sister she met her future husband. She said it was love at first sight!

There were no lights at her home in NL when she left but later the government installed a generator to supply lights. She remembers when salmon cost 10 cents a pound. Her grandmother delivered all of her Mom's kids as well as all of the other children in Petites, including twins. There was no doctor, no pills or anything available in Petites. Her Granny took roots out of the garden for medicinal purposes.

Two pieces of advice that Minnie's mother passed on to her and she has lived by are, "Work will never kill you" and "You can be poor but you also can be clean". Minnie recalls scrubbing the floor with a brush and soap every other day. The floor was boards with a few mats scattered around.

Minnie's mother was a religious woman who prayed at all meals. Her mother read the Bible but never ever went to school. She read the Bible from Genesis to Revelations. Minnie's father would fill in for the minister when he could not get there due to rough weather conditions. The family attended the United Church which still stands on the island although the government removed all residents from there more than ten years ago. Each family had their own pew.

Minnie and her husband lived on Buckingham Street in Halifax for fifteen years. He worked for the Ship-yards. Minnie found it noisy, dirty and the rent was expensive. Eventually they moved to Terrance Bay. They had four children – Harry, Barb, Sandra and John. Sometimes they attended hockey games at the rink.

Later in life, Minnie moved to Nictaux to live in a granny suite at Sandra's. She lived there 18 years. She now lives at Riverside Apartments in New Germany and recently celebrated her 95th birthday.

Minnie believes hard work and eating well attributes to a long life. She eats gallons of honey. The only time she was ever in the hospital was for her appendix and giving birth.

Minnie enjoys reading the newspaper, doing lexicons and crosswords as well as attending card parties and bingos.

October 2nd the New Germany Garden Club met at N.G.R.H.S. This is the first business meeting we have had since May. In June we met to transplant impatiens and Wave petunias into the planters that we have placed around the community. At the October meeting we set a date to remove the spent blooms in the planters and to replace them with branches of fir and pine, Canada holly and hydrangea for seasonal interest. Oh, how nice the planters looked this year. The one that had been at the Community Centre is now in front of the N.G. post office. The others remain at the fire hall, the Freshmart, and at the 'Welcome to New Germany' sign. All of the transplants for these were generously donated by Barbara Veinot- a most generous gift!



Happy gardening!

In August Sue Gilmore, garden club member, invited us to tour her gardens. Sue is a very enthusiastic and knowledgeable gardener. Her gardens are complex and fascinating with bulbs, perennials, annuals, shrubs and trees from all over the world, some common to us and others very rare. Her gardens are a blending of native and exotic species.

The Garden Club bulb sale that happened in Sept. and Oct. did well. We found 1,300 new homes for daffodils and hyacinths. Mid-May 2014 will be something to see and smell around here when all of these bulbs are in bloom. Thank you to everyone for buying bulbs and helping the garden club.

October 23rd we met to prepare for the Health and Wellness Expo. 'Windlestraws' (an old word for dried grasses and seed heads of plants) were bundled. These windlestraws add interest to dried flower arrangements. We took

them, along with cones, acorns and gourds to sell at the table we shared with the New Germany Area Promotion Society. There are many interesting people with all kinds of talents living and working locally. This event gives everyone a chance to visit around table to table and find out what is available to them and to make personal contact with the people offering these services.

Our November meeting is set aside to learn how to make something to decorate for the holiday season. This year we are using candle wax, cold water and ice cubes to make a centrepiece candle.

January will begin our program series. Lynn, our president, is a very keen gardener and she is blind. What a unique perspective she has on gardening. She is presenting a program that she has titled 'Gardening in the Dark'. She will tell us how she gardens, as well as how we can accommodate her and others with impaired vision through thoughtful garden designs that make access to the garden easier. How do you identify plants when you cannot see them? Hmmm. I'm sure Lynn will have some advise to give.

By our name, New Germany Garden Club, one would presume that we are exclusive to New Germany. Wrong! We're gardeners from all over who share an interest in gardening and meet in New Germany. All are welcome to join us.

A gardening tip given here with the thought that "Good advice bares repeating." Soil should never be left

uncovered. Old vegetable plants should be removed to the compost pile. They may have insects or disease and the compost pile is the place for them. Once the old veggie plants are removed tuck your garden in for Winter with a cover of leaves. Spread out on the garden, they protect the soil from erosion. Leaves will break down and feed worms and soil organisms. Leaves act as a barrier to weeds that germinate despite cooler temperatures. To collect leaves use an old tarp, place it next to a pile of leaves, rake them onto the tarp, drag it to the garden and dump it. Solve two problems at once. The leaves are off the lawn-(one) and the leaves are a blanket of goodness covering the garden-(two) You are another step closer to being ready for Spring.



Walks @ 6:00 Report

NGAPS recently sponsored four Walks at 6:00. Each walk was about an hour long, included a combination of trail and road and suitable for strollers. This is the fourth session we have organized, two Spring walks and two Autumn walks for a total of 16 walking adventures.

Search & Rescue Dogs

Sherry and Creig Veinot have been involved in search and rescue for 25 years. Their enthusiasm for their work is infectious.



Miss Reba is a Czechoslovakian Shepherd and loves to work.

The German Shepherds that Creig trains come from the RCMP breeding program. These puppies start being evaluated and trained from three months of age. They are assessed for their prey drive and motivation. In their early days they are exposed to different environmental stimulation such as noise.

At 6 months they are started on a short tracking course. As training progresses, the dogs learn article searching. By the time they are a year old they are certified to work search and rescue.

A very important component of a successful search and rescue team is the bond between owner and dog. While the team works together, they are expected to maintain their certification. The dog must practice at least two to three times a week. The han-

dler gets re-certified annually.



Dax is a German Shepherd. Both dogs are certified in the RCMP Civilian Search and Rescue Dog Program.

When the dog is working, they need to be confident in different environments. These environments can include: woods, open areas, dirt roads, pavement, climbing stairs and getting into elevators. During their search the canines cannot become distracted by other scents.

When the dog is performing article sniffing, their nose must be into the wind so that they can pick up the scent. When they are tracking, their noses are usually on the ground. When the dog finds something they indicate by their body language or barking.

These highly trained handlers and dogs perform an important service to our community. I would like to thank Sherry and Creig for their contribution.

Reconnecting

Jenna Nodding grew up in Branch LaHave where she still has family. She won awards in soccer, basket-ball and track and field while in high school. After graduating from New Germany Rural High in 2003, she attended the University of Calgary for her undergraduate and completed her masters at Queens. When not hiking, biking, skiing, mountain or rock climbing, Jenna works as a physiotherapist. In the Spring and Summer of this year Jenna hiked the Appalachian Trail.

Imagine you're dropped off in the middle of the woods with six random strangers and the closest town is over an hour away. Last night's storm has left fresh snow and ice on the ground beneath your feet. Your breath condenses in the cool morning air. You take in a cool deep breath and look on in disbelief as you know that you have over 2000 miles ahead of you. Before your nerves start to talk you down, you do the only thing you can in a moment like this, you put one foot in front of the other and start walking.




This is what I experienced on March 27, 2013 as I started my hike from Springer Mountain, Georgia to Mt Katahdin, Maine. I followed the Appalachian Trail as it snakes its way along the ridge line of the Appalachian Mountains for 2186miles or 3498km (Roughly the same distance from New Germany, NS to Winnipeg, MB). The trail has few trail markers and travels, for the most part, entirely through wilderness.

Most thru-hikers walk northward (as I did) from Georgia to Maine, and generally start out in early spring and follow the warm weather as it moves north. Before I left on my solo journey I had my hands full with logistics. To ensure I had a healthy balanced diet I had to cook, dehydrate, vacuum seal, and pack 150 suppers; develop an anticipated itinerary; pack every piece of gear that I would need for a five month journey; and organize my caseload at work so that another physiotherapist could take over my clients. In the end I packed 12 boxes, each with approximately two weeks' worth of food and extra supplies that I would need. Luckily, one of my friends graciously offered to be my support crew and they mailed my boxes to various towns along the trail. The one thing that I did not anticipate and could not plan for was the open, honest and genuine hospitality of the surrounding communities. The term "trail magic" has been coined for instances when someone helps out a hiker, it could be anything from giving a hiker food, a roof over their head, or a ride into town. My first exposure to trail magic left me feeling confused and uncertain of their intentions. Why was this random person set up at a secluded road crossing handing out potable water, hot dogs, and chili? But the reality of it was these "trail angels" had no hidden objective. Like their mythical counterparts each trail angel was there for the sole reason of providing us with a random act of kindness. I came across many acts of trail magic, everything from bottled water, to a couple giving away \$800 dollar's worth of groceries. It was truly amazing how much delight a small unselfish act brought to the hikers.

On the trail, I developed a renewed appreciation for all the small things in life. Having a shower, an ice cold glass of water, clean clothes, and fresh food was like being a kid and told Christmas morning that you are going to Disney Land. I learned to appreciate my life back in Canada and gained a better understanding of where my true values lay. I no longer wish to buy a fancy house filled with lots of shiny objects. Instead I wish to be close to those in my community and continue to foster our relationships. Eve-

rything that I needed for my five month journey fit into a 44L backpack. Upon my return to the real world I find myself continuing with this lifestyle, leaving 90% of my belongings in storage, wondering what I am going to do with it.

The outdoors can be a nurturing place; Mother Nature can give you clarity and a sense of connectedness. I hope that all of you have the opportunity to experience this, whether it be going for a walk in the evening, sitting by a stream, or exploring where those old railway beds go. Get outdoors and see what there is to be seen.



Where there's a Will....There's a Workout

For a number of years, there has been a place to exercise in New Germany. A small but dedicated group of ladies have taken advantage of this opportunity - first at a privately run circuit, then at the Community Centre under the auspices of New Germany Area Promotion Society using the same weight-training equipment. When the Centre no longer had a full time employee, this group ran the program themselves for over a year.

This last March, it looked as though the death knell had sounded for this group - their location was closed and was due to be demolished over the summer. This left the group with very few options for a location to have an exercise program and no equipment.

But, these women are nothing if not resourceful. Over the summer, one of the members approached the New Germany Legion and was able to arrange the rental of space three mornings a week. A small television was found and everyone searched their closets for exercise CDs.

The group meets Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays at 8:30. The program runs about 50 minutes and the cost is currently \$20.00 a month. It's an opportunity to get moving and socialize and if you are interested, drop in on any of the mornings to find out more. Brings your sneakers and your good humour - it's fun!

100 Years of 4-H in Canada

Many of us in the New Germany Area are familiar with the local 4H clubs but know little about what it is. The 4 Hs stand for head, heart, hands and health. The goal of 4H is to develop citizenship, leadership, responsibility and life skills in youth. There are clubs in over 80 countries worldwide. Recently Bridgewater enthusiastically hosted this year's 4H Provincial Show as 4H celebrated it's 100th year.

Twelve year old twins, Joshua and Jacob Foster of Maplewood are members of the Livewires 4H club of Parkdale/Maplewood and participated in the Provincial Show. Both boys are in grade 7 at NGRHS. Joshua and Jacob joined 4H at the Cloverbud level (ages 7-9) before starting as a Livewire when they turned 10 (up to age 21). Their parents, who are 4H leaders encouraged them to participate in the wonderful program.

To earn a spot to compete in the Provincial Show you first have to enter your project in the Bridgewater Exhibition. If your project is declared a winner at exhibition you receive the honour to move on and compete at the Provincial Show with the best of Nova Scotia. Joshua entered the woodworking competition and received 5th place at the Provincial Show. Jacob entered his recycling project in the Provincial Show and placed 6th. Jacob and Joshua both also participated in the Tug of War Competition.

Jacob has completed three other projects this year: dog obedience, crafts and the great outdoors. Joshua's other completed projects this year include: woodworking, poultry and crafts.

Jacob and Joshua have a few things to say about 4H.

What is 4H?

Jacob- "4H is a group that is all over Canada. We celebrated 100 years of 4H this year. I am in Livewires 4H in Maplewood. We have over 30 kids in our club. We have lots of projects that you can take, with animals or without."

What is the Tug of War Competition at the Provincial Show?

Jacob- "We practice tug of war from May – October each week at Jonathan Crouse's house. There are kids from all clubs who go. We are all good friends and act like a big family. We compete at exhibition and the Lunenburg County team goes to pro show to pull. You need 10 people on the rope. 4 are girls. Our weight cant be anymore than 1325 lbs. Pulls are 5 minutes. You get tired but its fun."

Joshua- " I have been on Lunenburg County tug of war for 2 years. Each county has a team that competes at Pro show and other pulls like at Exhibition. I have made a lot of friends from being in Tug of War. The kids on my team are from all over Lunenburg County. We have a lot of fun. We have to weigh 1325 lbs and the pulls are 5 minutes. The teams compete against each other."

Loaded in Stanburne on September 27th, the 40-foot fir was sent as the annual gift from the city of Halifax to its twin city Hakadote – located on Hokkaido, the most northerly of Japan's four main islands. Westwood Shipping Lines donated container transport for the tree, which was to travel by truck to Montreal and by rail to Vancouver before starting its ocean voyage.

Recipe

Is your house crazy on Christmas morning? Not a lot of time to prepare a healthy breakfast? Try this tasty breakfast casserole in the crock pot. It cooks while you sleep!

Ingredients:

1 bag 26 oz. frozen hash browns

12 eggs

1 cup milk

1 tablespoon ground mustard

1 16 oz. roll sausage

maple, sage or regular sausage.

Salt and pepper

16 oz. bag shredded cheddar cheese

Directions:

- 1. Spray crock pot and evenly spread hash browns at the bottom.
- 2. Crack 12 eggs in a large bowl.
- 3. Mix well (and slowly) using a whisk.
- 4. Add the milk.
- 5. Go ahead and sprinkle in the ground mustard.
- 6. Add plenty of salt and lots of fresh pepper. Mix well and set aside.
- 7. Cook the sausage on high heat, drain and set aside.
- 8. Add sausage on top of hash browns.
- 9. Is this enough cheese? Maybe? Probably. Throw the whole big bag in there.
- 10. Mix well.
- 11. Pour the egg mixture over everything in the crock pot. Using a wooden spoon, even everything out so it's spread evenly.
- 12. Turn the crock pot on low for 6-8 hours.

Some fun variations of this recipe. Before cooking (during prep) you can add: chunks of sourdough bread, diced chilies, salsa or diced green onions

Storing Food for Winter
