### New Germany Medical Centre 25th Anniversary

On September 9<sup>th</sup>, the New Germany and Area Medical Centre celebrated 25 years of operation. An organizing committee was set up during the winter of 2018 to co-ordinate the event, which was held at the Medical Centre. One hundred to one hundred and fifty people attended on a beautiful afternoon. A live country music show situated on the lawn was provided by Mellie Robar and Peggy Tufts. Free cornon-the-cob was cooked by committee member Greg Selig, and a fresh vegetable juice cocktail was made on the spot by Bert Brendelle. Cathy Moore provided a celebratory cake, while Mary Alexander poured tea and coffee. Inside the Medical Centre, a documentary DVD was shown which covered the construction history of the building. This documentary, assembled by the committee assisted by Del Trobak, featured historical pictures and video from 1993, as well as new interviews from 2018.

Several health oriented booths were set up, providing information and products to the public. They were "Nourishing Healthstyles" (Lisa Staples); "4 hands, 2 hearts for Healing" (Reid Lohnes); "Valley Flax Flour / Valley Kitchen Gluten Free" (Howard Selig); "Nova Scotia Foot Care Nurses Interest Group" (Terry Keddy) and "Young Living Essential Oils" (Haley Lorman). 

#### WINTER GREEN CART TIPS

Food waste can freeze in your green during winter, making it difficult to empty. Here are a few things you can do:

Place your cart roadside every two weeks -- even when it isn't full.

Strain wet foods then wrap in newspaper or stick them in a cereal box.

Line your cart with a paper leaf and yard waste bag.

Line the bottom of your cart with balls of newspaper to keep food waste from freezing to the grate or plastic.

Layer food waste with sawdust or dry leaves.







### Reconnecting with the Meindl Family

"They're hurting Passa Meindl! They're hurting Passa Meindl", exclaimed the very young and horrified Karsa Veinotte, just before she tried to dart past her parents to go to try to help him. It was at an ecumenical Good Friday Service in the early 70's at New Germany Rural High in which Pastor Rolf Meindl played the role of Jesus being tried and crucified. It was a moment which pointed to the richness of his ministry and relationships here in our communities. As a pastor, he was committed to Christ, enthusiastic, encouraging, outspoken and dramatic; he promoted ecumenical co-operation, and he was much loved by people of all ages and denominations.

It was Rolf Meindl's ordination as a Lutheran pastor which brought the family to New Germany. When he graduated from Waterloo Lutheran Seminary in 1966, his wife recalls he was to be sent 'out west, up north, or down east'. They decided a small town in Nova Scotia, ironically named New Germany, would be the best choice for Rolf, Elfriede, and their four children, Susan, Patricia, Carol, and Rolf, Jr.

Rolf and Elfriede had emigrated from Germany in 1951 making a brief stop at Pier 21 in Halifax, before moving to Toronto where Rolf's sister was living, and where he had been offered a job as a mechanic. Rolf and Elfriede had been born between the two World Wars in the south of Germany, near Stuttgart. Their lives and education were disrupted by World War Two. Following the war, they married and began

to make a life in the difficult conditions in their devastated country. He was a master millwright, and she worked for a local potter where she learned the principles of drying, glazing and firing pottery in large kilns. With the hard circumstances in post war Germany, they decided their best hope at a life together would be to emigrate.

They set off for Canada on the ship Canberra, with \$30 each in their pockets and a wooden crate of household items. When they finally arrived by train in Toronto at midnight in pouring rain, Elfriede

remembers the joy and delight with which they embraced, repeating over and over, "We are here. We are here!"

In those difficult early years, they struggled to support themselves and learn the language and were able to save for a home. It was during this time that Rolf encouraged Elfriede to try creating figurines. He built her a small electric kiln and she set out to develop her modeling skills. While in Toronto, Susan and Patricia were born. Rolf felt called to the ministry and they moved to Waterloo where he studied for six years at Waterloo Lutheran University (now Wilfred Laurier University). Carol and Rolf Jr were born during these years, and Elfriede rose to the challenge of providing a happy and fulfilling family life while her husband studied.

From 1966 to 1979, the Meindls lived in the parsonage in New Germany. It was an interesting living

arrangement, next door to the church, and with their basement being used for church meetings and Sunday School classes. Rolf served in a team ministry with two other pastors, in four parishes, which took him to 13 congregations in pretty much every community in Lunenburg County north of Bridgewater. He touched many lives within the church and communities, and the churches thrived under his leadership and the teamwork he encouraged. He forged strong relationships with his parishioners and was part of many family baptisms, weddings and funerals. He was often invited back to the parish for special occasions after his retirement.

The Meindl children adapted well to the quiet country life and were welcomed into the church family life. They attended school and made friends here. Susan, Patricia, and Carol completed their Grade 12 at New Germany Rural High and left to go on to university. Rolf had completed Grade 11 here and then graduated from Bridgetown Regional High before heading off to university.



Shortly after the family had settled in New Germany, Elfriede began to make figurines again to supplement Rolf's income. She used simple household-kitchen tools, mainly a rolling pin, darning needle, paring knife and tea strainer which she had at hand. Her first ones were entered in the exhibition at Bridgewater. She won first prize, and she was immediately contacted by the Teazer in Mahone Bay. They asked her to consider making Nova Scotia fishermen. From then on, what she thought might be a way to earn a bit of extra money for family holidays became a part-time and then a full-time job. She made fishermen and fisherwomen, a wide variety of figurines based on local legends, many special orders for dignitaries visiting the provinces, including the Queen Mother and Princess Diana. She worked with many other craftsmen and artists and established and participated in many shows throughout the province. The popularity of her work is legend! To mark her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday, her children prepared a beautiful website where you can read more about her work and see pictures of her figurines (http://meindlfigurines.ca/)

When Rolf retired in 1979, they moved to their home in Outram on the Bay of Fundy. Elfriede continued with her work until 2003. She also wrote and illustrated about 4 children's picture books and a novel trilogy about a young boy finding his way in the world (Christopher - self published). Since there are no Lutheran Churches in the Valley, Rolf developed a relationship with Trinity Anglican Church in Middleton where he was welcomed into their worshipping community and where he did some guest preaching for about 10 years.

Rolf died in 2013 at the age of 88. In 2015, Elfriede returned to Toronto, where she first began her life in Canada, to be nearer to her children and grandchildren. Rolf Jr lives in Toronto and works in IT with the Canadian Diabetes Foundation; Patricia, also in Toronto, is a librarian at the University of Toronto; Susan, a psychologist, lives in Montreal; Carol, also in Montreal, is the Executive Director of the Ouebec Federation of Home and School Associations (English). There

are grandchildren: Susan has two grown daughters; Carol, two grown sons, and Patricia a teenage son. The family still owns the home in Outram and most of them find their way back to Nova Scotia each summer.

Elfriede speaks very fondly of her years in New Germany, and is thankful for her good life and family.

Carpenter's Plane



A hand plane is a tool for shaping wood. They are used to flatten, reduce the thickness of and give a smooth surface to a rough piece of lumber. Hand held planes typically come with a 3 1/4 inch wide plate and use two

carbide cutting blades. These blades have two sharp edges so when one side becomes dull you can just flip it around and have a sharp edge.

A big thank you goes out to the O2 students who helped throughout the afternoon and especially to those who stayed to help until we closed down at about 5:30. The administration of the school also






