Recalling 1958

One of the interesting things about having a shop in a small community is the people you meet.

A couple from Maine came in late one day this fall saying "We are glad to have caught you, we know you close at five." They wanted to get something from New Germany to take home to his parents.

And then I started to learn the story about why they were here and why they wanted to take something from New Germany home.

They had never been to our area but his grandmother was from New Germany, she went to the States as a young woman to train as a nurse, met his grandfather there who was from the Pleasant River area, a familiar story of Maritimers in the New England states.

His father grew up in the States, presently

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living in Maine. As a child and young man he would visit New Germany making his last visit in 1958 when he and his American wife came here on their honeymoon. They stayed with his uncle and aunt, (my customer's great uncle and aunt) on their farm on the Osborne Road. His family was Rennie and Alice Rhoda Conrad and they owned the first farm on the right on that road. His father told them stories from this area and remembers his uncle farming with oxen and horses. Rennie was his mother's brother.

Then my customer showed me a map that his father had drawn for them on the day they left for Nova Scotia, from memory, of the village in 1958 so they could find the farm, the Lutheran Church and other places. They were happy to have directions to the farm and had already been to the cemetery.



The map is an amazing rendition of his 1958 memory of New Germany. Part of the reason for making the trip was for his dad who had never made it back here but also to recreate his parents' 1958 honeymoon as they were also on their honeymoon.

If you have "lost" American cousins who are Conrads from New Germany or Morleys from Pleasant River, and you want to get in touch, drop by the shop, I have contact information.


So many happenings at the Café over the first year! The Café hosted a double birthday

know so we can look at the future of this Expo.



Local Authors Publish Short Story Collection to Raise Funds for Bookmobile

A group of writers who have been gathering at the Margaret Hennigar library in Bridgewater have been using a simple method to take the fear out of the blank page: word prompts.

We pick a word and assign ourselves homework: a 500-word piece of writing, any type of writing, and read it out loud to each other at the following meeting. The results have been wacky and wide: a word prompt of "galaxy" brought stories about an unexpected supermodel and breakfast. A prompt about "lavender" brought stories about a commune and office politics.

As the weeks and months went by the stories added up. Some were funny, some bittersweet. Some went well over the 500-word limit. At the same time, the writers -- who by now were calling themselves the South Shore Scribes -- noticed a need to help support a vital library resource for the community: the Mobile Library.

It traverses Lunenburg and Queens counties, including stops in Barss Corner and New Germany every Tuesday, and in August, Chief Librarian Troy Myers told CKBW he's hoping to have a bus on the road in two years to replace the current one which is 10 years old.

The South Shore Scribes decided to support the Bookmobile, raising funds and publicity for the bus, by gathering a collection of stories in One Word, an anthology of writing with many of the stories based on our word prompt exercises.

The book is available for \$20 at all library locations (Bridgewater, Liverpool, Lunenburg, Greenfield, and the Mobile Library) as well as at Village Glassworks in New Germany and other retail locations in the area. All profits go toward supporting the Bookmobile, and much of the printing cost was offset thanks to a generous donation.

Join the writing group every Wednesday from 6pm to 8pm at the library in Bridgewater, and through the month of November we will be tackling National Novel Writing Month, or NaNoWriMo (nanowrimo.org), so join us as we try to reach a goal of writing 50,000 words in a month! 

Reconnecting with the Maders

A hundred years ago there were two general stores in Barss Corner, Mader's and deLong's. Howard and Etta Mader had a son, John, in 1918. Fred and Ethel deLong had a daughter, Judith, in 1921. Along with being merchants, both fathers were band masters and both mothers had been school teachers. In this small, safe community John and Judith attended the one room school in Barss Corner, went to church, John Baptist and Judith United, and Sunday School, enjoyed summer and winter activities at Lake William and both belonged to the Baptist Young People's Society. When they were 11 and 14 years old, they began to realize theirs was a special



To finish high school in the 30's and 40's students had to leave their rural community. John went on to Horton Academy in Wolfville to the business academy and then went on to Acadia University where he earned a BSc in math and economics. John enlisted in the army in 1942, receiving officer training in British Columbia and serving overseas in Italy and Northwestern Europe. Judith completed her Grade Twelve in Bridgewater and then pursued voice and secretarial training at Mount Allison University. Her next adventure was in Montreal where she worked for C-I-L "Cellophane" Division and sang in several church and community choirs. A very memorable event was when she sang in Handel's Messiah as part

of a 500 voice choir at Notre Dame Cathedral! When John returned home after the war, Judith came home as well. In 1946 they were married and moved in with John's mother who had been left to operate the family store after her husband died and John was serving his country. John and Judith began a busy life together operating Mader's Store, raising seven children and participating in church and community.

Judith describes the early years of general stores as operated by their fathers. "The method of merchandising was entirely different from that of today although buying in bulk seems to be making a comeback. Large bins held white, brown and icing sugars, rolled oats, beans, rice, barley and split peas. Others held oyster shell for poultry consumption, sulphur, Epsom salts and washing starch. Corned beef, salt pork, herring and vinegar came in barrels and molasses in puncheons. The stock included men's clothing and boots, sewing needs and a variety of patent medicines. A lot of the shopping



was done by the man of the house. He would come to the store bringing items such as eggs and butter for trade. He would bring a memorandum for needed items and sit on a chair or barrel and wait while the merchant filled the order. There was no self-serve in those days."

In 1968, John built a new, modern store to replace the one built in 1908. Animal feed and farm needs were still very important products and delivery was available for that as well as groceries for many years. It was a rich life of hard work, making many good relationships and meeting the needs of the community that required long hours with few days off. In 1983 their son, Peter, took over ownership of the store while his parents enjoyed some well-earned retirement. Peter operated it until 2018 when it was sold and continues to serve the area under new management.

By 1952 the Maders had built their own home near the store. Keeping house, raising seven children, Nancy, John, Peggy, Mary, Peter, Neil and Melanie, sometimes working in the store and feeding hired help made for rich and busy years for Judith. They were blessed to have a modern home for the time, but the conveniences of the 50's were not like the conveniences of today. Imagine starting your day packing six school lunches for 20 years or more and cooking and baking for eight or more at every meal.

John was very community minded and served generously and quietly in many ways. He served the Baptist Church as treasurer for 43 years, served on cemetery and hall committees, and was active in the Royal Canadian Legion as secretary for 21 years and as president for a year. As a young man he was active in sports, rugby, track, running, swimming; and enjoyed fishing, collecting antiques and gardening throughout his life.

Judith was gifted with a lovely and powerful singing voice which gave her great joy and brought much pleasure to the congregations and audiences with whom she so generously shared it. Church services, weddings, community events, the Bridgewater Hospital Chorus & Drama Society and the South Shore Chorale all benefitted from her talent. She was also an active member of the local branch of the Women's Institute for over 60

years. The Women's Institute is a world-wide organization which helps mostly rural women enjoy and build relationships with their neighbours,

become better informed and work for the betterment of the community. The Barss Corner branch was active for about 94 years until 2008.

John and Judith Mader were well-known and well-loved as friends and members of our community. In their retirement years, John and Judith enjoyed travelling and visited over 17 countries including in Europe, the British Isles, the Middle East, Australia, New Zealand, Egypt and the Caribbean.

John died at home in Barss Corner in 2011 at age 92. In 2017, Judith, still active and in good health, moved to an apartment at Parkland on Fairfax Avenue in Halifax where, at age 98, she enjoys the benefits of assisted living and enjoys being close to four of her seven children who live in the Metro area. She visits Barss Corner as often as she can and enjoys staying connected with friends from here.

So, where are the seven 'Mader children'? Nancy and her husband, Scot Jennings have moved from Fredericton to Halifax; John and his wife, Geraldine, have returned to Halifax after living in St. John's, Yarmouth and Enfield; Peggy, and her husband, Glenn Taylor, live in Halifax; Mary, and her husband, Charles Lantz, live in Bridgewater; Peter, after the sad death of his wife, Rosemary, is now remarried to Sandra, and they

live in Bridgewater; Neil and Connie, have stayed in the area and live in Pinehurst; and Melanie lives in Halifax. There are 10 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren, spread out from Pinehurst to Korea. Judith is thankful and considers herself 'fortunate to have been born and to have lived happily' in Barss Corner.



River Ridge Common

River Ridge Common park is popular with visitors so far this autumn and to make it even better some great new facilities have begun construction.

Multi-use singletrack trails are now being built throughout the park lands. Almost 4km of new trail is underway for this season with more to follow next year. This network of natural-surface trails will offer rustic woodland adventures with a backcountry flair and something for mountain bikers, hikers, joggers, snowshoers and other users of all abilities. For now, until the new trails are open and ready for use, park users are advised to stay out of marked areas under construction.

River Ridge Common is already planning even more new facilities for next year, including trails, swings, shade awnings, a picnic area for Off-Highway Vehicle users and more exciting areas for natural play and skills development including fun installations for those with accessibility challenges.


