

New Germany Community Centre is Closing....

Not because we want to but because the building has been sold to the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure Renewal and will be demolished making way for a major bridge project for Varner #2 in 2014 - 15 (information taken from "5-Year Highway Improvement Plan" 2012–13 Edition, available online).

In 2009, through a unique partnership with NS Department of Health and Wellness, NGAPS opened the Community Centre in one half of the building and South Shore Health operated

the other side as Teen Place, a centre for health information for youth. The funding to run the building came from The Department of Health & Wellness while NGAPS administered this money and paid the bills.

The operation of Teen Health Centres province wide is also changing. These will now be run from local high schools so ours will be moving to NGRHS this fall.

Two things have collided for NGAPS, the sale of the building and the loss of Department of Health funding. We are in a quandary. Phone calls have been made, letters have been written, conversations in the street and stores have taken place. We are on the hunt for a "home place" to run the Youth Friday Night Program. We would ideally like to see the Circuit program continue in this area. We would like a place to host the other programs and courses we have either sponsored or run in New Germany. But to this point we have had no success. Right now this is what we need from the community: An offer to be our home base for the Youth Friday Night Program. The second thing is to think about: Do we need a Community Centre? What will you promise to do or to give?

Please get in touch. Phone number and email on the back page. We have a small number of NGAPS members who would like to talk to you. If there is enough interest NGAPS can coordinate a community meeting to move forward.

Thanks to everyone who has supported the Community Centre, it was an interesting project.

When they faded we planted pink Wave petunias and sulphur yellow sweet potato vines for summer colour. We gave the Medical Centre the once over and our "Welcome to New Germany sign was upgraded. Greg Selig and Larry Spasuk built a planter under it which we then filled with annuals and perennials.



Summer is show time for garden clubs. Our Sue Gilmore received a Best Specimen award at the Bridgewater Flower Show for a magnificent oriental daylily. Barbara Veinot, competing in her first daylily competition, brought home a first from the Daylily Society Show with a daylily that she bred. Bravo.

September 26th is our first meeting this Fall. It will be a chance for everyone to talk about what we want to learn, see and do this coming year. In this way we have learned about worm composting, growing wine grapes, making self watering planters and on and on.

Since this is the season of storing away for later I will close with a tip for storing elderberries. Elderberry Cordial tastes great and is full of vitamins. To prepare strip the berries into a large, heavy bottomed pot, cover with water and simmer an hour. Strain and discard berries. Add 3/4 cup honey to 4 cups juice. Bottle. When preparing a drink add 2 Tbsp. juice to an 8 oz. glass cold water. Ahhh! Delicious. Happy gardening.





Connections Reflections with:

Leo Eisnor



"Everything in life went along pretty good"

A humble man with homespun values.

Leo Eisnor was the second oldest of five boys and one girl, and the last remaining member of his family. His parents, Walton & Rosie Eisnor raised their family in Pinehurst in the early 1900's when times were tough and many children were the norm.

Leo, who was born in June, 1913, remembers with fondness his father's gentle nature and patience, saying that he very seldom lost his cool, but when he did there was sometimes a 'switch' involved. He recalls there were chores to be done by every family member, including weeding the

vegetable garden, filling the wood box and even cutting up firewood in the morning before going to school. He remembers that they always had a pair of oxen, and much of his time was spent in yoking and teaming them around. In the winter they cut logs and with the oxen took them over the lake ice to the mill in Wentzell's Lake. For this venture the oxen had to be 'sharp shod' and this was done by a man named Edwin Fancy who had a blacksmith shop in Watford. Leo recalls that his family owned at least 40 pair of oxen in his lifetime.

Leo had no excuse for being late for school as the little community school house was just a hop, skip and a jump from the kitchen door. He says he got along well in school, but at the age of 14 ended his academic studies to take a job in the Annapolis Valley teaming a pair of oxen, where he stayed all summer for a dollar a day. Following this job, he worked at Lake Rossignol loading 4ft wood and driving the ox teams for which he was paid \$35 a month. He also worked 'on the drive' which meant balancing on top of the logs in the river, using a long pole to keep them moving downstream, and from jamming on their journey to the mill. Not an easy job with only boots on your feet and not able to swim.

Leo recalls that during his growing up years there wasn't much time for having fun, but he and his brothers liked to go fishing at Ross Brook. He says he and his siblings didn't fight much, but only once in awhile laid off a battle that didn't last long.

At about age 25 he went to work for Chester Bassett in Barss Corner working in the woods and helping on the farm. It was about this time that he met one Dorothy Drew who caused him to stop and take notice. Well I guess Dorothy found Leo to be one dashing young fellow because in 1939 they were married at the Barss Corner Baptist Parsonage. Leo built a new house in New Germany for himself and his new bride, and was now working as a truck driver for Zwicker's Mill where he remained employed for 27 years until the business ceased operation. In 1941 Leo and Dorothy increased the New Germany population by one with a bouncing baby boy they named Calvin.

Following his career as a truck driver Leo acquired employment with the Dept. of Highways where he remained employed until retirement in 1978.

Leo told me this is the first summer that he didn't mow his own lawn, and that he willingly gave up driving his car a few years ago, as he put it, "while the going was good".

Leo wears no hearing aides and enjoys reading and watching TV. He tells me his favourite programs are Wheel of Fortune; The Price is Right and Jeopardy, and says he sometimes has the right answer before the contestants do. While of a very slender build, Leo says he likes all foods except tomatoes. When asked if there was anything in life he wishes he could have done, he says, 'no, everything went along pretty good, I had a good life".



WWOOF - Willing Workers on Organic Farms




Did you ever have a passion that you could only dream about; a dream that might never happen but one that stuck with you for a very long time? I learned about wwoofing twelve years ago. Immediately I was eager to learn more and secretly map out my plans to go to Australia - should it ever hap-

pen.

In January 2012 I left my job and within three weeks I was packed and in the air - on my way to Australia for a three month adventure WWOOFING.

What is WWOOF? WWOOF is a series of host properties you can visit and exchange your culture while volunteering to work for your food and accommodation up to 30



hours per week. Your host is not a free source of free food and accommodation, nor are you a free worker, <u>exchange</u> is the true spirit of WWOOF.

I spent my first three weeks with a host in Mount Macedon, a one hour train ride from Melbourne - the capital of the state of Victoria. Mount Macedon is well known for its tree lined streets and beautiful gardens. My host had a 7 acre garden property some times open for tours, like many others in the

area. Several of the neighboring properties are larger. Two have their own helipads and one also had its own golf course. My duties included weeding, pruning, mowing and picking up bark from the many huge gum trees.

It was wonderful to awake early to hear the calling of the magpies and the laughing of the kookaburras. I spent many hours bushwalking - observing wildlife and enjoying the plants and trees. I walked many kms, early mornings, hot afternoons and some early evenings. The kangaroos were quite predictable - hot afternoons they would relax under the shade of the gum trees on the golf courses, and early mornings they were busy grazing.

From Mount Macedon I traveled to Tasmania. I was warned that the weather could be cool and damp but that was not the case. My hosts, bird conservationists as well as writers, took me on a 900 km trip in just over two days. They wanted to make sure that I was able to experience the 'wild' side of Tasmania. Certainly I saw the most wildlife in Tasmania during my short stay there - 7 days - even a dead Tasmanian devil on the highway. I learned the difference between kangaroos and wallabies and the dangers of encountering a wombat.

Although I arrived in Tasmania by ferry, I departed by plane, enroute to Melbourne to catch a bus to Torquay - the surf capital of Australia. My host was a surfer and we went to the beach every day and sometimes twice. She had a vegetable patch, fruit trees and was active in dune conservation. We spent more time at the beaches than we did in the veggie patch. However, I learned a lot about water conservation during my stay with her. All of my hosts had water storage tanks and collect rainwater from their roofs. Even though there is always flooding in parts of Australia, water needs to be conserved due to the limited supply.

From Torquay I left by bus to travel down the GOR (Great Ocean Road) - a 243 km highway built by returned WWI vets in honour of those who did not return. The construction of this highway provided employment for the returned men and carried them through the depression. It is a spectacular piece of highway that follows the ocean, with countless beaches along the way, with the Twelve Apostles being one of the most famous landmarks in that area.

Australian Adventures continued...

I spent five days in Yulong, near Lavers Hill further down the Great Ocean Road and while there, my host and I did some planting, picking vegetables, and exchanging recipes. The most unique experience was when I helped her chop up a kangaroo.

I left Yulong by bus and traveled to the end of the GOR - to Warrnambool where I caught a train and went back to Melbourne to spend my first night in a backpacker accommodation, only to catch another train in the morning - the Overland Express - a 12 hr trip to Adelaide.

Adelaide was home to five festivals while I was there including the Fringe, Buskers, and the Inedible Gardens. Once again I stayed in backpacker accommodations where I met many young travelers - each having their own story and all eager to hear mine. As the Aussies say, - "Good on you" was the usual reply.

Six days later I left Adelaide by train on the Indian Pacific train to reach Perth - the west coast of Australia. This journey was certainly the longest - close to 40 hr plus three time changes. It included two overnights and this trip by itself - the journey, the crossing of the Nullarbor Plain and the people I met - was certainly a great adventure.

When I arrived in Perth I realized that the heat I was told about was everything and more but it was all new and exciting. Statues of kangaroos greeted us as our train circled the city before pulling into the station.

Kalamundra Hills was where I spent the next three weeks. There were six woofers at this house – my-self, two English boys, a German girl and a Finnish couple. We collected eggs from 300 chooks, collected and graded passion fruit, picked figs, watered sheep, lawns and gardens and walked the dog. Days off were spent exploring the area by catching the train.

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We deliver for a nominal fee. Check in store for details. My favorite day trip there was a visit to Rottnest Island (referred to as Rotto by the locals) - an 11 km island that has no vehicular traffic - you travel by bike, circling the island and visiting any of the 65 beaches and 20 bays or feeding the quokkas - another marsupial.

I left Perth late at night to fly to Sydney - no planes can arrive in Sydney before 6 am due to the proximity of the airport to the city. I stayed with my final host in Varroville, a suburb about an hour by train from Sydney. He was a beekeeper, had 300 fruit trees, 6 chooks, 2 geese and a greenhouse. I had a choice of jobs from working in the honey room, doing some plantings or helping him with some carpentry work. Days off in Sydney area were spent on train trips - to the Blue Mountains, to Kiama, to Goulburn, to Sydney Opera House and Harbour.

The entire adventure was a real life experience. Wwoofing is for ages 18 to 80 so my advice would be to "give it a go" as the Aussies say, if you think it might be for you. It is a great program for learning about conservation, sustainability, organic farming, or anyone just wanting to do a bit of travel.

Rosedale New Horizons Seniors Club Wool Washing Project

The Seniors Wool washing project began about eight years ago with humble beginnings. A few "knitters" expressed a desire to wash wool again after having done so in their young lives and finding it a very unpleasant task.

Sheep's wool was collected from local sheep farmers and with "Saturday night wash tubs" the wool was washed and put out on a paved driveway to dry in the sun after being turned like hay a few times.

The eight or ten bags of dried wool were then taken by car to MacAusland's Woolen Mill on Prince Edward Island and exchanged for dark grey or white knitting yarn.

Over the years the process evolved using fish tubs in which to wash the wool and about 12 to 14 members, mainly women, who did the washing.

Most recently we have moved to electric cement mixers to do the washing and rinsing of the wool. It is a water consuming process, but easier on the bodies of the men who now do most of the washing.

Once wool is washed it is spread out on drying racks constructed of wooden supports covered in orange snow fencing, much in the style of fish flakes, and left to dry in the sun and wind while needing to be turned several times. When thoroughly dry it is bagged loosely and later packed tightly in washed feed bags and sewn shut for the trip to Prince Edward Island. In 2012 forty-four bags were transported by vans.

On the Island it is picked, carded and spun into yarn. The pure virgin yarn is brought back to the Club to be sold by the skein or knit into socks, mittens, regular gloves or hunting/fishing/power saw or pet walking gloves with one finger and a thumb to give more maneuverability.

What started as a fun filled "wool washing bee" has become a major fund raiser for the Rosedale New Horizon Senior's Club of New Germany and Area.

Peach Salsa

20 tomatoes, chopped

4 onions, finely chopped

5 fresh peaches, peeled, pitted and chopped

5 apples, peeled, cored and chopped

1 red bell pepper, finely chopped

1 yellow bell pepper, finely chopped

8-10 sprigs of fresh Cilantro (stems removed)

2 cloves garlic (red or white skinned)

4 cups white sugar

1 cup distilled white vinegar

2 tablespoons pickling salt

4 tablespoons pickling spice, wrapped in cheesecloth

½ tsp pepper

Directions:



- 1. In a large saucepan, bring to a boil all ingredients except pickling spice.
- 2. Reduce heat. Place the pickling spice into the mixture. Stirring frequently, simmer 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until volume is reduced by half.
- 3. Discard spice bag. Transfer the mixture to sterile containers. Store in refrigerator until use.


