The New Varner Bridge Opens

On Friday August 14th a large crowd gathered to celebrate the soon-to-be opened Varner Bridge. The



bridge being replaced was built in 1886 at a cost of \$1,200. The new bridge has an estimated cost of \$3.4 million. Politicians, engineers and the community gathered to mark the occasion. There was a ribbon cutting, done by the youngest and oldest in attendance. On that day we were able to walk across the bridge using the sidewalk, and by the following week the bridge was doing its job, getting cars and trucks across the river.





The Day We Celebrated the Bridge

We stood on the concrete of this new bridge in our curve on the map. A hot Friday and the people came out for some juice and sandwiches and to see this moment, of a few politicians and a few speeches and, in the summer sun, a little rivulet of sweat coursing down the smalls of our collective backs. After a long season of labour, with the rare sight of a construction crane punctuating the New Germany skyline, we got a new bridge. Even if the unfinished surface meant we could only go so far across it.

We have lost a lot, this too-small-to-be-a-village place in rural Canada. The train line, the box factory. Industry, local jobs. Favourite restaurants, favourite people. Families. We have lost but still there are new places in the old, old things giving new. On that hot Friday there were faces in that crowd that I scanned, who scanned me, looking for traces of a knowledge to answer, who am I to you, to this place? Who are we to each other?

I am two pizza joints and a Friday chip truck. I am houses of God and flowering planters on Main Street. I am the squeal of an ambulance on rural roads, of the fire engines roaring from their station, our fathers and uncles and sisters clinging on to save us once more. I am tail-flicking horses and white and brown cows, I am the driver on the road at 5 a.m. to head down the river and away: to Bridgewater, to Halifax, to anywhere but here.

How deep must roots go? Can I claim belonging when I don't know every car in every driveway? Is it enough to remember ice cream in the orange booths of the Dairy Kone, or how one of the aisles in the Red and White slanted just a bit, making pushing a shopping cart along it a rowdy, clattering affair?

I went down the number 10, first to Bridgewater for school, then to Ontario, British Columbia, Ontario again and finally to Africa: Ghana and South Africa. New Germany, in the warped way of dream-worlds, appeared often at night, a confusing tumult of roads only just perceptible as the village of my youth. Over the years, the definition of my roots widened variously, depending on how curious was the questioner: where are you from?

Nova Scotia, southwest, South Shore. In Ontario and B.C., that answer usually sufficed. Further afield and Canada was enough. Occasionally: the other side of the ocean. Rarely I'd be pressed into identifying New Germany with specificity, only perhaps if the questioner had once taken a summer drive through the Maritimes.

And even when I did say it, it felt uncertain, somehow - as if I had concocted this place on the river, or as if my roots simply weren't deep enough to lay a claim on the village. It may be that, because my family only just moved here - 36 years is only "just" - we are still newcomers. Except even we look curiously at the people who have come since, a rural cynicism taken root in the long list of what we have lost.

Undoubtedly, this is where I am from. My name doesn't have deep roots but there is no doubt that this is where I am from. The New Germany of my nighttime dreams tells me this place is mine, even when I haven't wanted it.

So let's, this time, remember what remains: the schools, the churches, the community halls with the summer breakfasts. The fireworks on July 1. The way we still muster out on a hot summer afternoon, for snacks and a stripe of Nova Scotia tartan to be snipped to open a bridge and to say yes, this is ours, this is for us. A new volley

of concrete to replace the clattering old wood. To connect us, to send us away - and back again.




Butter Churn



Seeking the Light: An Exhibit by Artist Jude Steeves

Seeking the Light: a retrospective exhibit of artwork by artist Jude Steeves was on display at the LaHave Bakery Gallery June 19th-22nd. The idea for the exhibit has been on Steeves' bucket list for years and having all her work displayed in one place was a dream come true for this Cherryfield artist.

Potter and sculptor Louise Pentz officially opened the show on Saturday, June 20th. "Each piece is thoughtful and uplifting, layered with symbols; patiently rendered," said Pentz to a crowd of visitors from as far away as Australia and Vancouver. "The work shows us familiar objects as seen through the eyes of one who is aware of her living spirit and her connection to all things."

The exhibit included oils, coloured pencils, and water-based oils. Except for the coloured pencil drawings on paper, all the paintings have been done on masonite.

"It is like capturing a moment in time. Each painting is like a chapter in my life," says the artist whose life is reflected through the 36 paintings and drawings that made up the exhibit.

"While painting I am in the present moment, I am joy, I am in bliss," says Steeves whose art reveals her "artistic and spiritual evolution" over a 35-year period. Steeves, who lives on a 50-acre farm in Cherryfield, says her inspiration comes from her immediate surroundings which includes the century-old farmhouse she lives in with her husband, Don, and border collie, Chi.

"Your home is your soul," she says, adding that she finds what she connects with in her everyday life and paints it. She says she is always in the mood to paint.

Steeves, whose artwork is not for sale, added that she paints because she has to. It's who she is. This life long passion for art began in elementary school. "I was always the artist," she says. But she didn't begin painting until she went to Mount Allison University at the age of 18. There she earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree with a major in painting and a minor in drawing. After studying Art Education at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design, she went on to teach Art, first at Sackville High School and then at Park View Education Centre where she taught for 27 years.

Steeves' work has also been exhibited at the Owens Art Gallery in Sackville, New Brunswick, the Nova



The Seat Of Learning in Simpson's Corner

The Simpson's Corner school house was most likely built in 1882 as the deed for the land was conveyed in Dec., 1881 by Isaac Deamond to the Trustees of the school section, namely William Veinot, Ezekiel Woodworth and Nelson Simpson. The community was then known as Ohio, and the current dirt road connecting Simpson's Corner to Stanley Section is known as the Ohio Road.

The school was divided into two levels of education with the higher grades attending classes in the morning and the primary classes attending afternoon classes. Among the first teachers to serve at this one room school were Tish Herman, Maizie Herman, Jessie Chesley and Cora Durling. Teachers arriving at the school in later years

were a Miss Ells, Flossie Wynot, Percy Hupman, Freda Wile, Lucy Hubley, Minola Wentzell, Shirley Silver and Ruth Kaulback. Ruth was the last teacher to have taught there as the school officially closed in 1965 when the children were transported by bus to New Germany Elementary and High Schools.

As was the case in most communities, teachers came from other areas and were boarded by members of the community during the school term. The first teacher in Simpson's Corner arrived from Kingston on horseback and was given free room and board at different homes in the area. Many young men found their future brides among the school teachers who came to board in their community.

According to an annual report written in 1935 on rural Nova Scotian teachers, the average yearly salary for female teachers was \$519 including provincial aid. Female teachers were generally not paid as much as male teachers even though they might have held the same level license.

For some years the Simpson's Corner school building was also used for religious gatherings, but as the community grew, a church was constructed across the road from the schoolhouse. During the time the school was being used for church services, the body of a small boy was buried near the edge of the property line.

These one room schools had no running water and no flush toilets. Ethel Hyson remembers going to the well with a large pail to fetch water for the day. She says the children took turns doing this chore and it usually took two of them to carry the heavy pail of water back to the school room. Special days at

school were Valentine's Day, Arbour Day and preparing for the yearly Christmas concert.

Irving Woodworth remembers the tricks they played on teachers. One being to pile firewood across the door at the end of the day when all the children had gone home, but while the teacher was still inside. Another was to take the teacher's sweater and hide it in the woods. I wonder how many sweaters have been



found in the woods surrounding this little schoolhouse.

Reconnecting ...

Reconnecting is an occasional feature of New Germany Connections. In this issue we reconnect with Daniel Veinot who grew up in Simpson's Corner and presently lives in Waterloo, Ontario. Recently he agreed to answer a few questions.

When you graduated from New Germany Rural High School, where did you go to university and what did you study?

I attended Université Sainte-Anne after graduating from NGRHS. I first studied French at Université Sainte-Anne in their French Immersion Program. Following my completion of the French Immersion Program, I completed my Bachelor of Business Administration at Université Sainte-Anne. I completed my Bachelor of Laws from the University of Ottawa's French Common Law Program in 2007 and was called to the Bar in Ontario in June 2008. I am currently a partner at the law firm of Duncan, Linton LLP located in Waterloo, Ontario, where I practice commercial litigation and municipal law.

Has magic always been an interest? How old were you when you mastered your first trick and what was it?

Yes, I have always had an interest in magic. name was inspired by Harry Houdini who was once known as the "King of Cards". I have not performed under that stage name of Dan Venie outside of Nova Scotia. I performed at wide variety of events including at the South Shore Exhibition, Halifax County Exhibition, the Barrington Municipal Exhibition, Mahone Bay Scarecrow Festival and Upper Clements Park to name but a few.


Do you continue to perform?

I continue to perform magic although it is primarily a hobby these days due to my work schedule. I usually attend at least one magic convention each year. I recently attended the FISM World Championship of Magic in Rimini, Italy. The FISM World Championship of Magic is basically the equivalent of the Olympics of magic. Magicians from around the world compete against one another in different categories of magic and the competition is held in a different country every 3 years. The FISM World Championship of Magic in Rimini, Italy was my second. I attended my first

in 2012 in Blackpool, England. The next FISM World Championship of Magic will be held in Busan, South Korea. While in Italy, I participated in a Guinness Book of World Records challenge for the most magicians performing in a magic show.

Do you have any plans to perform in this area again?

I would love to perform again in the local area but I do not have any plans to perform in Nova Scotia in the near future. I do, however, generally perform for friends and family when I return home for holidays.
