River Ridge Common News

River Ridge Common's popularity continues to grow and the park is growing to match. The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg is adding new facilities to the park through the late summer and autumn 2021.

The second phase of singletrack trail development is about to get underway with the aim of adding almost seven kilometres of new trail to the existing trail network for all-season use by walkers, runners, hikers, mountain bikers and snowshoers.

The Off-Highway Vehicle parking and picnic area next to the South Shore Annapolis Valley Trail is next on the list for development in the near future. This site will feature new picnic spots and an edible forest planted fringe.

The Municipality is also currently working on a design to add more parking spaces to the Highway 10 parking area, with the aim of constructing new spaces this year.

River Ridge Common continues to be a great place for safe outdoor community activities and healthy living during the time of COVID-19 and we give thanks to the locals and visitors alike who have been out enjoying our park safely and responsibly.

Reconnecting with Trudy Johnson and Doug Masters

Near the beginning of the school year in 1987 an older gentleman phoned New Germany Rural High and asked to speak with the new Vice Principal. He said, "There's something I want to know...How a little woman like you is going to handle those big boys?" Trudy Johnson answered, "I plan to handle those big boys the same way I plan to handle those girls." The caller seemed satisfied. Shortly after that some of those big boys seemed to indicate their approval when they noticed she drove a Toyota 4x4.

Ms Johnson spent a busy and productive three years ('87-90) at NGRHS handling those big boys as well

as those girls as the high school's first female administrator serving as Vice Principal; Acting Principal; Vice Principal. Thirty plus years later she still speaks very well of the welcoming community, supportive and fun-loving staff (she has stories to tell of some- then young mischievous staff - but not here, not now!), and the generally positive, caring and hardworking students (probably a few stories there, too). While she was fully involved in all aspects of student life she was particularly attentive to students who struggled with academic or personal issues. She was instrumental in developing study skills programs in junior high and in arranging extra supports for students as they transitioned from elementary school into junior high. The tradition of a special 'Awards Night' in June to recognize student achievements was also established.



Outside of school, Trudy, who was the parent of two adopted preschool children, helped organize support for adoptive parents. She was a very helpful sounding board for me with our adopted family of three school aged children who then became junior high students while she was at NGRHS.

From New Germany Trudy went on to the position of vice principal and then principal at Park View and then to work at the School Board Office. After retirement in 2008 she continued to do part-time and contract work in a variety of school related fields.

Meanwhile, down the hill at New Germany Elementary School, lots of good things were happening. That school had originally been built as the High School opening in 1954 and then 10 years later was renovated and re-opened as the elementary school when the small community schools were consolidated. Mrs. Lillian Aldhouse, the first principal, set the tone for an innovative school and when she retired in 1982 Doug Masters became the new principal. Innovations continued with staggered enrollment for Primary students, student standard test scores remained high and the school received fresh new paint inside and out! The new principal took quite a bit of ribbing for the 'Purple School' and the bright and cheerful rainbow colours in the hallways which perhaps could be considered well ahead of their time. Under his leadership there was always a very positive atmosphere among staff and students. Doug speaks well of the excellent community support and involvement; the diversity in the student body which excelled both in academics and sports. Doug took a great interest in the students and also encouraged school sports. He coached a number of winning soccer and basketball teams, and knew the importance of encouraging others to share the coaching. He came into my Primary classroom one day, told me he'd been asked to coach a high school team and asked if I would consider coaching the boys' soccer team. It wasn't exactly an easy sell, but he was very persuasive and I knew my younger son who was on the team very much wanted to play soccer. We were all delighted that despite my limited coaching skills, the boys' gave their best energy, teamwork and skills and we ended the season with a nail-biter defeating New Ross in penalty kicks to become County Champs! That enabled Doug to coach the Jr High Boys' Team, on which my older son played and they, too, handily won the Regional Championship!

From New Germany, Doug went on to be Principal at Pentz, Newcombville, and Riverport. Retirement in 2003 gave a different pace and slightly different work with substituting, mentoring and working with school accreditation and supervision.

After retirement they were able to enjoy cruises and trips to a wide variety of places including Hawaii, Spain, Iceland and a special trip to Lithuania. Trudy's grandparents had moved from Lithuania to Canada in 1907 and they were able to connect with relatives there. Trudy and Doug both took part in trips to Slovenia where our school board was invited to share in teaching exchanges, inclusive education training and sports exchanges.

Together Trudy and Doug enjoy their 6 grandchildren. Doug and Trudy love it when former students and parents recognize them and stop to chat when they are out and about. It affirms to them over and over the strengths of our communities and the friendly, caring people here. If you see them don't hesitate to speak (re-introduce yourself if necessary – sometimes students change a bit after 25-30 years, and so do parents). They have lived for many years in West LaHave and are now in the process of moving into Bridgewater.

They've both been involved in volunteer work, Doug with the Food Bank and as an assistant and handyman with some of Trudy's projects. She has served as Chair of the Health Services Foundation of the South Shore for 8 years and is currently Chair of the newly formed South Shore Hospice Palliative Care Society.

We sat down to chat in mid-August at the newly opened office space of the Palliative Care Society where they both volunteer to provide open office hours. This office space in the Gateway Plaza, Bridgewater (next to Subway) is a place where you can ask questions and find information on how to access help in situations where palliative care is needed for yourself or a family member. Through the generosity of donors and in partnership with the Nova Scotia Health Authority Palliative Care Team, they support and promote compassionate care for individuals and their loved ones who are living with a life-threatening illness. Drop in, visitors are welcomed.

Just as Doug and Trudy have fond memories of their years in our New Germany schools, so do many of us who were colleagues, students, parents, community members and friends.

Rural Delivery turns 45

In the publishing business, many magazines come and go – so the 45th anniversary of *Rural Delivery* makes it something of a venerable institution. When launched in 1976, it was a very modest journalistic endeavor – mostly a vehicle for classified ads that would interest farmers and gardeners, with a few stories and household tips thrown in to round it out. But it soon grew, following in the footsteps of *The*



Family Herald, with its aim to entertain and inform all generations of the farm household. Based on the South Shore, it became a full-fledged magazine, published 10 times a year, delivered to subscribers across the Atlantic provinces.

Over the decades, *Rural Delivery* has covered inspiring enterprises in the northern reaches of Lunenburg County, such as the wool-washing bees conducted as part of a fundraising project by the Rosedale New Horizon Senior's Club, and the tremendous volunteer effort that went toward construction of the New Germany and Area Medical Centre. A number of farmers and fabricators in the community have also been featured. Local artist and naturalist Mary Morey is a freelance contributor whose gardening columns and drawings have recently appeared in the magazine.



The editor of *Rural Delivery*, Stanburne resident David Lindsay, was interviewed on CBC Radio this August, and was asked why the magazine continues to find avid readers after all these years. He said it has a lot to do with the focus on how people in the countryside get by, and how they create richness in their lives, living pretty far off the beaten track. The magazine sometimes offers a bit of nostalgia, but there is also a sense of looking forward with optimism and determination. An article about 4-H projects or ox pulls might be followed by a story about new farm technology or the latest research into crop genetics. There are features on ambitious rural entrepreneurs and half-crazed do-it-yourselfers – always conveying respect for people who choose to live in a hands-on way. The content often includes fancy poultry, beekeeping, machinery repair, old-time music, and always recipes – and there's always something to make you smile or snort. 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Introducing Newcomers Will & Vanessa

From Honeymoon to Homestead

WWOOF! That's not a typo, or the sound a dog makes - it's how Will McKeiver and Vanessa Junkin found themselves operating an organic farm in East Dalhousie.

WWOOF stands for World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms, formerly known as Willing Workers on Organic Farms. The loose network of national organizations links volunteers with organic farm owners. Hosts provide volunteers with food, lodging and opportunities to learn in exchange for assistance with farming and sustainable living activities.

Will says wwoofing is great way to travel on a limited budget, but it was the learning experience that gave the couple the confidence to abandon well-paid jobs in Sudbury, Ontario and purchase a 71-acre farm on Alton Road in July 2020. They called it Honeywwoofers Homestead.

Now that the wwoofer part has been explained, what about the "honey"?

It turns out, honey is short for honeymoon. Yes, the couple spent their honeymoon working on farms in Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Florida. The six-month adventure allowed them to benefit from both modern and timeless wisdom, but they also witnessed some "shameful" farming practices. "We took knowledge from every farm we worked," Will says. The experience strengthened their belief in regenerative agriculture, which Vanessa sums up as prioritizing soil health so they can "leave the land better than when we acquired it."

Will and Vanessa have a knack for weighing failures and successes with equal measure. It's more about the knowledge they gained. Likewise, growing unusual crops and raising nontraditional livestock are sought-after learning experiences. Will enjoys the reactions their unique dragon beans and lemon cucumbers generate at markets in New Germany and East Dalhousie. He admits not everyone is willing to sample new vegetables, but many who have are now coming back for more.

Meanwhile, back at the homestead, three alpacas guard against predators while providing premium manure (higher in N-P-K than that of cows, horses, goats and sheep). The camel-like animals calmly wandered over to the paddock fence to greet me. A few moments later, a gang of strange-sounding, uniquely-hideous large ducks also came to investigate. I don't know if they planned to greet me or guard against me. I didn't get close enough to find out.

The breed is called Muscovy. Traditionally a source of meat, but the birds were chosen primarily for insect control. Muscovies are ravenous consumers of flies, slugs and ticks. They also lay large, tasty eggs and they don't quack, which makes them allies in the quest for "peace and quiet," Vanessa says. "The real catalyst for coming out here was for healing," she adds, explaining that she developed Post Traumatic Stress Disorder in 2018 as a result of her former career as a paramedic. "Solitude has become priceless," she says, noting Will enjoys the open sky after working in tight quarters as a drone operator

in the mining industry. Both Will and Vanessa proud to have are farming in their blood each have fond memories spending time on of grandparents' their farms. Vanessa originally hoped to buy her grandparents' farm, but the price was out of reach. "That's okay," she says, "I think my grandmother would be very proud of what we're accomplishing here."

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New Germany & Area Medical Centre - Final Brick

The final brick was recently placed in the entry way of the New Germany and Area Medical Centre. What began with volunteers continues to be maintained by volunteers.

In 1993 when plans were made to construct the Centre, a fundraising campaign was started so that funds were available to purchase the building supplies. Bill Alexander, charter board member, suggested that bricks be sold by canvassing area residents, alumni and businesses seeking donations of \$100 or more. For every \$100 a donor's name was engraved on a brick. Bricks sold quickly and soon the main lobby wall was completed.

Years later it was decided to add bricks to the entry way which led to the recent completion of the second wall. A total of 733 names are engraved on bricks, which represent a lot of families and businesses who lived and served New Germany and the surrounding communities the past five decades.

Vivian Meisner, charter board member, collected money for the Centre since 1993 and continues to do so. She reported that since the brick campaign closed, she has not received any donations for the Centre. Covid has also impacted the usual amount of money donated to the Centre through memorials. We need to remind area residents that their financial support is not only appreciated but necessary to continue to maintain the building.
