

New Germany Rural High School News

Happy Fall everyone! How the first month of school did fly. We are happy to head into this next month with some sense of stability. We have sorted through many of the kinks and hiccups that come with school start-up and are on a roll.

Over the summer we established an Interagency Hub in the Student Support area of the school. This Hub includes four office spaces to home our Mental Health and Addiction Personnel, our School Plus Facilities, our School Supports Workers, School Counsellor and other Regional Staff. This is a big deal, because a lot of these support staff are working directly and exclusively in our catchment area to better support our students. We are already seeing the impacts of this Hub in our school and greater community.

September and October brought us a great number of exciting things. We started our year off with activities such as soccer, volleyball, school clubs and our first dance in over 18 months! As we head into November, we

We know that you have all been patiently waiting for more information on what is going on with the New Germany Trail Bridge. There has been a lot of behind the scenes work taking place over the last several,

months moving this project forward.

We are very excited to say the work onsite is beginning, things are going to get very busy. Over a couple weeks as the abutments are installed, bridge panels will be brought down from Amherst. Baxters Bridges will be on site and the 220-ft bridge will be completely assembled on site. Then

prep work will begin to prepare for the arrival of the cranes. The cranes will then set up one on each side of the river, they will then pick the bridge up and set it in place on the abutments.


If all goes well the bridge is expected to be in place by November 15th at the latest. As work gets started we will be shutting down this section of trail to all traffic for the safety of everyone.

Connecting in our Communities

An Interview with Genealogist, Marlean Rhodenizer

At a Robbie Burns Day Banquet and Dance in Victoria in January 1995, a Nova Scotia tartan tie sparked a conversation. The lady from Victoria, who sat just two seats down the table, guessed correctly that Robert Rhodenizer, the man with the tartan tie, and his wife, Marlean, were from Nova Scotia. The adventurous couple were spending six months in Victoria, BC on a house exchange.

We Nova Scotians are familiar with the questions that would inevitably follow...'So, where in Nova Scotia are you from? and'Would you happen to know...?' What happened as a result of those questions that evening was nothing short of astonishing!

It turned out the lady who asked the question pressed until their home was revealed to be Barss Corner. She knew Lake William well, because she'd lived



in a cottage there, and was delighted to find that the person wearing the tie was the very person who had plowed her winter snow! The lively exchange that followed resulted in an invitation to dinner and many more connections were discovered. During the visit she offered to show Marlean her quilts. Marlean was moved when she noticed that the hand quilting on the beautiful red and white quilt looked just like her grandmother's fine stitches. A closer look found that the quilt was signed by Marlean's great grandmother, Susan Webber; daughter, Bessie Spinney and Bessie's daughter, Zelda Etter in 1916. Overwhelmed, Marlean asked for first dibs if she ever decided to sell it and the owner told her that she'd already promised it to her daughter. However, when that daughter heard the story, she, without hesitation, said the quilt belonged in Nova Scotia. I know my heart warmed and I'm pretty sure my jaw dropped when Marlean's daughter, Pat, brought out this same quilt last week at Marlean's Scarsdale home where I was enjoying their many stories and the breathtaking autumn view of Lake William.

This 'quilt story' is only one of numerous wonderful encounters Marlean has experienced as she has sought and shared information and stories of family and community connections over many years. As so many people searching for family history in Barss Corner and surrounding areas ask questions, friends and neighbours immediately send or bring them to Marlean. She is always delighted to listen and to share. So often she has the information these visitors are looking for and many have helped expand hers. In fact, she has diligently searched locally and in far off places, including Salt Lake City and the British Isles and she has spoken with genealogists from all across Canada, the US and beyond. She has had so many extremely fortunate encounters as she searched that people often refer to her as the 'Lady with the Golden Luck'. As I reflect on this, it seems to me that her work in history and genealogy is not just a pastime but a mission which gives her joy and also enriches so many other lives. And knowing Marlean's deep faith and commitment to God, I suspect that what many may call co-incidences could also be thought of as God-incidences.

Marlean was born in Farmington in 1936, the only child of Evelyn (Spidle) and Caleb Taylor and she was young when they moved to what was known as the Crandall Farm in Barss Corner. It was in that same large double house which, after her father's death, they purchased and continued to share with her mother, that Marlean and Bob raised their five children, Kay (Ralph Gass), Pat (Blair Richards), Donna (Andy Duinker), Gordie (Lisa Chandler), and Debbie (Sterling Zwicker). In 1955 she had married her childhood sweetheart and life-long teammate, Robert (Bob) Rhodenizer of Parkdale-Maplewood, one of the seven children of Ira and Ethel (Wentzel) Rhodenizer. Between them they were descended from many of the local surnames – Rhodenizer, Taylor, Spidle, Dorey, DeLong, Wentzell, Webber, Rafuse.... Appreciation of their ancestors' contributions to the fabric of these local communities helped fuel Marlean and Bob's life-long interest in family, genealogy and community.

Marlean began listening intently to the family stories, collecting information, and making notes at a young age. After the busy and full years of working, raising a family, working on the family farm, helping with the family business, participating in many church and community activities, teaching and performing music, there was time for travel, research, and writing. Marlean is dedicated to collecting, recording and sharing history. Her records began with handwritten notes, lists and charts, and some years ago she embraced the benefits of the computer age. Now with two computer screens side by side on her desk, much of her research is done online and using the Roots Magic Program she has now entered 72,000 names!

Her joys are in the people she has met who so freely share their stories, the genealogists who work together to compile accurate records, the knowledge that the early history of her communities is in writing and will be available for future generations, the co-operation and interest of so many people; and the teamwork she so long shared with her husband and now continues with her daughters who also share her passion.

Our local communities are rich in history, many of our communities still have people who carry these stories. Let us listen and record as much as possible while we have these historians with us. It is important to understand and learn from our history as we move into the future. Marlean shared this quote from Chris Green, "The future will be as good as the telling of our past is truthful."

The recently revised book, <u>Around the Corner – Homes and Stories</u> of the Barss Corner Area, 1838-2021, conceptualized by Robert

and Marlean, compiled by Marlean with the editorial assistance of her daughters, Pat, Donna and Debbie takes the reader on a trip through the Barss Corner and Union Square area with photos of each house along the way (including photos of now non-existent buildings) and it attempts to chronicle house owners since 1838. (You'll see the ad elsewhere in this Newsletter) It credits many sources including an earlier history of Barss Corner, And Now We Remember, by B.K.Langille (1971). Other writings are in the works by Marlean's daughters, including Pat's collection of Crown Deeds for area properties and Debbie's stories of local people who have served in Canada's wars.

The story of our communities continues. Many new people are moving to our communities and we look forward to new relationships, contributions and development. It is my hope that we will be open to meeting each other and listening to each other's stories; that we will treasure what we can learn of the past; and that we will always be open to ways we can continue to enjoy and enrich life together in communities.

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Pride, Service, Duty and Retirement



With 120 years of volunteer fire service among them Paul Veinot, Tim Robar and Carson Lowe are some of the longest standing active members at the Springfield and District Volunteer Fire Department. They have shouldered a similar fear over the years- not making it home safely- but their love of the job and the solidarity of their fellow firefighters has kept them coming back. Together they have faced tragedy which they describe as arriving at a family's home already destroyed by fire or performing extrication at an un-survivable motor vehicle collision. But they have also shared triumph when they have been able to use their medical skills to save a life or their technical training to snuff out a chimney fire before it could spread. Their

dedication to the safety of their community is an inspiration to everyone at the fire hall.

After an incredible 45 years of service, Carson has made the difficult decision to hang up his helmet and pass the hose this winter. With a promising increase in department membership recently, he can feel confident that his community will continue to be protected into his retirement. In addition, his long-time comrades, Tim (31 years service) and Paul (44 years service), are both continuing with their roles as Deputy Chiefs for the time being. Carson was originally inspired to join the department by his father, one of the founding members of the Springfield Department in 1958. Carson would then go on to hold the position of Fire Chief for a time and currently serves as



one of the department's most experienced designated drivers. He has seen many changes in fire apparatuses, gear and equipment, but also in policy and procedure. There is now a clearer focus on making sure every firefighter goes home after a call, as well as have the support they need to get back in the truck next time.

Imagine buying a 15-acre campground sight unseen. That's what Jamie Lee Arseneau, Kalen Hamilton and Dewey Prevett did. The trio left their jobs and families in London, Ontario in August to own, operate and live year-round at LaHave River Camparound, "After a few days of traveling," Jamie Lee recalls, "we drove down that hill at night, in the dark, not knowing what to expect. We were just so happy when we woke up and saw how beautiful everything looked here and the people were really, really warm and welcoming."

The adventure started as a 5-year plan, Kalen explains. While converting a school bus to a tiny home they started looking for land in the Maritimes. They intended to build from scratch, but discovered campgrounds for sale. "So we thought, instead of starting at the ground up, we could start with something that was

already somewhat established." They wanted a rustic, natural setting and a situation that enabled them to put their skills to work doing something they love.

"Between the three of us, we can do a lot, and now can put that toward our own business," Jamie Lee says, noting each has adopted roles that have a natural fit. Kalen, a welder and former shop supervisor, is "Mr. Fixit." Dewey is also "awesome" at facility maintenance, while being the "hype girl." "I'm the social butterfly," Dewey explains, "so I do a lot of socializing with the campers and get them excited about events."

Jamie Lee manages the office work and marketing, a natural segue from her former work in fundraising and event planning for a youth-serving nonprofit. Dewey worked at the same nonprofit, focused on employment program development. Dewey and Jamie Lee naturally find themselves engaging with young campers through informal mentorship and play. "We're looking forward to doing more of that," Jamie Lee says.

In fact, the enthusiastic team has an ambitious list of things they're looking forward to doing, such as "beautifying spaces," including renovating overnight cabins, washrooms, games rooms, and the office to ensure visitors' first impression is of a campground that is "well loved and well taken care of." But the real beauty in their plan goes deeper than aesthetics. They intend to nurture and expand the strong sense of community they've found at LaHave River Campground.

"We lucked out with the people," Kalen says. "They've been so good to us - bringing us food and so welcoming and willing to help out with stuff around the campground."

"I don't even buy groceries going into the weekends," Jamie echoes, "because people just bring us so much. They take care of us while we're taking care of this place."

"But we don't want this campground to be exclusive to our campers," she adds. "We want to welcome the community into this space." A large part of marketing and outreach efforts for next season will focus on encouraging residents in surrounding communities to pop in for events like live music and fireworks, attend movie nights, play mini-golf, eat ice cream and participate in dart and horseshoe tournaments. "And this isn't just our goal," Jamie Lee adds, "we're hearing this time and time again from our campers. This site used to be booming and events used to be packed. We would love to build that back up again and feel that entire sense of community."

Their excitement is contagious and their passion inspiring. LaHave River Campground is now their business, but it's so much more. "I think all of our hearts live here," Dewey says. "When we woke up that first day, it felt like our souls were aligned with what we were doing."

Jamie Lee agrees. "We all feel like we're in the right place at the right time."

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
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From the Lions Den


