



Thursday mornings at the Café are for anyone in the area. Snacks and coffee are free, but donations are accepted. Come, have friendly conversations, meet new


people and relax in a welcoming atmosphere.

New Germany and Area IWK Toy Drive

The IWK Toy Drive is back again for its seventh consecutive year. Over the past seven years, the toy drive team has collected and purchased new toys and gift cards for the children and their families in the IWK Children's Hospital in Halifax. Over the years, we have raised approximately \$130,000 in toys and gift cards as a community. We collect

toys, gift cards and financial donations which we use to buy toys locally. Toys must be new, unopened, and unwrapped and gift cards are needed for groceries, restaurants, fuel, pharmacies, clothing, and other locations that would help those in need at the IWK.

This drive was started by NGRHS teacher Michael Wilson and his wife Jessica after their daughter Lydia contracted RSV as a newborn. During their stay in the IWK just before Christmas, they were provided

toys for Lydia and their two other daughters Clara and Audrey. After this stay, the Wilsons vowed to pay back the hospital by starting a toy drive which runs each year.

The toy drive will be running until the end of November with the team delivering the toys to the IWK hospital in early to mid December (exact date to be set by the IWK). This will allow the IWK Child Life Services team time to sort and prepare the toys and donations for distribution to the kids and their families in time for Christmas.

This year, we have toy drop off locations at the following locations: Barss Corner Post Office, New Germany Post Office, Lantzalot Game Store and Boulangerie La Vendeenne bakery, both in Blockhouse. More sites may be added soon.

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International Students at NGRHS

The Nova Scotia International Student Program (NSISP) is celebrating its 25th anniversary and has welcomed thousands of international students to local schools immersing them in Canadian culture and education. The NSISP is one of the largest programs of its kind in Canada and welcomes students from grade 7 to grade 12 for one month, two months, three months, a semester or full year. Some students come to do their high schooling here, graduate and attend our universities. This year in Nova Scotia there are approximately 1200 international students attending our schools from one end of the province to the other. While living in Nova Scotia, students are placed with an approved homestay family, who will make them a part of their family. They provide support, share their traditions and culture and showcase our beautiful area. The program offers learning experiences to not only the international students but their host families, schools and communities as well.

In September, 19 international students from 8 different countries - Spain, Chile, Italy, France, Germany, Mexico, Brazil and Japan started school at New Germany Rural High School. NGRHS is a very welcoming school to have such an active and unique program that allows students to experience other cultures, learn about different traditions, meet new people from around the world while learning an additional language. These 19 international students coming to New Germany and surrounding area can count on having a friendly face to talk to and plenty of chances to get out and experience all the amazing things that make this place so special.

October 4th was the start of a Short Term - 8 week Canadian experience for 22 international students and two chaperones from Colombia. The New Germany and surrounding area is fortunate to have 3 of these students- Mariangel, Luisa and Fiorella attend NGRHS and live with a local host family. Since they have been here they have made new friends both Canadian and International, joined in school activities, seen our local area and volunteered at a community breakfast. A few of the things the students have noticed since they arrived are the beautiful colours of the fall leaves, the friendly people, how safe they feel and how wonderful the host families are. They enjoyed ice skating for the first time, seeing a waterfall at Indian Falls and riding in the big yellow school bus. The one thing they are hoping is to see before they return home on December 1st is snow. Seeing snow for the first time would be magical.

As a homestay coordinator with the NSISP program, it's my job to give a potential host family the information and support they need to host and have a successful experience with an international student. Without our host families, these international students would not be able to participate in this program and have their once-in-a-lifetime, Nova Scotian experience. I enjoy watching the international students and host families create that bond that connects two countries and leads to a lifetime friendship.

Connecting in our Communities - Union Square

A small group of teenagers in the mid'60's were concerned as to what would happen to the school building in Union Square now that students were being bussed to the New Germany Rural High and Elementary Schools. One young lady had an idea that the young people of the area might be able to raise enough money to buy the school so it could be used for a youth gathering place and for community events. The teens talked it over and set to action! One man, who was young at the time, tells how he and his sister drove their bikes over the dirt roads, asking at almost every house for people to buy raffle tickets on a quilt. They organized variety shows in Barss Corner, card parties, dances, bean and salad suppers and when the auction was held in July 1965 they were ready. There were many tense moments as the bids were made. There was mounting concern as a man kept outbidding them. Finally, a Mrs. Eisener went over to have a word with him. When she explained that the young people had raised money to buy it for a Youth Hall, he immediately stopped bidding. The school sold for \$320 and by September 1965 the property was officially deeded to the 'Trustees of Union Square Youth Hall'.

The youth, as well as church and community, made good use of it as a gathering place for card parties, dances, fun as well as 'fun'draising' events to pay for maintenance and a few upgrades.

By 2012, there were many changes in the community, but still a great interest in maintaining a gathering space in the community. The 'Union Square Community Hall Association' was formed. Grants and fundraising enabled many upgrades including new electrical wiring, insulation, a drilled well, kitchen remodelling, a new washroom, a heat pump, painting, a storage shed, a new sign. It continues to be a welcoming, well used space in the community suitable for gatherings for 5 to 65 people.

At the Hall, you may find people gathering to work on their personal craft projects, people paying Dungeons and Dragons, doing Yoga, playing cards. There's a 'Bake-Off' Challenge in November, Seedy Saturday in February, Plant Sale in May. In September, there was what is hoped will become an annual BBQ; and in December a Community Christmas Potluck. It is well used for family celebrations and I've been told some children refer to it as the 'birthday house'. There is also a Facebook page 'Union Square Hall Community', and there is a Hall Meeting on the 2nd Tuesday of each month.

As rural Nova Scotia was being settled by Europeans in the 1700's and 1800's, settlers moved inland to places like the Union Square area from both the South Shore and Annapolis Valley. Some of the earliest were probably Feindels who moved from New Germany and built a home at the foot of the lake where the cemetery is now. In 1837, William Ross who lived in Lunenburg, received a large Crown grant in the Union Square area. He never lived here but sold lots to people with names like Morton,



DeLong, Fancy, Feindel, Dunn and Young. He also bought more land and sold a large amount of land to a William Kidston of Glasgow, Scotland who in turn sold them, as 'Kidston lots' in various sized lots from 25-100 acres and the community began to grow.

It's not exactly that all roads lead to Union Square but the four roads that come together at the centre of the 'Square' –the Ramey Road, the Cornwall Road to Barss Corner, the Cornwall Road to Blockhouse, the Mackay Road – connect the community to all the nearby communities. In 1883, there was a meeting held to get plans underway for the building of a community school. By 1885 there was a building and a school enrollment of 36 students. From 1885 to 1949, many teachers came to the community, all of them women except one, Percy Hupman, who met his wife here and many will remember him as a high school teacher. In 1944, Marguerite Fancy came to teach, and except for one year away, taught here until 1965 when the schools were consolidated. In 1947 she married Kenneth Seamone, and their home was just around the corner on the Ramey Road in sight of the school.

In the early years of the community, church services were held at the schoolhouse. Just after the turn of the century, work began on a church building. Land was given, supplies and labour donated and in 1913, the 6th Anglican Bishop of Nova Scotia came to consecrate St Paul's Anglican Church. The story is told that when it came time to place the cross on the steeple, Jacob Oickle climbed up the staging and with one foot balanced himself on the pinnacle of the steeple. My first connection with Union Square was on Easter Sunday 1967 when the rector, Rev James Purchase, after having Sunday dinner with my family, invited me to come to Union Square to play a "few Easter hymns" for their afternoon service. It was the first of many services I shared there in various roles over the next 52



years. The faithful gathered for worship and for fellowship in times of joy and in times of sorrow as seasons and life passages were celebrated there. The church served the community until 2019 when, because of declining numbers, it was deconsecrated and sold. The bell which was made in Boston and

installed in the tower in 1915 has been removed and is in the process of being mounted in the Union Square Cemetery.

The church has been purchased by David Young who is considering the wonderful music possibilities of the building, perhaps concerts, perhaps recording, stay tuned! (pun intended)

Many new people have moved to inhabit homes and farms in Union Square but the largest growth has been in the numerous homes and cottages on Indian Lake and Lake Peter. Many roads lead from the Cornwall Road toward the lakes. There is a newsletter for Indian Lake residents (and perhaps other interested area residents). The newsletter has been created and distributed since April of 2022. 'We started it when we decided to build community by getting people to contribute to the purchase and installation of an AED.' It has been a great start to the school year with lots of activities, community involvement, and a positive environment at the school. The staff, students, parents and community have been very welcoming.

Over the past few months, we have been busy engaging with the community. Our leadership class organized a successful Terry Fox run/walk around the community to raise awareness and funds for cancer research. Thank you to the Bridgewater Fire Department Band who came out and held a performance at the school in support of our newly reinstated music program! It was great to see community members come out and enjoy the evening. Jason Greek and Marlene Blezy have been instrumental in supporting the return of the music program this year.

Several of our grade 7 students have been working hard at peeling, coring, slicing and drying apples so that we continue to have healthy snacks readily available to our students throughout the winter. We sincerely appreciate the donations of hard apples by the New Germany Lions Club, Delong Farms and community members. We are still happy to take donations of hard apples as we have many more students who would like to participate in producing the healthy snacks! It is wonderful to see students taking pride in turning the donations from the community into much needed snacks for their peers.

Our O2 students have had the amazing opportunity to explore the lands at Asitu'lisk (Formerly Windhorse Farms) and learn about inoculating the hemlock trees against the Woolly Adelgid. The students tagged trees and worked with the staff to help prevent the invasive HWA from destroying the beautiful and ancient hemlocks.

We would like to extend our gratitude as well to Canada Post for a significant grant provided to Mike Wilson's agriculture program this year. We have been awarded \$1000 to purchase more trees for our gardens. We hope to be able to produce more fruit that our students can not only enjoy fresh, but also dehydrated throughout the years to come.

We appreciate the support of the community in the education of our students and the programming that we can offer. We hope to see continued community engagement with the school throughout the year. were used to remove excess snow and ice from horseshoes. Most hammers are made of iron and often have snap rings or hooks



that can easily clip onto a horse's harness. Blacksmiths gave snowball hammers as gifts to customers. The hammers served as small tokens of appreciation for their loyal business, as well as a way for blacksmiths to practice and demonstrate their skills.

The Museum is closed for the season. They will reopen in May 2024.





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The History of the Parkdale/Maplewood Community Hall



The Parkdale / Maplewood Community Hall located at 3003 Barss Corner Road has seen its fair share of changes over the years. Here is some insight on how it progressed from an Agricultural Society to the present Community Hall.

In 1940 the Parkdale / Maplewood Agricultural Society was formed and it operated out of the Macabee Hall. In 1950-51 it moved to an old farmhouse on the present site. The main purpose of the society was to

improve farm production. The society was able to cook and serve meals to assist in fundraising. They also purchased a "dairy bull" for \$500.00 for breeding purposes. A member was charged one dollar for use of the bull for breeding their own herd.

1950/51 saw the beginnings of an annual "Fair Day" on the grounds. Before this the "Fair Days" were held at different farms within the community. The event was well known for the oxen, horse and pony pulls. The most popular event was the tug-of-war competition. Our local team was successful, going on to capture other Maritime competitions. Later, Christmas tree competition, wrestling, children's games, and a parade were added to the fun filled event. Hot meals were served at noon and supper.

The growing, thriving communities of Parkdale and Maplewood soon outgrew the farmhouse. A new facility was needed to host community meetings, community events, recreation and local social groups. In 1972 the old house was torn down and our new present-day hall was built. Pieces of the old farmhouse were used to make small canteens on the property. The last Fair Day as we knew it was held on August 9, 2003. It was discontinued for reasons beyond the community's control. For example, the Government introduced new stringent rules on how and where food was prepared. Rising insurance costs and fewer volunteers to help prepare and run the event added to the decision to cancel the event.

Farming was becoming more of a hobby rather than a means of making a living with families in the community. The Society recognized changes were required to better meet the needs of the community. In September 2005, the Parkdale / Maplewood Agricultural Society changed its name to the Parkdale / Maplewood Community Centre Association.

In 1996, weekly card parties and penny auctions were held throughout the year to raise funds for the hall. Unfortunately, due to the lack of volunteers both fund-raising events were cancelled. Fund raising then began to focus on the successful breakfasts held throughout the year. Currently there are nine to ten breakfasts held each year which is now the main fund-raising event. On average 265 to 340 people are served a delicious breakfast. It takes approximately twenty-two volunteers to cook, serve and clean-up for each breakfast. Thankfully with the help of the Livewires 4-H Club and volunteers from the community everyone who attends will leave with a full belly and the latest local news or gossip!

The Parkdale / Maplewood 4-H began in 1943. Known as the Livewires, they are celebrating their 80th anniversary. The group has use of the community hall for their meetings and the grounds. Their annual Achievement Day is held the 2nd Saturday in August. The community and hall executive recognize they are an intricate part of making the community breakfasts successful.

The hall is available for rent. Equipped with a full kitchen, tables and chairs and a stage. It has hosted many social events including weddings, reunions, receptions, Christmas concerts and community meetings such as road associations. The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg has hosted events in the hall such as the senior's corn boil, children's pumpkin day and polling station. The Parkdale Maplewood Museum utilized the hall and grounds for their annual Blueberry Festival which attracted over four hundred people. Other uses included residents raising money to assist community members with medical costs and hosting events to raise money to help maintain the building and grounds.

Looking for opportunities to utilize the hall and enhance community spirit, the hall has partnered with the YMCA to make sporting equipment available to the community. The hall committee, 4-H Livewires, Parkdale Maplewood Museum along with the YMCA all worked together to make this project a reality. Young and old have access to ring toss, washer toss, bean bag toss, disc golf, walking track poles, pickle ball equipment, snowshoes, soccer nets and much more. This equipment is now available for use and just needs to be signed out.



Repairs are a fact of life for a building that sees as much use as our Community Hall. A new steel roof was installed in July 2016. Grants from The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (MoDL), the Province of Nova Scotia and donations from organizations and individuals made the new roof possible.

Heating the hall is by far the highest operating cost. In 2016 the hall began investigating more efficient heating options. It was also recognized the need to improve air quality and cooling to add to the breakfast experience in the sweltering summer mornings. Heat pumps were identified by qualified companies submitting proposals. With the assistance and guidance from Susan Corkum-Greek, our MLA, Terry Meisner and Ted Cooke, grant requests were submitted to the provincial government and MoDL. Both levels of government stepped up along with the hall revenues covering the shortfall. The heat pumps were installed in July 2023.

Repairs and upgrades are required to keep the hall compliant with today's health regulations. Recently a major plumbing upgrade of new plastic piping, sink taps, and filtration system was completed. Many thanks to our local businesses for their continued support.

The committee is continually investigating ways to make improvements for ways the public can make use of the facilities. When we dream, we dream big. We would love to have a children's playground, an outdoor Pickleball court, make improvements including a new roof to our outbuilding which has been called "the Bingo Hall" or the "Dance Hall."

The hall committee board members are Chairperson Ted Cooke, Secretary Terry Meisner, Treasurer Joanne Veinotte. The committee meets 3rd Monday night of each month (except December) at the hall at 7:00 pm. We would encourage you to attend and look forward to seeing you there.

Upcoming events: December 11, the museum is hosting a fundraising Christmas potluck supper followed by a Chinese auction with fabulous prizes. It is a fun evening, and we hope to see you there. For more information, please contact Donna Arenburg 902-644-3421.

And when they arrive, they're greeted by amazing neighbours, including Darren Haley, the unofficial mayor of Natural Forest Lake Rd., who goes above and beyond to make them feel welcome.

When they realize they need a place to winter, the couple finds a cabin in Francy Corner. They spend 10 months renovating. It's stunning! Although they



have a new septic system and flush toilet, Jennifer proudly shows off the "prettiest outhouse in all of Nova Scotia."

Jennifer is now a happiness coach, nutritionist with a focus on the vegan diet, and a teacher of heartful meditation. I've genuinely enjoyed our afternoon together and find myself still savouring her pearls of wisdom. I'll leave you with a couple.

"When you live in alignment with your purpose, everything is easy. When people say, 'I don't know what my purpose is,' I say, 'look back to your childhood. Look back to the things you did as a kid, because then it came naturally to you. When you got up in the morning, what were those things that you wanted to do; had the freedom to do?"

"The thing that I love most about Nova Scotia is the people. Not all the people, but we have found our people here, and we know they're our people because they appreciate the beauty of nature, the importance of friendship and the value of enough."
