



Thanks to a provincial government grant, the Medical Centre has a new parking lot. There are no cracks, dips or pieces of broken pavement. There are two large parking spaces beside the building for those with mobility issues and the new lines are very visible in the parking areas. As well, interior painting has begun, to freshen up the offices for the medical staff. The Board of Directors is very pleased to continue to maintain the medical centre which is such a tribute to the people of New Germany and surrounding areas.

A committee of the Board continues to meet with representatives from Nova Scotia Health, to discuss the needs of the community. First, and foremost, is to increase the number of medical staff available. Like all other areas of the province, we need more doctors and nurse practitioners and the committee is working to make sure our voice is heard and to make our medical centre a possible location for any new practitioners. Medical personnel have a choice of where they wish to practice, so it is very important that our facility is seen as modern and up to date, with a supportive Board.

The Board accepts memorial and general donations at any time. Donations may be made at the funeral home or by dropping off your donation at 4923 Hwy. 10. Or phone 902-521-7791 to make arrangements. The generosity of the community has played a large role in keeping the Centre in New Germany as a functioning medical facility.



LCW Expands New Germany Area Service

The door-to-door transportation service Lunenburg County Wheels has increased its service area to include residents of Barss Corner, Lake William and Union Square; Stanburne, Meiseners Section and North River; Parkdale, Maplewood and Newburne and additional communities down the Cornwall Road. In July the pre-booked non-profit service made rides available residents of all MoDL communities northwest to the Annapolis-Kings border and northeast to the border with Chester District.

If you are looking for a low-cost weekday ride within your area or to Bridgewater or any other part of the service area, call 543-2255 at least 24 hours in advance. LC Wheels will pick you up and take you where you want to go. Then return later to take you back. The purpose of the trip is up to you: shopping, medical, recreation, social. Several recent riders discovered LC Wheels when they needed to drop off or pick up a car at a service garage and were temporarily without a car. Current vehicles are an 8-passenger bus with a chair lift and a 7-passenger minivan.

Thanks to financial support from MoDL rides up to 10 km are \$5 one way and \$7.50 return, with rides over 10 km \$7.50 one-way and \$15.00 return. LC Wheels serves residents over 16 (restrictions apply to riders under 16 and to child car seats).

Details are available on the LC Wheels website at lcw.ruralrides.ca. Service updates appear on the Facebook page LunenburgCountyWheels.

Full service area expansion – to include Mahone Bay, Lunenburg (town) and the remaining communities of MoDL including Riverport, awaits the arrival of new vehicles now on order, and drivers to operate them.

Lunenburg County Wheels is governed by a 9-member volunteer Board of Directors, led by President Jerome Tanner, 144dublin@gmail.com. Primary funding for the expansion, a four-year pilot project, comes from Nova Scotia's Department of Public Works. Many thanks to long-time sponsors United Way (Lunenburg County), South Regional Hospital Auxiliary and Bridgewater Lions Club.

Connecting in our Communities - Springfield

"It was in 1819 that the first (white) settler came to the neighborhood of what is now known as Springfield. In that year, John Grinton, a thrifty Scotchman, with a pack of food on his back and an axe ready at hand, made his way south on the Lunenburg trail. He selected a suitable place for a clearing, then chopped down trees and built a log cabin. He was soon joined by Boyd McNayr, another Scotchman, who had formerly lived in Lawrencetown and he also made a clearing and built a cabin." (Mary Fletcher Kendrick 1941).

In those early days, when Nova Scotia was being settled along the coast, the government saw the need to develop roads/trails across the province and to encourage settlers to move inland. In the late 1700's and early 1800's work was begun to link Halifax and Annapolis; Nictaux and Liverpool, and then Nictaux and Lunenburg. Gradually settlers followed these trails to Dalhousie, New Albany, 'Stoddartville', and then on to Springfield which was on the 'Lunenburg Road'. There was a tall signpost later erected where the Lunenburg Road turned south at Albany Cross. This was known as the "Fingerboard" as one crossboard shaped like a forefinger pointed west to 'Annapolis' (38mi), another east to 'Halifax' (100mi), and another south to 'Lunenburg' (40mi).

Grinton and McNayr worked hard to get homes ready so they could bring their families. They discovered they could grow crops in the hollows around trees that were removed and other young men from the Valley, many of them from Loyalist families, with names like Roop, Charlton, Jefferson, During, Wilkins, Marshall, and more Grintons and McNayrs, came to try their hand at life in this new land. As they shared their knowledge and worked together a small community began to grow.

In March of 1824, Mrs. John Grinton (nee Janet Dunbar) and her three daughters, Margaret, Isabelle, and Sarah came by horse and sleigh. In April, Mrs. Boyd McNayr (nee Rachel Beals) arrived on horseback with a baby in her arms, a toddler on the saddle with her, with her husband walking beside the horse guiding it through the rough trail from Lawrencetown. The first barrel of flour that was brought to Springfield was reportedly brought on a "travois"- two poles fastened (like shafts) on either side of a horse left to drag on the ground, with cross pieces nailed on to hold whatever was to be carried.

The McNayr log cabin was not only their home but a place where the community was welcomed. It was the site of the first religious services, prayer meetings, and the first marriage ceremony (In 1825 their daughters, Catherine and Mary, were married in a double ceremony to John Jefferson and Phineas Durling). Their cabin, and many others, including the Grinton cabin, were soon replaced with a 'good framed house'. The community grew, the road improved, grist mills and saw mills built, a building was erected for use as a school and for religious services; and the settlers became more connected with others from neighbouring communities in Dalhousie, Lake Pleasant, Falkland Ridge and the communities in northern Lunenburg County, North River, Cherryfield, Meisners Section, and New Germany.

The ingenuity and resourcefulness of our province's early settlers is nothing short of amazing. They'd have brought a few useful and treasured things with them, they made what they needed –all sorts of wood products made by hand and with simple equipment. Even bricks for fireplaces and chimneys were made from local clay and baked in a kiln made on location. They bartered and shared with each other or transported essentials from Lawrencetown. Their animals were essential to early life: oxen and horses to clear the land and for transport, cows, sheep and hens for food and clothing, and wild animals for food, furs and leather. Nothing was wasted. After some years, peddlers came door to door in Springfield, often bartering for the needed items as cash was rare.

The neighbours worked together on their large projects like house or barn raisings, 'burnt land' parties, quilting bees. People would gather to 'cut in' their sauerkraut, and for blueberry picking. These gatherings usually came with a generous community meal and socializing time. It was not unusual for families and friends to gather for a Sunday evening Hymn Sing.

The 1860's and 1870's saw the beginnings of small stores, and the next 50 -100 years saw a community transformed. There was an improvement of the roads and the construction of the railway, the growth and rebuilding of church(es), formation of a variety of clubs and lodges, opening of general stores, garages, at least one hotel, building of school(s), a local picnic grounds, ball field and the Lake Pleasant Campground for military families. With two lakes nearby, skating became a popular pastime, and in the 1960's-80's, the whole community was very enthusiastic about the Springfield Ice Kings Hockey Team.

The community was not unaffected by world events. A small cenotaph stands in front of the Baptist Church in honour of local men who served their country in the two World Wars, and to this day the community remembers at a Memorial Service held each year on the Sunday before Remembrance Day. Two 'Springfield born' nurses also served in France and England.

An important part of the area's history was the beginning of nearby lumbering camps as early as 1869, when a local company, the Davison Lumber Company, set up camps in the area. These employed a large number of local men each winter. Often during these years, there were times when the local clergy would have Sunday afternoon services there with preaching and music; the families and especially young people would come for a social time with sleigh rides, refreshments, and singing.

In 1904, the local company was sold to an American company and for almost 20 years, the business and the community boomed. The company built a very large mill in Springfield on the east side of Mill Lake, and built a small town there known as Hastings. The company built railways to connect with the Bridgewater to Middleton line; the huge dynamos in the mill supplied the town of Hastings with electricity before 1910; there was a store, a 'Social Hall', a school house and a doctor's office with a resident doctor. The company and community thrived until 1920 when the firm in New York went into liquidation and unemployed workers had to move away from Hastings. For a time it meant a slowing down of all business in Springfield, but the community rebounded and managed their woodlot and businesses in other ways. In July 1928, the mill caught fire; and it and the remaining buildings burned down.

The community continued then and continues now. Today it seems we have another wave of settlement with many new people moving to the area, new ventures being undertaken, and new relationships being built. The obvious gathering spots in the Springfield these days, the places where friends are made, and the community works together are the Springfield and District Fire Department, the Springfield Baptist Church, and Tammy's Country Store.

The Fire Department responds to fires, medical calls and local emergencies. The Fire Department also provides camaraderie among members and holds social events for the community such as breakfasts, pub nights, craft sales. New adult members (male and female) as well as junior members are being welcomed and trained. Check them out on Facebook.

The Springfield Baptist Church meets every Sunday morning

at 11. Guests and new members are welcome. They also hold community events such as teas, movie nights, music events and they do a great Christmas Concert with music, readings and skits. Connect with them on Sunday mornings and watch the bulletin board for their special event notices.

And at Tammy's Country Store you can find your basic foods, small household, fishing and hardware needs, snacks, ice cream cones, and a variety of beverages from NSLC. The bonus is that their friendly staff will also have time for a chat, are happy to get acquainted, and can answer your questions about Springfield then and now, or direct you to a community member who can.

We are thrilled to announce the extension of Bookmobile Library service to New Germany Elementary School this September 12. In order to accommodate this new stop, our regular hours parked out front of Mader's Store and the Rosedale New Horizons Club will be changed.

Last April, through a partnership with New Germany Elementary, our retired Bookmobile parked at the Elementary school and provided service two days a week to classes and students. The project, with amazing support from Principal Angela Stewart and all the classroom teachers, had all the kids in school visit the Bookmobile several times. A whopping 65% of the school population got library cards that month. With this kind of support from the kids and staff it was obvious to us that children in New Germany want to read and we want to put books in their hands.

Starting September 12 the Bookmobile will be going to the school every Tuesday for an hour. In order to fit the school stop into our schedule we will be shifting our entire Tuesday to start one hour earlier in the morning. This change means that the public stop beside the Freshmart will continue to start at 3 pm but will now finish at 4:30 pm instead of 5:30 pm.

We are busy making plans for fall so keep an eye out and you will see us around.




Rosedale Visit to the Militaria Display

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

Introducing Newcomers Mikaela and Mark

Mikaela Soroka and Mark Fischer couldn't be better suited to their property. Their casual, easy-going personalities fit perfectly with the cozy house nestled on 16 acres of untamed wilderness.

They first viewed the property near Church Lake last July. "It was a gorgeous day," Mikaela recalls. "It was a Saturday. It was so quiet. That's what we were looking for. The silence."

It became their home in October. Mikaela's job with a fisheries management organization and Mark's job in mineral exploration both demand a fair amount of travel. Even though it's been nearly a year, Mark says returning home is still special. "I always love coming home. It's like a vacation."



"It does feel like that," Mikaela agrees. "It's like living in an Airbnb."

Although their home is secluded, the couple says they don't feel isolated or alone. "The neighbours here are great. Everyone's willing to help each other," Mikaela says. "It's the feeling of, 'I'll do something for you because I know you'd do it for me'. It's really nice."

In winter, a watchful neighbour makes sure their driveway is ploughed when needed. Mikaela recalls one time away, when a friend stopped by to water the plants. The neighbour noticed tire tracks and promptly ploughed. "He thought I had come home," Mikaela says. "He was that on top of it!"

Mikaela was raised in Gatineau, Quebec and Mark is from Oro, Ontario. They met on their first day at Dalhousie University when they landed on the same scavenger hunt team during orientation. "We didn't think much of each other," Mikaela says. But that changed later the same day when they found themselves at an Oceanography club meeting. Both admit they only went for the free pizza. It turned out to be "one of those dates that never ends," Mikaela says.

Mikaela finished school before Mark and the relationship weathered nearly two years of distance when she accepted a job in Yarmouth. But they took it in stride. "It was an 'absence makes the heart grow fonder' situation. It made us that much more excited to see each other," Mikaela says.

The couple has approached other significant decisions with the same blend of pragmatic cheerfulness. Mark summed it up best: "We're pretty chill."

I completely agree. The conversation felt so easy and relaxed, I was surprised to see my notes covered such a broad range of topics. Today's dating scene, for instance. "It's messy," Mikaela says. What attracts young people to the New Germany area? The quiet lifestyle, gardening, and raising children in a close-knit community. "People are into that now and they're coming here to find it," she says.

We also talked about the necessity for mineral exploration and mining, how it relates to future progress,

Indigenous land rights, and land reclamation, as well as different philosophies around veganism, vegetarianism, meat consumption, and a shared passion for foraging and discovering wild edibles. See what I mean about broad topics?

Two topics that we didn't cover were scuba diving and surfing, but I promised to mention them here. If you or someone you know enjoy either, I highly recommend getting to know Mikaela and Mark. They'd love to meet new people who share these interests.
