

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New Germany Helping Hands



If you haven't heard, we are a group of volunteers who have been assisting seniors, disabled and other housebound people in New Germany and surrounding communities for quite a number of years. Our territory is within a 15 km radius of the village.

As winter weather will soon be approaching, it is a good time to remind everyone of our community involvement and the assistance we can provide if a person qualifies and it is within our guidelines to assist. We continue to have our popular grocery and pharmacy delivery on Tuesdays weekly. This can be arranged and set up with Freshmart and/or Shoppers Drug Mart in New Germany. This service can be used short-term during surgery recoveries, or on a week-to-week basis depending on your needs. It's as easy as calling the respective stores for your supplies after you have enrolled for the service.

We also offer check-in phone calls for those who are living alone and may not have family or friends making regular contact. This does not have to be daily and is just a short call to touch base and ensure that all is OK with the individual. You may want to use this just during the winter months.

We can assist you with some of the seasonal chores, like putting away your patio furniture and keeping a walkway clear of debris and shrubs. Have no one to reach high places or change your light bulbs? We can help with that. Not meant to be a regular housecleaning service, but if you have a small inside or outside chore that needs to be done, give us a call and we will advise if we can provide assistance by one of our volunteers. We are <u>unable</u> to provide complete snow removal to driveways. In need of some socialization? We may be able to match you up with a volunteer to come and have a chat or a game of cards. Unfortunately, <u>we cannot provide transportation</u> due to liability issues. You can book a ride within Lunenburg County by contacting Lunenburg County Wheels 902-523-4455.

Not everyone is fortunate to have family, or good friends and neighbors to help them out. Reach out if you think we can lend you a *helping hand*. If you have any questions or want more information, please call our Helping Hands phone line (902)644-1399 and leave a message. Someone will get back to you. Or you can email a message to nghelpinghands1@gmail.com.

NOTE: Our volunteers have Police Clearance Certificates and have privacy protocols to follow.

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Healthy Wells Day

On September 29th Healthy Wells Day was held at Walden in partnership with Walden Volunteer Fire Department, Rural Water Watch and Lunenburg County Community Fund (LCCF). The event was held in the Walden Fire Hall, an excellent venue.

Healthy Wells Day was held to encourage community members to test their well water for bacteria. Community members who came to the fire hall to pick up their water sampling bottles also had an opportunity to receive instructions on how to properly collect the water sample. Samples were returned to the hall and transported to the laboratory in Halifax. The results of the testing were provided directly to residents by the lab. Five residents were also chosen from volunteers with the fire department to have their wells tested for metals.


Volunteers were on hand from Rural Water Watch and LCCF as well as many volunteers from the Walden Fire Department. The Rural Water Watch volunteers have the background information to talk about how and why to test your well water, fill out the forms and correct any issues. They also transported the samples to the Halifax lab.

The volunteers with the Fire Department helped set up, made coffee and did a lunch BBQ for volunteers and the public.

Presently the Nova Scotia Government believes that 18% of Nova Scotians with wells test their well water. We were able to raise that figure to 25% in Walden.

The Walden community invited Fred Bonner of Rural Water Watch to return to Walden to talk about the results, methods for remediation of the well issues discovered and how to maintain safe drinking water. He encouraged everyone to test their well water regularly.

Rural Water Watch is a Nova Scotia charity with the aim of encouraging regular well water testing. There is lots of great information on their website ruralwaterwatch.org. Lunenburg County Community Fund is a charitable, nonpartisan, community led organization supporting initiatives to sustain and improve the shared quality of life in Lunenburg County. LCCF facilitated this project with both organizing and funding.

New Germany and Area IWK Toy Drive

The IWK Toy Drive is back again for its eighth consecutive year. Over the past eight years, the toy drive team has collected and purchased new toys and gift cards for the children and their families in the IWK Children's Hospital in Halifax. Together, we have raised approximately \$160,000 in toys and gift cards as a community. We collect toys, gift cards and financial donations which we use to buy toys locally. Toys must be new, unopened and unwrapped and gift cards are needed for groceries, restaurants, fuel, pharmacies, clothing and other locations that would help those in need at the IWK.

This drive was started by NGRHS teacher Michael Wilson and his wife Jessica after their daughter Lydia contracted RSV as a newborn. During their stay in the IWK just before Christmas, they were provided toys for Lydia and their two other daughters, Clara and Audrey. After this stay, the Wilsons vowed to pay back the hospital by starting a toy drive which runs each year. Michael started a non profit society called the New Germany and Area Christmas Toy Drive Society which is made up of local community members and friends who help make the toy drive possible. In May, Michael accepted an award at the IWK on behalf of the society called the IWK Board Award of Community Excellence.

The toy drive will be running until the end of November with the team delivering the toys to the IWK hospital on Friday December 6th this year. This will allow the IWK Child Life Services team time to sort and prepare the toys and donations for distribution to the kids and their families in time for Christmas.

This year, we have toy drop off locations at the following locations: Barss Corner Post Office, New Germany Post Office, Lantzalot Game Store in Blockhouse, Boulangerie La Vendeenne Bakery also in Blockhouse, The Oickle Group in Bridgewater, The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 102 in New Germany, and New Germany Rural High School. More sites may be added soon.

Penny Auction Sept. 2024



MoDL Volunteer - Bruce Veinotte

On December 26, 1976 in a powerful storm, the metal roof of Bruce and Heather's mobile home in West Northfield was picked up by the wind and deposited in their neighbour's yard over 500 metres away. As the rain dripped through what was left of the roof onto their children still in their beds, the parents woke up in shock and the family evacuated across the road to his parents' home.



When the light of day revealed the extent of the damage, word spread quickly. As the day went on many friends, neighbours and strangers showed up to help; equipment and materials had been found to clean up the old and replace with new; and by dark the same day, the crew working together managed to make the roof 'tight'.

The whole humbling experience of seeing so many volunteers come to his aid, offering whatever they could to help, left a lasting impression on Bruce. A young husband and father, already a volunteer with the Northfield District Fire Department, Bruce became more deeply committed to a life of 'helping where and when you are needed, using what you have and what you can do.'

Volunteering wasn't a new concept in Bruce's family. He grew up watching, helping and being 'voluntold' as his parents volunteered. His father, Lester Veinotte, after a fire destroyed his business, was instrumental in the establishment of the Fire Department in West Northfield and was its first chief. His mother, Pauline, was an active servant in church and community events, whose specialty was in organizing the details and cooking for community social and fundraising meals.

On September 18, Bruce was one of over 75 volunteers honoured at the 50th Anniversary Provincial Volunteer Award Ceremony in Truro. He was the representative volunteer for the Municipality of the District Lunenburg.

His citation read: "Bruce has devoted over six decades of his life to volunteering, beginning from his teenage years and continuing to this day. His unwavering commitment spans a wide range of activities, all aimed at nurturing the growth of his church congregation and providing invaluable service to the community. For more than 50 years, Bruce has been an indispensable member of the Northfield Fire Department, where he remains actively involved. His dedication extends beyond emergency service, as he also supports the efforts of the West Northfield Community Centre, where he currently serves as chairperson.

Bruce's contributions are diverse and far reaching – whether it's mowing lawns, plowing snow, assisting families during funerals, visiting seniors, or distributing bulletins and church information to those without access to email, he is always ready to lend a helping hand. Bruce's presence is characterized by warmth and a welcoming spirit making him a beloved figure in the community.

His actions consistently reflect an unwavering commitment to serving others, embodying the true spirit of volunteerism. Bruce's selfless dedication over the years has not only made a significant impact on those he has helped but has also set a powerful example of what it means to live a life of service and compassion. His tireless efforts continue to inspire others in the community to engage in acts of kindness and service, ensuring that the values of community and care are upheld for generations to come."

Bruce will quietly tell you that there is great satisfaction in knowing you've been able meet someone's need or been able to support them as they go through a difficult situation. He values the many good relationship that are made and strengthened, and the fun that can be had as volunteers work together. He delights in seeing new volunteers offer to help and in seeing them grow in skills and take new responsibilities. Bruce feels that most people are willing to help if they see a need, and if they think their help will be accepted. It's important to recognize the contributions people could make and might enjoy making; to invite them to serve; and to let them know their efforts are valuable.

The Maples

In 1924, some years after the railway bed was laid down connecting Middleton and Lunenburg, Jacob Penny Sr. acquired the rough strip of land between the railway tracks and the main highway. Through a lot of hard work, he made it into a grassy field after which he planted a long row of maple trees. He left his mark for our community to enjoy. Many people, particularly passing strangers, have stopped to admire and photograph their beauty. Time has passed and some of the trees are commencing to show their age.

Approximately eight years ago when one of the trees died the New Germany Area Promotion Society bought a maple tree which was planted by my son Ernest and myself once the older tree had been removed. Today it stands at least 12 feet tall. In 2023, through a tree planting program sponsored by the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg, we were able to acquire two sugar maple trees. They were both planted and are growing.

This year we were able to obtain more sugar maple trees through the same program. One evening four

of us, namely, Roy Lockyer, Neil Robar, Bryden Snyder and myself gathered and planted the new trees equal-distance between the older ones. Once planted, they were watered, tied to an iron stake upon which was tied a bright orange ribbon to warn anyone of their presence. another year we hope to be able to complete this project.

Each spring, over many years, we have enjoyed the growth of those newly leafed out trees that turn into a blaze of colour in the fall. This row of maples is the trade-mark of our community. Let us make certain they grow and survive for our continued enjoyment. ~Hiram J. Carver

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
